PAVING FINANCED

Warrants on Special Fund to be Taken at Par

CITY GAINS FIVE PER CENT

Reduces Paying Contract to About \$61,000—Leaves \$4500 For Deer Creek Bridge

Interest in the pending street paving contract has been in a state of approaching the intense since the city council meeting Monday night.

This financing of the paving warrants will bring the Warren Construction Co.'s bid down to about \$61,000. Half of this is to be paid from the sale of bonds and the other half by assessments against the property abutting the pavement.

With all these details adjusted, there is no apparent reason why the paving contract should not be let without further delay.

Some talk has been heard that further investigation of the quality of bituminous pavement should be made before a contract is awarded.

Last February for that special purpose. Practically the entire city council was included in that party.

FORM NEW ASSOCIATION.

Willamette Valley Prune Growers Dislike Combin's Contracts.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 19.—An entirely new factor appeared in the Willamette Valley prune market today, when the Northwest Association was formed for the purpose of packing prunes this season.

The new association includes some of the largest growers in this section of the valley. Its members declare it will not join the packers' combine, which was formed here some time ago, and will be the only large packing firm outside the Packers' Association.

Among the growers who joined in organizing the new concern are L. M. Gilbert, of Roseburg; Enos Pressnell, of Salem; S. P. Kimball and M. M. Ellis, of Dallas; A. L. West and L. M. Crozier, of Roseburg.

Lesselle was formerly manager of the packing plant, owned by Lesselle Bros., and it is apparently the purpose of the new association to make use of his knowledge of packing and marketing fruit.

The growers who have organized the new association will proceed at once to enlarge the membership. One of the plans of the new concern is to require all members to dry their prunes thoroughly, so that there will be no danger of the fruit spoiling, as was the case in some instances last year.

The effect of the entrance of an independent packing firm into the market will be watched with interest, for neither the eastern jobbers nor the Oregon growers are pleased with the new contracts that have been drawn up by the members of the packers' association.

FIRE REAPS GRIM HARVESTS IN THE WEST

Takes Lives of Eight Children Near Palouse, Wash

COSTS PENDLETON \$68,000

Consumes Forest Near Vancouver, B. C. and Now Threatens City—Rages Near Yosemite, Also

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 20.—As the result of a fire that destroyed the home of H. W. Shultz, two miles west of Palouse, last night, six children are dead and two others are dying.

All of the children were asleep when the fire started. Smoke and flame awakened the eldest Shultz girl, and she immediately aroused the next oldest girl. Together they endeavored to awaken the smaller tots, but they were too sleepy to realize their danger.

Although the Shultz sisters gained the outer air, they are burned so badly that they cannot live. The fire is believed to have started from a defective flue in the kitchen.

Pendleton's Big Loss. PENDLETON, Or., Aug. 20.—One of the worst fires in the history of the city today destroyed the First Christian church, the Wilcox Implement Co.'s plant, the Golden Rule hotel and the residences of Hon. W. J. Furnish, R. Alexander, Frank O'Gara, F. W. Vincent and Thomas Thompson.
