### CANADIAN LAND RUSH.

Remarkable Offer Made to Induce Immigration.

OTTAWA, Canada, Aug. 9.—Next month will see radical changes in the land policy of the Canadian government. The Oliver land act, which goes into effect September 1, will throw open to the public 28,000,000 acres of rich, arable land, in the old numbered sections of Western Canada that are liberally intersected by a network of railroads, are adjacent to commercial markets and swarming with live, hustling townships with well-established police protection, municipal government, schools, churches and institutions essential for agricultural prosperity.

While the "reuter" and the mail with limited loose cash is being given the opportunity of owning his own farm, unlike the procedure hitherto followed in granting free homesteads he is not asked to forego the advantages in settled districts and to go into the wilderness to fight the hardships of the pioneer. Instead of this, the new instrument of the Canadian legislature gives the enterprising man free land situated near flourishing towns offering all the advantages and conveniences of modern life.

In order to encourage railroad building in the Dominion, the government has given to the railroad companies 32,000,000 acres of land during the last few years and as a further inducement they have been left absolutely unfettered in the choice of locality and the time of selection, but recently were made to select their lands. The companies have taken full advantage of this generous provision and made a constant practice of leaving their grants in abeyance unless, after closely watching the trend of immigration and settlement they could make up their minds as to what tracts of land would best serve their interests.

How Brought to Pass.  
Never before has any country offered land for homesteading that is located near already settled and populated districts. That this will be done in Canada is not a chance accident, but the result of Canada's beneficent land administration. As in the United States, the whole of western Canada is divided into "townships" six miles square. Each township is subdivided into 36 blocks of land, one mile square, technically known as a section. A section is further divided into four quarter sections, each 160 acres. There are, therefore, 36 sections in a township.

and these are numbered 1 to 36.

In every township the quarter sections 8 and 26 are the property of the Hudson Bay Company, which is thus significantly dotted all over western Canada and reminds one of the fact that this entire territory was once owned by the corporation. These sections were ceded by the Canadian government to the Hudson Bay Company when the latter surrendered its title to Western Canada. With the exception of its sections, all even-numbered quarter sections were thrown open for homesteading by the Canadian land act of 1872. The act set apart quarter section 11 and 21 for selling at public auction at the ripe moment in order to form the nucleus of a fund with the proceeds of which to establish common and high schools. The remaining odd-numbered quarter sections were held in trust by the government to bestow grants on railroad companies and for future homesteading entries. Since 1872 odd-numbered sections aggregating in area nearly 32,000,000 acres have been given to the railroad companies and even-numbered sections of a like amount, to homesteaders. The remaining 28,000,000 acres next month are to be thrown open to the public under the new Canadian land act.

Will Cause a Rush.  
Taken as a whole, the act of the Canadian government, is expected to induce new immigrants to western Canada on an unprecedented scale. The land for purchase and free homestead entry is unequaled in fertility. It is all situated in the Canadian Northwest, where grain crops have increased from about 30,000,000 bushels in 1891 to 120,000,000 bushels in 1908, and with certainty promise to yield at no remote day at least four or five times this year's output.

Homesteading Under New Law.  
Under the Dominion act of 1872 the requirements for homesteading entry were six months' residence in each of three years, the building of a habitable house and farm buildings and the cultivation of 50 acres within three years and the naturalization of the homesteader before the issuance of letters patent. The new law names the same conditions for homestead entry, with this exception, that no specification is made as to the acreage which must be put under cultivation. The act empowers the Minister of the Interior to pass upon the cultivated area, since some farms may present greater difficulty in clearing of brush or stone than others, and these contingencies will be taken into consideration at the expiration of three years. Furthermore, the act interprets the residence of the homesteader in the house of a relative living within nine miles of the homestead as residence upon the farm, and fixes the term of forfeiture of the right to the homestead at five years for failure to apply for letters patent.

Only those people who fulfilled their obligations as homesteaders and obtained their letters patent before the 2d of June, 1889, are entitled to make entry for a second homestead. However, the act makes a provision enabling any and every homesteader to purchase a second homestead for \$3 per acre. One third of this sum is payable at the time of entry and the balance in two equal installments with 5 per cent interest.
