A BEDROOM DRAMA

Husband Beats Preacher Into Insensibility

WIFE BEGGED FOR HIS LOVE

Wyoming Judge Murders Wife, Whom he Met Through an Agency, and Then Suicides

Special to the Evening Review.

HURLOCK, Md., Aug. 10.—This city is in the throes of a sensation over the assault last night of Rev. Stephen B. Shipman, pastor of the Washington Methodist church, at the home of Thomas Carow, where the minister was visiting. Carow found his wife in Shipman's bedroom and beat him until he was insensible. After regaining consciousness, Shipman made his way to a cornfield, where he remained all night, fearing to go back lest Carow might kill him.

Shipman declared today that he would make the defense that the woman tempted him, but that he is innocent of wrong-doing. He says he was awakened by "Mrs. Carow's hand on his face." "I ordered her to leave," says Shipman, "but instead of complying she pleaded for me to love her and to pray for her."

The sentiment of Shipman's congregation favors him.

Judge's Double Crime.
DENVER, Colo., Aug. 10.—A dispatch to a local newspaper says that Judge A. S. Swanson, of Oshawacon, near the Yellowstone Forest, in Wyoming, shot and killed his wife and then blew out his own brains. The couple met through a matrimonial bureau. A quarrel over a social incident was the cause of the tragedy.

TENNESSEE G. O. P. SPLIT.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Aug. 10.—Hopelessly divided, the republicans of Tennessee will hold two state conventions this week, that of the Brownlow-Austin faction meeting in this city today, while the Evans-Hale faction will foregather at Nashville on Wednesday. At today's conven-

tion the insurgents will nominate a candidate for governor and other offices. A stormy session may develop. The delegates declare that their organization is entirely regular. Taft and Sherman are endorsed. T. A. Wright is mentioned prominently as the gubernatorial nominee.

The Evans faction, which will meet two days hence, claims to be the regular organization. It is led by H. Clay Evans, former congressman. United States commissioner of pensions and United States consul general at London. Evans was elected governor of Tennessee in 1894 on the face of the returns, but a recount was favorable to Turner, his democratic opponent.

NEW CIRCUIT COURT CASES.

Two Wives Sue for Divorces—Lawyer Sues Two Parties.

Rose McBee vs. Richard McBee, suit for divorce. Plaintiff alleges that her husband falsely accused her of infidelity and of trying to poison him. She also says in her complaint that he repeatedly cursed her and finally, on June 1, 1908, drove her from their home at Bridge, Coos county. Another allegation is that her husband has contributed only \$3 toward her support for a year past. His general cruel treatment, she says, has undermined her health and affected her nervous system. They were married at Camas Valley in October, 1898, and have an 8-year-old daughter, who has been given by the court into the custody of the mother.

Mattie Woodson vs. George Woodson; suit for divorce. Plaintiff alleges that her husband deserted her at Central Point, Jackson county, in July, 1905, five years after their marriage in Siskiyou county, Calif. Since her husband left her, Mrs. Woodson says she has been earning her own living by working as a domestic, but that her health is such that she should not be so engaged. She asks \$20 per month alimony from her husband, whom she declares is able-bodied and earns a salary of \$3 per day.

J. A. Buchanan vs. Frank Kennedy; action for \$250, alleged to be due for representing defendant in a land contest case. A demurrer has been filed.

J. A. Buchanan vs. E. P. Tynan; action for \$250, alleged to be due on a promissory note.

Editor Review: We arrived in good condition on the evening of the 3rd with the company full of life. Weather is ideal for camp life and the lake offers fine opportunity for a daily plunge.

There are about 12,000 troops encamped at this place, and a jolly crowd it is. The boys from Roseburg are feeling fine and are enjoying the camp. A few of them are troubled somewhat with sore feet, but that is remediable by the use of kahlki socks.

The other day Private Kernan missed drill while he was getting a shave and the sergeant put him on cook detail for one day as punishment. Kernan says he isn't going to shave any more until he gets home.

Musician Short is special trumpeter for Colonel Yorand, and he's feeling fine on account of his position. When Private Caro was relieved from his first sentry duty, he was asked if he made any arrests. He replied: "No, nothing went through my line but one automobile."

We have drill twice each day, four hours in both drills. This morning we had experience in pitching "pup" tents, but heretofore we have had both close order and extended regimental drills, skirmish runs, etc.

Privates Hughes, Clark, Brockway, Kenan, Hill and others have the advantage of Sgt. Buchanan and others of like build in the skirmish runs on account of the length of their lower limbs.

VIOLENCE BEGINS

Cry Goes up For Government to End C. P. R. R. Strike

ONE TRAIN OF WHEAT MOVES

American Flag Shot Away at Tabriz, Persia, During Revolutionary Engagement

WINNIPEG, Aug. 10.—The first train of this season's wheat arrived today direct from the fields to Fort Williams to avoid a possibility of a hindrance resulting from the strike on the Canadian Pacific. Violence is reported at several western stations today, where the strike breakers are employed. Several cars in the local freight yards have been smashed. Newspapers are demanding intervention of the government to stop the strike.

Old Glory Shot Away.
WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Dispatches from Tabriz, Persia, say that the American flag over the state consulate was shot away yesterday. The American consul has been instructed to warn both the revolutionists and the Shah's troops that no firing near the consulate will be tolerated. The authorities here think the shooting was accidental.

Walter Becomes Millionaire.
NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Godfred Prodat, a waiter employed in a restaurant in Brooklyn, has just been notified that he has fallen heir to an estate of \$10,000,000 left him by a distant relative in Germany. He will start for Germany at once, and upon his return he will marry a waitress, so he says.

Standard Oil Petition.
CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—A preliminary draft of the petition for rehearing in the famous Standard Oil case, in which a fine of \$29,240,000 was reversed, was completed today and sent to Atty. Gen. Bonaparte for his inspection.

TEN DIE IN TRAIN WRECK

Auto Explodes, Killing Two—Doctor Accidentally Suicides—Man Murders Wife

LONDON, Aug. 10.—It has just been learned that the Dutch ship Amstelland caught fire off the coast of South Africa August 6 and went down. A dispatch says a large number of passengers perished.

German Railroad Wreck.
ECKERNFORDE, Germany, Aug. 10.—Ten persons were killed and a score of others hurt today in a collision of passenger trains on the Flensburg-Kiel road.

The Deadly Automobile.
CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 10.—Mrs. Mary Boden, aged 67, and her daughter, Mrs. Rose Beckwith, were instantly killed today, when the automobile in which they were riding blew up near Palmsville.

Physician Suicides.
TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 10.—Through swallowing a dose of medicine prescribed for himself for external use, Dr. Charles McCutcheon, for years superintendent of a leading local hospital, is dead. In the middle of the night the doctor reached over to a table, secured the bottle by mistake for an internal mixture, swallowed the contents and died shortly afterwards in agony.

A Murder in Frisco.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—With her skull crushed in by a blow from a heavy spade, the wife of Peter Pallasau was found unconscious at her home today. She died four hours later. The woman's husband is under arrest. He admits quarreling with his wife, but denies the murder. Three children of the couple told the police their father was in the habit of beating their mother and that he quarreled with her yesterday.
