CATHOLICS IN BOSTON.

American Federation Opens Annual Convention Tomorrow.

BOSTON, Aug. 8.—Boston today welcomed hundreds of prominent Catholic clergy and laymen who will take part in the seventh national convention of the American Federation of Catholic Societies.

Among the questions to come before the convention will be included such issues as divorce, socialism, observance of the Lord's Day, innocent advertisements and an indirect stage Christian education, the missions, at home and abroad; the Catholic press and the spread of Catholic literature; improving the condition of immigrants and approving the enactment of laws to prohibit child labor.

Among the reforms which the federation claims to have accomplished during the seven years of its existence, to which its national officials point, are the repeal of the Cuban marriage law, bettering of conditions in the Philippine Islands, appointment of Catholics to the Indian and Philippine consulars, securing permission for the celebration of masses in the navy yards and public institutions, appointment of Catholic army chaplains, assistance to Catholic Indian schools and negro missions, introduction of Catholic books into public libraries, establishment of friendly relations between societies of different nationalities, revision of histories and books of reference, restoration of Catholic churches, restoration of Catholics to the Board of amendments affecting the rights of Catholic Indians and the inauguration of a crusade against immoral literature.

More than 1,000,000 Catholics men and women, are now enrolled in the American Federation of Catholic Societies and Parishes. As the plan of organization is laid along lines of perfect system, the roll of membership is constantly growing, as parish after parish in every diocese of the union is joined in affiliation.

The presiding officers at the two public meetings will be ex-Congressman Joseph H. O'Neil and Judge Michael J. Murray, of the Boston municipal bench. The list of speakers includes the names of Archbishop O'Connell, Dr. Thomas Dwight of the Harvard medical school and National President Feeney of Brooklyn. Lieut. Gov. Draper will represent Massachusetts and Mayor Hibbard will welcome the delegates in the name of the city. Tuesday evening the speakers will be the Hon. Joseph H. O'Neil, the Hon. Thomas H. Cannon, of Chicago, F. W. Heckenkamp, of Quincy, Ill., and Bishop McPaul, of Trenton.
