Cleat Weaver, 50,000; Ed. Weaver, 200,000; J. J. Chadwick, 40,000; J. B. Harris, 90,000, and M. B. Smith, 20,000 pounds. The above figures are approximated. The actual yield may reach more than 500,000 pounds. The price paid was 5c for French 30s-35s, with 1/4 cent drop for each lower grade of five points.
