## COLLIERY A TOMB

### Between 80 and 100 Men Killed by Explosion in Maryland

## RESCUERS' NARROW ESCAPE

### Explosion of Dynamite on River Boat in Ontario Injures Twelve Men, Six Fatally

Special to the Evening Review.  
WIGAN, England, Aug. 19.—Between 80 and 100 men are known to have perished in an explosion in the Maypole colliery last night. Twenty charred bodies have been recovered, and it is estimated that not less than 60 more are beyond the reach of rescuers at the present time. The rescuing party was driven back today by flames, destroying all hope of saving any of the men entombed.  
One venturesome party of seven men entered the shaft of the colliery but was overcome by gas and rescued by a second party nearly dead. This city, with its population of 99,000 is at a standstill as it is supported by the collieries. Families of many of the dead men are gathered at the mine and their grief is a heart-rending sight.

Dynamite Kills Six.  
AMHERSTBURG, Ontario, Aug. 19.—Twelve men were injured, six of them fatally, by the explosion of dynamite today on the drill boat Des Troyer, which was being used in the river. The injured men were hurled high in the air and fell into the river. The boat was blown to atoms.

## DUE AT SIDNEY TOMORROW.

### Royal Welcome Awaits United States Battleship Fleet.

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 19.—With the cherished ambition of eclipsing all previous welcomes to the American fleet, the people of Sydney and of Australia are awaiting with bated breath the arrival of the great Armada tomorrow, when the enthusiasm that has been pent up through months of preparation will break out in a veritable pandemonium of noisy and tumultuous greeting. Millions of dollars will be expended for the entertainment of the visiting tars during the visits of the fleet to this city and Melbourne. Australia, still an infant in the family of nations, entertains a great admiration for the land of Uncle Sam. The enterprise that has made the United States a leader among nations is expected, in the course of years, to accomplish the same result for the Yankees of the Antipodes.

There are diplomatic reasons, too, why Australia is anxious to cultivate and maintain the friendship of Uncle Sam. The policy of "A White Australia" cannot always be maintained unless the Australian government has strong backing. England has no fleet in these waters and dependence upon the mother country, the Australians realize, might some time leave them in sad straits if Japan should decide to insist upon the admission of Orientals. With Uncle Sam in possession of the Philippines, the United States is forced to act as a buffer for the Asiatic menace which is the nightmare of Australia.

The great Yankee fleet is scheduled to arrive off Port Jackson tomorrow morning. The flagship Powerful, with Vice Admiral Pore in command, will meet the fleet and extend a naval greeting. In the evening Lord Northcote, governor general of the commonwealth, will give a dinner in honor of the officers of the fleet.

The arrival of the fleet tomorrow will be made the occasion of a great spectacular aquatic welcome on the part of the public. From the heads at the harbor entrance tens of thousands of spectators will hail the approach of the battleships, which will proceed to their moorings between lines of pleasure steamers and other harbor craft, bearing cheering multitudes, with flags flying and bands playing. Once the battleships have picked up their moorings the fleet of pleasure steamers will pass along the line of anchorage and another rousing welcome will be accorded the American bluejackets.

## THROWN IN UPROAR

### United States Army Officers Blackened by Mrs. Haines

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Seemingly every officer in the United States army is rallying to the defense of Capt. Hains, who last Saturday shot and killed William Annis for alleged infidelity with his wife. Following the publication by Mrs. Hains of counter charges to the divorce suit filed against her, army circles are much wrought up over alleged conditions depicted in her answer. These allegations, if proven, would show a state of social affairs in the American army nearly as scandalous as the orgies of the "Knights of the Round Table," which recently shocked all Germany. Mrs. Hains' allegations of moral degeneracy in the army has aroused a great uproar and intense indignation.

## CHARGES ARE ASTONISHING

### Allegations of Moral Degeneracy, It Proven, Will Result in Tremendous Scandal

Captain Hains eloped with his wife, a Miss Claudia Dibby, of Winthrop, Mass., in 1909, when she was a schoolgirl of 16.

So far as is known, they lived happily together until Captain Hains returned from a trip to the Pacific coast on a summons from his brother, who professed to have made discoveries of improper conduct on the part of Mrs. Hains. At that time Captain Hains summoned his father, Brigadier-General Hains, to New York, who, upon returning, stated that his daughter-in-law had made a confession to him that convinced him of the correctness of the son's position.

The couple have three children, which are in the custody of General Hains.

Kills Babe With Hat Pin.  
CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 19.—In a fit of insanity today, Mrs. Fred I. Goldberg killed her babe by stabbing it with a hat pin. She then tossed the body into a vacant lot and went into the woods near Evanston and hanged herself.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 19.—L. D. Corkins, a civil engineer, said to have wealthy relatives in Cincinnati, shot and killed himself today in a rooming house in this city. He is believed to have been insane.

A Probable Murderer.  
SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 19.—Patrick Dooley, a member of the New York City Laborers' Union, was found dead on the water front today with an ugly wound on his forehead, indicating foul play. The police are investigating.

## TO TELL OF SUCCESS.

### Negro Business and Professional Men Meet in Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 19.—One of the most representative gatherings of colored business and professional men ever held in this country marked the opening this morning of the ninth annual session of the National Negro Business League, of which Dr. Booker T. Washington is president. A cordial welcome was extended to the visiting negroes by official representatives of the city, state and colored citizens. Delegates are here from all over the land, although the southern states are most largely represented. The roll of visitors and their occupations shows that negroes are now engaged in nearly every business, trade and profession.

Scores of speakers will speak briefly before the convention and will tell of their experiences in various lines of business and the methods by which they have won success. The National Negro Bankers' Association, the National Negro Undertakers' Association and other bodies affiliated with the league will hold sessions.

A novel feature will be the addresses of two colored women who have won success as pharmacists, Mrs. Amanda V. Gray, of Washington, and Mrs. J. P. H. Coleman, of Newport News, Va. The Right Rev. I. B. Scott, of Monrovia, Liberia, will deliver an address tomorrow on "The Business Development of Africa."

The city government of Baltimore has recognized the importance of the convention by installing elaborate illuminations along Druid Hill Avenue, a handsome thoroughfare occupied largely by negroes who own their own homes and business establishments.

On Monday, following the close of the Baltimore convention, the delegates will go to Washington, where they will be entertained by the Frederick Douglass Memorial Association with a trip down the Potomac. The receipts from this outing will go to the Frederick Douglass memorial home fund.
