STREET PAVING CONTRACT.

Work Begins Sept. 5; Laying Bitulithic to Start Oct. 15.

All Monday afternoon was occupied by the special committee of the city council, consisting of Councilmen Josephson, Micell and Worthington, and W. L. Archambeau, representing the Warren Construction Co., arranging the details of the contract for 18 blocks of street paving to be done in Roseburg this fall.

The work is to be commenced some time the coming week, the contract specifying that a rock crusher, etc., is to be on the ground not later than Saturday, Sept. 5th.

It will require several weeks to put the curbs, drainage pipes, etc., in place before the street surfacing can be put on, and it is probable that October 15th is as soon as the bitulithic plant could be used, even were it now here.

The 18 blocks to be paved are laid out in seven separate sections with a separate contract for each. In general specifications they are identical, however.

PAVING CONTRACT.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this ... day of August, 1908, by and between the City of Roseburg, Oregon, a municipal corporation, party of the first part, and Warren Construction Company, a corporation, organized under the laws of the State of Washington, and authorized to do business in the State of Oregon, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH: That Whereas, by virtue of the action of the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Roseburg, bids have been heretofore received by the Mayor and Common Council of said City of Roseburg, for work and materials hereinafter contracted for, and said bid of the party of the second part having been accepted by the party of the first part, as hereinafter set forth, and a resolution having been passed by the Common Council of the City of Roseburg that the contract for said work and materials be awarded to the party of the second part, upon the terms hereinafter set forth;

WHEREAS, in pursuance of said action the contract has been awarded by the Mayor and Common Council of the party of the first part to the party of the second part for furnishing said work and materials and doing the work of excavating, filling, paving, curbing, constructing catch basins and other work on Jackson Street in said City of Roseburg, Oregon, as provided in the plans and specifications for said improvement, now on file in the office of the City Recorder of Roseburg, Oregon, a copy of which specifications is hereto attached and made a part of this contract, which said work is to be done as hereinafter provided for, and upon the following terms, to-wit:

On Jackson Street from the North line of Lane Street to the North line of Douglas Street in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, said contract awarded being for the following materials and for the following prices, namely:

- Grading, per cubic yard ... \$.75
Bitulithic Paving, with crushed rock base, per square yard ... \$ 2.34
Concrete Curbing, per linear foot ... \$.53
Catch basins, each ... \$10.00
Inlets for Drains, each ... \$17.50
Sewer Pipe Drains:
12-inch Pipe, per linear foot ... \$ 1.00
10-inch Pipe, per linear foot ... \$.80
8-inch Pipe, per linear foot ... \$.63
4-inch Sub-Drains, per linear foot ... \$.21
Street Monuments, each ... \$ 6.75

The above prices include all the furnishing of all necessary materials, labor and implements and the performance of the whole of the work herein set forth, and for the faithful compliance of each and every one of the requirements of the agreements and for the well and faithful compliance of the same and of the whole thereof in the manner set forth and described in the plans and specifications on file in the City Recorder's office of the City of Roseburg, Oregon.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, the party of the second part, does hereby covenant and agree to furnish all materials and to do all the work above

mentioned in a first class, substantial and workmanlike manner, and for the prices above stated, and in conformity with the plans and specifications above referred to, and the terms and conditions therein, and in consideration of the covenants and agreements herein mentioned to be performed by the second party, the party of the first part hereby agrees to pay to the party of the second part the prices for said work and material as hereinbefore set out, at the times as hereinafter stated.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED, That the work shall commence within ten days after the signing of this contract, that a rock crusher shall be installed at Roseburg by September 5th, 1908, and a paving plant installed at Roseburg, not later than the 15th day of October, 1908, and that the party of the second part shall complete all of the work to be done under the contract, on or before the first day of August, 1909; and

IT IS HEREBY AGREED, That if the work is not completed at that time, the City may deduct from the amount due the contractor the sum of Twenty Five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for each and every day that the work remains unfinished after that day, which said sum of Twenty Five (\$25.00) Dollars per day is hereby agreed upon by the parties hereto as fixed and liquidated damages that the City will suffer by reason of the failure of the party of the second part to complete the work within the time agreed upon.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED, That no allowance will be made for extra work of any kind, unless such work shall have been ordered in writing by the Mayor and Common Council of said City.

If the contractor fails to pay the men employed upon the work, or for material used therein, the Engineer may deduct from the payments due said party of the second part, the amount necessary to pay such claims for labor and material.

The party of the second part shall not be entitled to damages on account of delay, but if such delay is occasioned by the party of the first part, then the second party shall be entitled to an extension of time in which to complete the work, to be determined by the Engineer of said party of the first part.

The party of the second part shall take all necessary precautions to prevent accidents and shall indemnify and save harmless the City from all suits or actions brought against the City for or on account of any injuries received or damages sustained in the construction of said work, or due to negligence in guarding the same.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED, That the party of the second part shall not be allowed to assign any part of the work or of this contract, or the money due under this contract, without the written consent of the Mayor and Common Council of said City.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, The said party of the first part has, by resolution duly passed, caused this contract to be signed in duplicate by its Mayor and City Recorder, and the party of the second part has, by resolution of its Board of Directors duly passed, caused this contract to be subscribed in duplicate, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed by its Vice-President, this day and year first above written.

ONE MAN DOES IT ALL. 11 Stages Held up in Yellowstone Park in One Day.

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., Aug. 24.—The greatest stage hold-up in the west in many years, at least in the number of coaches held up, occurred today within the boundaries of the Yellowstone Park. The work was done by a lone highwayman, and the passengers were absolutely helpless in his hands, as no guns are permitted in the park to either drivers or tourists.

In all it is estimated from the statement of passengers, that something like \$2000 in cash was obtained, drafts worth \$10,000, other papers and transportation, besides a rich haul in watches and jewelry.

In all eleven coaches were held up and 125 people robbed. Soldiers started in pursuit of the bandit, while the late victims held a mass meeting and passed resolutions condemning bitterly the government for its failure to afford protection to tourists in the park.

THE SPREAD OF SOCIALISM.

In the September American Magazine Ernest Poole writes an interesting and interesting article which he calls "Harnessing Socialism." It is not a dry discussion of the principles of Socialism, but a graphic description of the workings of the organization which is making Socialism popular in this country. Following are the facts about the growth of Socialism:

"When a political party has won the support of twenty millions of people throughout the civilized world it is time that its point of view, its aims and its methods be studied. The Socialist parties of Europe are now minority powers. At present they have 32 men in the British House of Commons, 54 in the French Chamber of Deputies and 43 in the German Reichstag; in the other national bodies: Austria, 87; Italy, 25; Norway, 17; Sweden, 15; Finland, 80; Denmark, 24; Belgium, 20, and to the Russian Second Duma they sent over 50 men. Their actual vote in all countries is already ten millions.

"Is the same growth to take place in America? Shall we see Socialist representatives in Congress as in the House of Commons? Their recent growth seems pointing that way. In 1888 they cast only about 2900 votes; by 1900 it had swelled to over 100,000; in 1902 it rose to 229,762; in 1904 it reached nearly 450,000; in the last four years the number of dues-paying members has more than doubled again, and it seems not improbable that their vote will be close to a million this fall."
