Series of Big Developments For Southern Oregon

BIG MEETING FOR ROSEBURG

About Sep. 22—Railroad Across Oregon and Automobile Road to Coos Bay Proposed

A great campaign for the development and advertising of western and southwestern Oregon has just been closed at Coos Bay, in which Governor Chamberlain, Judge Lowell, Oswald West, B. W. Johnson, of Corvallis; Judge John H. Scott, of Marion county; Dr. Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, and the officers of the Willamette Valley Development league took prominent part, says the Salem Journal.

Meetings were held by the Willamette Valley league at Corvallis, Albany, Eugene, Cottage Grove and Roseburg, and a two-day session of the Oregon-Idaho Development congress was held at Marshfield, under the auspices of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, assisted by the North Bend Chamber of Commerce, and a permanent organization formed.

At all these meetings the following lines of promotion work were taken up and organized and pushed by able men, and the work will be kept up with meetings each month, the first to be held at Roseburg, about the 25th of September:

Western Oregon Development Program.

Opening of Deep-Sea Harbor at Coos Bay and Dredging Inside Harbor.

Promotion of steam and electric railroad to Coos Bay.

State highway construction through western Oregon.

Automobile road from Roseburg to Coos Bay, via Myrtle Point.

State-aided railway from Ontario to Coos Bay.

Opening of western Oregon harbors at Siuslaw, Winchester, Yaquina and Tillamook.

Opening the locks and canal at Oregon City so that Coos Bay could be brought up the Willamette Valley by water.

Breaking up the large wagon road land grants across this state and opening them to settlement.

Enactment of a new water code and general port commission law to develop harbors.

This is a big program, but the determination of the men back of it is to fight for big results and put the whole state back of the campaign.

Coos Bay Alive to the Cause.

The Coos Bay Congress was planned and backed by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, one of the live commercial organizations of Oregon, which has launched the biggest publicity campaign ever started for that section by the organization of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress.

This congress is a child of necessity and its purpose is to blaze the way for the development of southern, central and southwestern Oregon and southern Idaho.

The need of railway transportation for this vast area, the breaking up of immense tracts of land, the utilization of a deep-sea harbor are among the many objects to be achieved.

In order to bring about these results it is deemed necessary that a series of meetings be held, both in western and eastern Oregon and southern Idaho and to that end the president will correspond in the near future, outlining plans in detail.

The next big western Oregon booster congress is to be held at Roseburg the latter part of September, at which time plans will be perfected for construction of a high-class automobile road from that city to Coos Bay, which will run in connection with the Coos Bay and Eastern railroad, making close connections at Myrtle Point, and shortening the time from the Willamette Valley to Marshfield from 24 hours of neck-breaking staging to six hours of comfortable traveling.

Report of Organization Committee.
We, your committee on permanent organization, beg to report as follows:

We recommend that this organization be made permanent.

That it be known as Oregon-Idaho Development Congress.

That the officers be one president and two vice-presidents from each of the states of Oregon and Idaho.

One secretary and one assistant from each of states of Oregon and Idaho.

One treasurer from Oregon and one assistant from Idaho.

An executive committee, consisting of the president as chairman and two assistants from each of the two states, Oregon and Idaho.

For officers, we recommend as follows:

SHORTAGE CAUSES MURDER.

Deficit of \$100,000 in Havana P. O. Brings Bloodshed.

HAVANA, Sept. 1.—The whole provincial government is in an uproar today as the result of the discovery of the theft of over \$100,000 in the local postoffice.

The discovery was made when an inventory of the stamps, envelopes and other material was taken. The detectives are searching for Ricardo Rodriguez, chief of the supply bureau, who disappeared when the theft became known.

Colonel Charles Hernandez is postmaster-general, and he said today that every effort would be made to discover the thief.

Growing out of the postoffice scandal, Manuel Elias, editor of El Vigilante, of Manzanillo, was shot dead yesterday afternoon by Manuel Estrada, editor of El Reporter, of the same city. Estrada, who is an independent, considered he had been insulted in a political editorial written by Elias, who is a conservative. The coroner's jury held Estrada to answer on a charge of murder.

Give Industrial Education As Well as Intellectual.

By ANDREW S. DRAPER, New York State Superintendent of Education.

DO not the programmes of the schools and the influences of the teachers often lead boys who might make excellent cabinetmakers into being poor lawyers and induce girls who might be first rate dressmakers to become third rate music teachers?

A MECHANIC WHO HAS REAL SKILL AND IS PROUD OF IT IS LIKELY TO BE A BETTER MAN AND A MORE RELIABLE CITIZEN THAN IS AN INDIFFERENT PROFESSIONAL MAN.

I think that the present organization and tendency of the school system, acting upon the national temperament, LEAD MANY INTO OCCUPATIONS WHICH ARE ALREADY OVERCROWDED AND FOR WHICH THEY ARE NOT BEST ADAPTED and that our prevailing educational scheme gives some favor to intellectual as against industrial occupations. This is in violation of our fundamental political principles.

I am for restoring the equality of opportunity, for giving the mechanical pursuits as full equivalent as we can for the training that we are providing for the intellectual pursuits and for avoiding any course which tends to make misfits in life. I have said nothing inconsistent with this.

I WOULD BE UN-AMERICAN IF I BELIEVED IN "CLASSES" OR HAD ANY DISPOSITION TO KEEP CHILDREN IN A "CLASS." IT IS NOT A QUESTION OF "CLASSES," BUT OF EFFICIENCY AND THEREFORE OF HAPPINESS IN OCCUPATIONS, AND WHAT I AM URGING IS THAT THE SCHOOLS SHALL NOT BE EXCLUSIVE IN ANY SENSE, BUT SHALL BE AS MUCH CONCERNED ABOUT INDUSTRIAL AS ABOUT INTELLECTUAL EDUCATION.

HOME FROM CAMP PERRY.

Oregon Rifle Team Advanced Four Places Over Last Year.

Capt. Geo. E. Houck and Major F. B. Hamlin reached home this morning from the annual shoot of the National Guardsmen, U. S. Army and Navy teams at Camp Perry, Ohio.

They report a fine trip and that the Oregon team made an excellent showing. This team, one-half of which were made up of members of Co. D, O. N. G., of Roseburg, made a score in the team shoots giving them 13th place among all the 50 teams contesting, and sixth among all the national guardsmen's teams, the first seven places being won by the U. S. regular and marines. In last year's shoot the Oregon team stood 17th and the year prior to that they were 21st. The Oregon men have now gained the reputation of being one of the strong rifle teams of the nation and gained more attention this year than ever before.

They were in competition with the best riflemen of the United States—which means the best in the world. This should induce Oregon people to give better encouragement than ever to our state's rifle team.

Dr. Houck tells us there are a great many people travelling on the trains at this time and that nearly every town of consequence on this coast is circulating literature in the east. He found Medford and Albany booklets in the buffet cars, but saw none from Roseburg. Los Angeles and southern California were well represented with attractive literature.

Business conditions east are still quiet, not yet having recovered from the panic of last fall. The depression there was far greater than it was in Oregon and the resumption of normal conditions is much slower.

Messrs. Shields and Ferguson, of the rifle team, are returning via the Canadian route, while A. Q. Johnson and E. G. Stewart and wife will visit with relatives in various states before coming home.

In the individual and trophy shoots Oregon men won several medals and about \$100 of the prize money offered.

BOY WAS ELECTROCUTED.

PORTLAND, Sept. 1.—John Bates, a 16-year-old boy in the employ of the Aldon Candy company of this city, after suffering a horrible agony for several minutes on the third floor fire escape of the company's building at Twelfth and Glisan streets shortly after noon today, died before any one could reach him to offer assistance. An unprotected electric feed wire, heavily charged, was the cause of the young fellow's death.

Word to that effect has been sent to Alex Sweek, chairman of the democratic state central committee.

Owing to the fact that it has not yet been determined whether Mr. Bell will reach Oregon from the north or the south it is not possible at this time to fix the places for the different meetings. It has been decided, however, that one of the addresses will be made in eastern Oregon. As soon as it can be found whether Mr. Bell will come to Oregon direct from California or will reach the state from the north, definite announcement will be made as to the places for the different meetings.

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PROSPERITY PLACARDS.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 31.—There was made public today correspondence wherein John W. Kern, the democratic nominee for vice president, sought and obtained from D. M. Parry, ex-president of the National Association of Manufacturers and a prominent republican, an expression of opinion hostile to the posting of "prosperity" placards in factories to the effect that "on the day after the election of Taft and Sherman this mill will start up full force."

Kern asked Parry: "In the light of the fact that the present high tariff has not maintained prosperity, I would like to ask whether the posting of these placards does not savor of trying to obtain money under false pretenses?"

Parry replied that he was not in sympathy with such abuse of the power of the employer; that it is poor business policy to promise to run a factory on full time in the event of any election; that the business relation was quite beyond the power of political parties to control; that he could not bring himself to post such placards despite republicanism, and declares:

"I am no more in sympathy with the statement that Bryan is the enemy of industry than I do the statement that Taft is the creature of the trusts," and said the recent poll of the manufacturers' associations of the country had shown a majority of the members in favor of a revision of the tariff.

Train Hits Working Crew.

CHICAGO, Sept. 2.—One man was killed and two fatally hurt today, when an elevated train struck a gang of workmen, who ran in front of it to escape another train. One man was hurled fifty feet in the air and killed instantly.

Fatality at a Fire.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 2.—Private property to the value of \$40,000 and a city fire house was gutted by a double fire this morning. J. Magdoli, a Greek, was run over by a horse cart and probably hurt. Originating in the basement of the building occupied by the S. Ennis Brown produce company, the fire spread to the Sun Tent and Awning Company's establishment and then to three other wholesale houses. Meanwhile a fire started in an engine house two blocks away, causing considerable delay before the first fire was fought.

STORM'S HARVEST

140 Lives Lost off English Coast Monday

CALAMITY IN SWISS TYROL

Avalanches Destroy Life and Villages—Day's Record of Tragedies and Mysteries

LONDON, Sept. 2.—Reports coming in today show that 140 lives were lost during the terrible storm that swept the western coast of England last Monday. A large number of schooners and fishing boats were swamped, and it is feared the loss of life, when all reports are in, will total over 200.

Tyrol Devastated.

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 2.—Heavy loss of life and the destruction of several villages in Swiss Tyrol are reported as the result of an avalanche of floods, caused by an unexpected thaw in the mountains. Heavy deposits of ice were loosened and intensified the force of the floods. So far 40 persons are known to be dead. A party of eight English tourists, who have been missing since Monday, are believed to have perished also.

Four Men Suffocated.

BOSTON, Sept. 2.—Four men are dead today as the result of breathing fumes from burning pitch in the forepeak of the British bark Puritan, in the harbor here. The men were sent into the forepeak yesterday to store away sail. Meanwhile a fire started from spontaneous combustion and the men never came out again.

Murder or Suicide?

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 2.—Mystery surrounds the death of Dr. Frederick Rustin, a prominent physician of this city, who was found lying inside the front door of his residence by his wife today, with a bullet wound in his stomach. The police think it a case of murder; so does the widow, but other relatives incline to the idea of suicide. It is said the doctor was despondent from loss of practice, due to habitual drunkenness.

This One Suicided.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 2.—F. A. Kegley, proprietor of the Bee Hive store at Georgetown, a suburb of this city, committed suicide early today by shooting himself in the head. Family troubles are supposed to be the cause of the act.

Probably Murdered.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 2.—No progress has been made by the police toward unravelling the mystery surrounding the finding of a woman's decapitated body on the shore of Lake Washington, near Juanita, yesterday. The body shows evidence of murder. Identification is impossible on account of the decomposed condition of the remains. The only marks of identification are a set of gold teeth and a wealth of hair, streaked with gray.

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TO BEAUTIFY THE CITY.

Ladies' Club to Adorn Depot Grounds—Place for Fountain.

At a meeting of the ladies' Mental Culture Club Tuesday afternoon the matter of a location for the new drinking fountain recently purchased was again taken up. After discussion the consensus of opinion favored the placing of the fountain at the center of the square at the junction of Jackson and Cass streets. In order to do this it would be necessary to amend the city charter, for as the law now stands the city council is forbidden to place any permanent obstruction in any street. As the city charter can only be changed by a vote of the people it is not probable that it will be done in this instance. The Club, realizing this, suggest as a second choice the location of the fountain at the curbing of the street at the corner of Jackson and Cass streets, next to corner occupied by C. B. Cannon's real estate office opposite the L. O. O. F. temple. That would be a good location, but a proposition to place the fountain in the center of any street would doubtless be strenuously opposed.

In relation to beautifying the S. P. depot grounds, permission has been granted the ladies' club to plant flowers and shrubbery in all that part of the grounds from the new exhibit building south to Lane street and between the main track and Sheridan street, leaving a broad passage way on the south side of the exhibit building, which structure is now nearing completion. The matter of removing the granite now occupying that part of the depot platform has been taken up with the railroad company and just as soon as that is decided the ladies will begin planting the flowers, etc.

This work of the ladies in advancing these movements for the beautification of our city is highly commendable, and coming as it does in conjunction with the street paving work which is to begin in a few days, shows that the active spirit of advancement is thoroughly permeating all elements of our population. With such unanimity of action Roseburg is bound to soon become a much larger and more beautiful city.

BEER SHIPMENT RULING.

Authorities of "Dry" State Cannot Stop Delivery to Consignee.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 1.—In restraining the Birmingham city authorities from interfering with shipments of beer into that city, Judge Thomas C. Jones, of the United States court, today held that the shipment was an interstate shipment until it reached the purchaser.

The Lemp Brewing Company made a shipment, which was held at the express office, the city judge holding that the interstate haul ended at the depot and that it was unlawful to deliver it by transfer wagon to the place of consignment.

Judge Jones holds that such is not the case and that a transfer company as well as the express company is within the national statute on interstate orders.

WORKING ON TILLAMOOK R. R.

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 1.—Construction work on the Lytle road, from Ellensburg to Tillamook, was resumed this morning. Operations will be continued steadily until the road is completed, which is believed will be accomplished by June, 1915. There will be no further delays in building this railroad and contractors were notified yesterday to assemble their construction crews and take up the work where they left off.

Three million dollars will be spent in completing the project. Over \$1,000,000 has been spent already on the road. Construction tools and machinery for driving tunnels and grading are on the ground and workmen are in close touch with contractors so that actual operations will be commenced today. So much in earnest is Mr. Lytle, president of the road, that work will be continued all winter, so that the line may be completed as soon as possible.

SAME OLD RESULT

Vermont Goes Republican in State Election

PARTY MAJORITY 29,000

Gov. Warner, of Michigan, Beaten For Renomination—Heyburn Not For the People

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, Vt., Sept. 2.—Almost complete returns from the state election yesterday gives Vermont to the republicans by slightly over 29,000 majority. George H. Prouty is the successful republican candidate for governor. The Independence League polled over 1,000 votes.

This year's republican majority is about 2,000 less than that of four years ago.

How Bryan Views It.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 2.—Wm. J. Bryan said today that he did not know how the republican victory in Vermont could be considered a barometer of the coming national election. "Personally," he said, "I am unable to see how it has any effect, as the presidential campaign has just opened."

Mr. Bryan declined to discuss the showing made by the Independence League. He left today for Sioux City, Iowa, where he speaks tonight.

Gov. Warner Beaten.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 2.—With 300 districts yet to hear from, the result of yesterday's primaries in Michigan indicate that Auditor General Bradley has won the republican nomination for governor over Governor Warner by a majority of 3,900.

Heyburn Makes Bad Break.

BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 2.—At its second day's session here today the republican state convention was thrown into consternation by United States Senator Heyburn, who was renominated yesterday and who declared today that he is opposed to the direct primary system and the election of United States senators by a direct vote of the people.

A movement is on foot to defeat Congressman French for re-nomination.

Prohl's Nominate.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Sept. 2.—Rev. George E. Stockwell, of Fort Plain, was today nominated for governor by the prohibition state convention.

GRANTS PASS GROWING.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Sept. 1.—The prediction that Grants Pass would become a "dead town" within three months after the closing of the saloons has proved an erroneous prophecy. The city has gone forward with remarkable strides, both in a business and general development way. There are a score or more of fine residences under construction, and a new three-story brick hotel has just been started. Besides these, other brick business houses are under construction. Merchants report an increase of business over corresponding months in years past. The rooms that were vacated by the saloons have been refitted and are occupied by other lines of business. The most noticeable feature is the general improvement of the homes of laborers and workmen who patronized the liquor-selling places, but who are now using their money for better purposes.
