SAYS BRYAN WILL WIN.

Portland Delegate Returns—Advises Friends to Bet on Him.

"Bet all your money on Bryan to win, and all you can borrow."

Such is the advice of D. M. Watson to those asking his opinion on the result of the November election. Watson returned home this morning, the last of the Oregon delegates to Denver, from the National convention at Denver, says the Portland Telegram. When Watson was not appointed on the notification committee he packed his valise and went to Nebraska and called on Bryan in person.

"And I want to say," declared Watson, "that I wasn't put off by the notification committee. I got off myself. I got everything I wanted while away, reports to the contrary notwithstanding."

Concerning the political prospects, Watson is enthusiastic.

"Mr. Bryan told me," said the returned wanderer, "that the chances of his election look better this year than ever before. He is very confident of success. All the reports he is receiving are most favorable. I went to Lincoln and telephoned out to Fairview, where Bryan lives, and he told me to come right out. I took the trolley, went to his home and talked there an hour with him. I noticed that every house between Lincoln and Fairview, with one exception, had a picture of Bryan in the window. It was not like that in other campaigns and I spoke to Bryan about it. He replied that his fellow citizens were doing him greater honor than in the past and it was an encouraging sign. The people of Lincoln no longer consider Bryan's candidacy a joke and they are working to elect him."

"While I was at the Bryan home the great American was very busy. He has to dictate hundreds of letters, give instructions, and hold receptions. Delegations are calling on him continually. In former campaigns Bryan had to go on tours to meet the people. Now they come to see him. Fairview is the Mecca. I believe Bryan could remain at his home all during the campaign and not have to take the stump. Contributions are coming in freely. Farmers are coming to see Bryan from all the adjacent states, bringing their contributions to the campaign fund. These contributions he turns over to the national committee.

"From what I could learn, Bryan will carry Indiana, Ohio, New York and other big states. The death of Senator Allison yesterday may lose Bryan Iowa, although but for the untimely death of the senator, the democratic nominee could easily have swept the state. This was because of the factional fights which have been waging in Iowa. The death of Allison will probably result in the warring factions coming to some sort of a compromise. Most of the states I visited were in the south which are naturally for Bryan, so I heard little Taft talk. The impression exists that Taft is principally a big spender and not a thinker like Bryan. Taft has held office for years, but always appointive offices.

"One thing which will have a strong bearing on the result of the election will be the crops. The states through which I traveled are suffering from a short crop. In many sections the corn crop is practically a failure. Inasmuch as the republican party is given credit for giving good crops and bountiful harvests, the present failure will bring thousands of farmers over to Bryan. I found many republicans who declared they would vote for Bryan and democrats who left the party in 1896 and since then, told me they were coming back to the fold. The colored vote in the north will be for Bryan. This is because of the action of President Roosevelt over the Brownsville affair. The colored porters on the northern trains are red-hot Bryan boomers. In the south, of course, the colored voters talk less of the election—the whites won't permit them to. I found, also, numerous republicans who are tired of the one-man power of the republican party and want the people to have something to say. The Denver convention was a convention of the people and the most enthusiastic assembly of the kind in history.

"Mr. Bryan is constantly receiving letters from leaders throughout the country. He told me he had received one from Colonel Guffey, in which the politician explained to Bryan that his defeat in the Denver convention was strictly personal and that it would not prevent him from doing all in his power to assist in electing the Nebraskan. This is a spirit of harmony not so prevalent in the republican camp, from what I could learn. Judge Parker is out working for Bryan and was to speak in California last night for the ticket.

"I do not believe that Bryan will come to the coast on his campaign tour. There are only a few votes out this way, and it would be better policy for him to devote his time to the east where there are more votes."

CAN ISSUE PERMITS.

County Clerk Deputized as Fire Warden by State Board.

The Review was in error in its issue of Wednesday in stating that the county clerk had no authority to issue permits to burn slashings. The law states that such permits are to be obtained from a fire warden, but County Clerk Lenox has been deputized to act as such an officer, pursuant to authority given the State Board of Forestry under the following portion of the law:

"State and county officials whose duties make their ex officio services as fire wardens especially desirable as a convenience to the public, shall accept appointments as such when formally requested by the State Board of Forestry. Upon the recommendation of the Federal Forest Supervisor, the board may appoint resident officers of the national forest reserves who shall be ex officio fire wardens."
