\$300 GOOD-ROAD JOB.
 Judge Scott, of Marion County, Will Devote Entire Time.

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—Before leaving for his Marion county home last night, Judge J. H. Scott accepted the offer from the ways and means committee of the good roads conference and will immediately enter the campaign of interesting the people of Oregon in the movement. The terms of the contract entered into provide that in consideration of giving all his time to the cause he shall receive a salary of \$200 per month with travelling and other expenses. This will, however, be contingent upon the raising of the funds necessary to carry on the work.

The plan of campaign is being rapidly mapped out. It will embrace public meetings in every town in the state. Special efforts will be put forth to get the farmers and ranchers to attend.

Literature will be provided, together with plans, specifications and prints showing in a plain way how a good road should be constructed.

The speakers will work under the direction of the ways and means committee. That committee has already sent out of number of letters. J. H. Albert, the chairman, will probably establish the headquarters of the committee at the Commercial Club, and will come on from Salem as often as his presence is required.

"I believe that good roads mean as much to the development of the state as do the railroads," said Judge Scott last evening. "An opening into this fight with my whole heart. When we have good roads through the interior of the state, investors will be attracted, tourists will come in greater numbers, hotels will follow the roads, local demand for crops will be increased, crops can reach markets at less expense with greater loads and the staff will come to the seaboard much cheaper and in greater quantities. I am going home now to arrange to give my whole time to this work."

Judge Lionel R. Webster will be tendered a contract of similar character if he decides to resign his judicial position as county judge of Multnomah county.

OREGON STATE FAIR.
 Extensive Preparations For Annual Meet, Sept. 14-19.

The State Fair of Oregon for 1908, will be held at Salem during the week beginning September 14. The Oregon fair is the leading agricultural exposition on the Pacific coast; that is acknowledged by all other states. Special efforts have been put forth by the management to make the coming fair the greatest ever in the history of the organization. Extended classifications of livestock, increased premiums and additional conveniences for exhibitors in displays will assure unsurpassed displays which should be seen by great crowds of people every day during the week. The progressive farmers and stock growers of the state and the Pacific Northwest have expended considerable time and money during the past year in the betterment of their herds and flocks, and many of them have signified their intentions to show their best animals at the fair next month.

Frank A. Welch, secretary of the fair board, has received information which indicates that there will be ten or more counties to participate in what is known as the "county exhibits" contest for the cash premiums aggregating \$1300 divided into eight premiums, the first being \$300, second \$250, third \$200, fourth \$150, and the remainder \$100 each. This exhibit must contain agricultural and horticultural products, and any other articles that will show up the resources of the state. The counties thus far expected to participate are Clatsop, Columbia, Clackamas, Multnomah, Marion, Yamhill, Linn, Lane, Benton, Douglas, and Josephine—these being in the western part of the state; and it is believed that one or two counties in the eastern portion will enter the contest, which would add considerable interest to the great feature, which in the past has been the admiration of thousands of people. These exhibits will be made in the main pavilion, which is large and commodious and neatly arranged in every respect. Besides the county displays, the Oregon Agricultural College will be represented by specimens of work done by its students and faculty in the past, the superintendent having sent in notice for increased space in the building. There will also be special farm exhibits, and the horticultural department is going to be full to overflowing.

The racing department will be better than in the past; and that means a great deal, as the best races in the Pacific Northwest have taken place on the Oregon State Fair track. The grandstand has been remodelled and its capacity increased to nearly double. There will be no liquor establishments permitted on the fair grounds this year, and pool selling has been made a thing of the past. Numerous improvements about the race course have been made which will lead an attractiveness to the speed contests and will be highly appreciated by many thousands this year. A high class of harness horses will be at the fair in an effort to pull down the rich purses offered and between heats there will be some specialties to amuse the crowds.

It is the duty of all Oregonians to patronize the fair, as it is an agricultural exposition in every sense of the word. The sum of \$10,000 appropriated by the legislature for premiums on livestock and agricultural and manufactured products, is widely distributed and does much towards assisting in the development of the agricultural resources of the state and the upper Pacific coast.

CELEBRATE IN BULGARIA.
 Ferdinand Good Ruler Despite Murder of Prime Minister.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Aug. 14.—Celebrations are being held today throughout Bulgaria to commemorate the twenty-first anniversary of the accession of Ferdinand as prince of Bulgaria and the consequent freedom of the country from Turkish thralldom.

During Ferdinand's reign Bulgaria has made many advances toward a wider and freer liberty. Moslems, Jews, Roman Catholics and the various sects of the eastern Christian churches now live in amity. The credit of the nation has become better than ever before.

The only blot on Ferdinand's reign was the assassination of the prime minister Stambouloff to whom Ferdinand owed his throne. Stambouloff was called the "Bulgarian Hamanek" and was a statesman of great ability. His cold-blooded murder on the streets of Sofia is as yet unexplained, and there is still a suspicion in many quarters that Ferdinand shared the responsibility for the crime.

TO LOSE NO MORE TAXES.
 Jackson County Spends \$15,000 for Maps of Everybody's Land.

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 13.—The county court has entered into a contract with the Jackson County Abstract company, whereby the latter is to furnish the county with a complete set of maps or plats of every parcel of land in the county, giving the name of the owner of every piece of real estate in the county. These maps are to be kept up to date for four years, or until 1913. The county loses several thousand dollars each year, because of property that is never located by the assessor, and therefore does not get on the assessment roll. By referring to these present ownership maps the assessor will be able to find the owners of all property in the county. The price to be paid for this work is \$15,000.
