CLEVELAND.

The last issue of Collier's Weekly has an article by Jesse Lynch Williams on "Grover Cleveland," which ought to do something toward softening the hostility of many toward this great, rugged, misunderstood and lovable giant. It is an intimate, kindly and sympathetic sketch of The President's personal character and private life. It presents the democratic side of the great democrat. It reminds one of a great elephant disporting. The incident of this renowned and august personage who twice filled the exalted office of President of the United States, spending a laborious hour to make his boy a whistle; his solicitude for a little girl who seemed to be traveling alone; his thoughtful strategem to assist a poor undergraduate; how gentle and lovable these little touches make the private character of this great man appear. Only the truly great can be truly gentle.

It requires a certain amount of greatness of character to appreciate greatness. The toad's highest conception of beauty is his toadness. Beauty is partly in him who sees it. There are little minds which can never rightly estimate great character. "Great men," says Emerson, "are always misunderstood." Mr. Cleveland has not escaped the penalty of greatness. How the little dogs barked and snapped at him as he shouldered his way up from obscurity to renown! No public man has ever been more content than has Mr. Cleveland. His traducers have not been content with assailing his public life. They have invaded his home life and sprinkled the blood of assassinated reputation on the lintels of his door posts. But in nothing, I think, does the greatness of the man appear than in this: "When the little dogs barked at him he never got down on all fours and barked back at them. The weakest forces in nature are manifested in thunder. Her monarch energies are silent and subdued. They saw wood and say nothing. And I know of no more accurate criterion of a great and noble mind than that silent confidence, that unflinching faith in its own rectitude, that in the midst of the hostile multitude maintains with perfect serenity the independence of solitude, and conscious of the fitness of its purposes, presses on to their achievement and leaves the vindication of the event to time.

Reputed by his own party, standing as it were between the devil and the deep sea, that is between hostile republicans on the one hand and offended democrats on the other, Mr. Cleveland has been the target for the most bitter and vindictive criticism. A character not made of granite would have been obliterated long ago. But like Milton's Abdiel, he stood before the storm, unmoved, unshaken, unswayed, untrifled. Nor number nor example with him wrought to swerve from his path or change his constant mind. From that time forth he passed, in long way through hostile scorn, which he sustained superior, nor of violence feared aught.

There is that in Mr. Cleveland that reminds us of the granite strength, and at same time gentle winsomeness, of Mr. Lincoln. He had in him the unyielding rectitude of rocks, and at the same time the loving kindness of the wayward well. He had in him the tang and fiber of primal things. He will endure. His place in history, though not as large nor as luminous as that of Washington, or Jefferson, or Lincoln, is nevertheless secure. As Webster, dying, said "I still live," so Mr. Cleveland, in taking leave of the world, might have done so with equal propriety and prophetic vision in the words of Horace: "Non omnia moriar"—"I shall not wholly perish."

Signaling Noon.
Most boys and girls know perhaps that the hour of noon is signaled every day to every part of the country by telegraph from the naval observatory at Washington. The custom originated, it is believed, at the Greenwich observatory in England, but our system is an improvement on theirs, says the Chicago News. At Greenwich a signal is sent out at noon, but at Washington a series of signals is used, beginning five minutes before noon. During these five minutes every tick of the observatory clock is electrically transmitted, except the twenty-ninth second of each minute, the last five seconds of the first four minutes and the last ten seconds of the fifth minute. After this final break of ten seconds the exact noon signal is given. The object of the series of signals is not only to indicate more clearly the instant of noon, but to enable the men at the various stations to regulate their clocks.

Diamonds Burn Like Coal.
The jeweler at closing time was putting his diamonds in a huge safe. "But why do you bother to do that when two watchmen walk the shop all night long?"
"On account of fire," the jeweler replied. "Diamonds are nothing but coal-carbon—they burn beautifully. Their hardness makes us think them indestructible, but as a matter of fact, a fire of diamonds would be the briskest, prettiest thing in the world."
"Put a handful of diamonds on a plate and set a light to them. They will burn with a hard, gemlike flame (it) nothing is left. There will be no smoke, no soot, and at the end the plate will be as clean as though just washed—not the slightest particle even of ash will remain."
