The property of Paul Dimnick, a bankrupt lumberman of Drain, has been sold by C. W. Kirk, the receiver, to W. L. and Thos. Cobb, E. L. Giles and W. S. Hamilton, of this city, for \$2,400. The property consists of a sawmill, situated on Elk Creek, near Drain, a tract of timber land and a quantity of logs and manufactured lumber.

A force of twelve men is now at work on the Providence Hospital in West Roseburg, pushing it to completion as rapidly as possible. Good progress is being made on the first story, and it will be the endeavor of the builders to have the hospital ready for occupancy in December. The concrete basement for this hospital was built over a year ago, since which time the work has been suspended. When completed the building will comprise two full stories, with large attic and basement. The hospital will be conducted by the Sisters of Mercy.

Portland Telegram: Oregon-grown Crawford peaches naturally hold first place among the new things in the fruit market this week. There were small offerings of this sort of peach a week ago, but they were hardly fancy and not sufficiently attractive to turn buyers away from the best, California Elbertas and Crawford. Now, as fine Crawford peaches are to be had, at 40 cents a dozen, the comparatively high prices being due to the fact that they are as yet a bit scarce. Next week they will be plentiful.

The supply of California Crawford and Elbertas and Oregon Hales and Alexanders was never larger nor finer than now, and prices on all of them are down to the low price for the season in all probability. The range today is from 15 to 30 cents a dozen at the retail stores.

### OREGON NEWS.

The annual reunion of the pioneers of southern Oregon will be held in Jacksonville Thursday, Aug. 27th.

Deputy Game Warden W. R. Parker, of Baker City, and a party of hunters, while hunting in Baker county, this week, killed three ibex. This is something extraordinary, for, according to reports there are few ibex in the United States, and they have never been seen outside of eastern Oregon. In fact, this peculiar animal is very scarce throughout the world, a few remaining in China, according to the claims of men who are posted on such things.

William Shipman and Frank Brown, two short-term men, at the Oregon state penitentiary, who were working as trustees, escaped from the institution early Friday morning, while working on the prison farm. A reward of \$50 has been offered for each man. Shipman was serving a year and six months' sentence for adultery, and Brown was up for four years on a larceny charge.

### A MODERN MACAULAY.

Wonderful Memory of an Old Time Missouri Lawyer.

One of the most picturesque of the early lawyers of Missouri was Billy Campbell, who came from Virginia in 1829 and opened an office in St. Charles. He was a man of great ability, a classic scholar, an orator and

he was indolent, careless about collecting and spending money and so lazy that physical exertion of any kind was positively painful to him. He had a most remarkable memory, as proved by the following incident: Campbell, who was a Whig, represented his district in the state senate several years. On one occasion he was lying on a bench in the senate chamber, apparently sleeping, when the Democratic members came in to hold a caucus. They attempted to arouse him, but he appeared so soundly asleep that they decided to let him alone. The next day a complete report of the proceedings of the caucus, including a verbatim copy of the resolutions adopted, was published in the St. Louis Republican. A row followed, and the secretary was charged with having been bribed to report the proceedings of the caucus. After the excitement died down somewhat Campbell admitted that he had been awake all the time and that he had done the reportorial work entirely from memory.—Kansas City Star.
