CUTS ARTERY; DRINKS POISON.
Newcomer at Medford Attempts Suicide; Died Later.

MEDFORD, Or., Aug. 18.—Frank I. Nelke, of New York, who came here a week ago with his wife and child and rented a room, and was about to open a clothing store, attempted to commit suicide this morning by drinking two ounces of carbolic acid, after cutting his wrist with a razor. He was found shortly afterward in the bathroom of the Hotel Moore by his wife.

Her screams brought doctors, who pumped the man's stomach, but he is believed to be beyond recovery. He is 36 years of age, the son of a wealthy New York merchant, and had been a traveling salesman. (Nelke died Wednesday morning.)

TOWN BURNED; LOSS \$150,000
SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Aug. 18.—Telephone messages from Gore Bay, on Manitoulin Island, say that town was almost destroyed by fire today. Fifteen business houses were burned to the ground. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

Oregon Militiamen High up in Three Latest Matches.

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 18.—In the Leech cup match today Sergt. Johnson, Fourth Oregon, won seventh place; Sergt. Abrams, Third Oregon, ninth; Corp. Romaine, Third Oregon, eighteenth place, with respective scores of 97, 97 and 96 out of a possible 105.

In the championship team match, incomplete, the Third Oregon stands sixth, the Fourth Oregon seventh.

In the Wimbledon cup match Capt. Scott, Third Oregon, won eighth place, score 91 out of a possible 100. Sergt. Schwarz, Third Oregon, eleventh, score 91; Corp. Romaine, Third Oregon, fourteenth, score 91; Sergt. Abrams, eighteenth, score 91.

In the championship regimental skirmish match of the National Rifle Association tournament yesterday 40 teams competing, the Fourth Oregon Regiment won tenth place and the Third Regiment thirteenth place. Only three state organizations, Oklahoma, Massachusetts and Colorado, made higher scores than Oregon.

RECKLESS AARON BURR.

The Dramatic Story of His Marriage in Old Age.

The story of Aaron Burr's marriage in his old age to the widow of Stephen Jumel, who was well known in the early history of New York city, is a dramatic one.

Conceive, if you will, the picture of Burr, gifted adventurer that he was, broken in health, branded in the popular mind as the murderer of Alexander Hamilton and returning from a long exile to find himself an outcast in the city where he had once been the political monarch of all he surveyed and a distinguished figure in society and in the law. Conceive, if you can, this lamentable old man, smirking through his wrinkles, bowing and prancing rather stiffly because of his rheumatic joints and with his mouth full of pretty platitudes, paying court to the widow of Stephen Jumel, herself in the prime of years and health. Remove from the picture its surface incongruities, and you have a bit of queer pathos unquoted in the annals of foolish great men.

But something of his old time power to charm the gentler sex must have been left to him in his years of mental and physical misery, for in his suit for the widow Jumel's hand and fortune he won gloriously, dramatically. Rebuffed repeatedly, Burr finally declared in passionate rage that on a given day he would arrive at the Jumel mansion accompanied by a clergyman, who should marry them on the spot. He would give his prospective bride no quarter, no chance of escape from the inevitable.

She was amused at the threat and dismissed the old man with more than her usual coldness of demeanor. Burr stuck to his avowal and one July day rolled up in a carriage, and with him was a minister, the same who fifty years before performed the marriage ceremony for Burr and the mother of his daughter, the beautiful Theodosia. There was something of a scene in the old house on this day. There were tears of anger on the part of Burr. Relatives remonstrated; Burr remained immovable. All feared a scandal. The minister, book in hand, stood unobtrusively in the background. There were more tears, more declarations of undying love, and the widow Jumel became Mrs. Aaron Burr.

They were married in the great drawing room of the Jumel mansion. Burr squandered with reckless hand the wealth acquired by Stephen Jumel and left for the enjoyment of his marital partner. There were many bitter quarrels between the ill matched pair, and they were soon divorced. Burr died in 1836, but madam lived until 1865, dying a recluse and a miser, the money received from the Jumel estate hoarded in an unused chamber.
