The spraying was done at the right time, too, and in a proper manner, and today the tree is perfectly healthy and bearing as fine apples of its variety as can be found anywhere in the county.

DEVIL CHASERS IN COURT.

Sect Accused of Mad Orgies Clad in the Altogether.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Charged with engaging in mad orgies, in which it is alleged that they wore too little clothing, the members of a "devil chasing" sect in Brooklyn will appear in court tomorrow.

The defendants, who are alleged to have performed their indecent rites under the guise of religion, strenuously assert their innocence of any wrongdoing.

It was a ceremony known among the sect, according to police information, as "drawing the dragon," or "chasing the devil," that caused four of the prisoners to be held in \$500 bail.

Because the police alleged she is the acting head of the sect, or church, Mrs. Robinson was also held on a charge of "keeping and maintaining a place for indecent purposes." She was arraigned on the separate charge.

Mrs. Robinson denied, excitedly, that women dressed in order to carry out their religious exercises.

She says that the "sisters" prayed in a room on the upper floor of the chapel, while the "brethren" prayed downstairs.
