FOR STREET PAVING
Council to Consider Bids Tonight For Construction
WORK PROBABLY BEGIN SOON
Representatives of Warren Construction Co. are in Roseburg to Place Bids for Bitulithic

At the regular meeting tonight the Roseburg city council will open and consider bids for the 18 blocks of hard surface street paving, as heretofore advertised for. In all probability a contract will be let for the same and the active construction work begun in a very short time.

How Paving Helps.
When the street paving agitation in Eugene was begun about three years ago, that city's population was but very little, if any, more than Roseburg's is now.

W. L. Archambeau and A. M. Shannon, of Portland, representing the Warren Construction Co., builders of bitulithic pavement, are in Roseburg today and will submit a bid for the construction of the 18 blocks of paving here.

Springfield Now Patrolled by 3,000 Soldiers

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 17.—The mob who has held the city in a reign of terror since last Friday night was finally checked by presence of 3,000 soldiers, who are now in complete charge.

On the national forests the forest assistant often acts as adviser to the supervisors in charge, who are mostly men experienced in all practical matters, but usually without school training in the science of forestry.

There is a growing interest in the profession of forestry now, and many young men are asking how to get into it and what it promises.
