PROMINENT MEN COMING.

They Will Address Roseburg Audiences During Coming Winter.

Gov. J. Frank Hanley, of Indiana; Ople Read, the widely known author and entertainer, and Sylvester A. Long, the noted lecturer, will each address Roseburg audiences during the coming winter. In connection with this lecture course is "The Artist Trio" of musicians, both vocal and instrumental. These four star attractions will come here under contract with the Roseburg Commercial Club, who have taken up the matter upon request of the ladies' Mental Culture Club and the Roseburg High School.

As Roseburg has no regular theatre, the bringing of such high class speakers and entertainers here is deemed especially appropriate at this time and such a course is likely to be made a permanent feature during each succeeding winter, with a change of speakers and entertainers each year.

The coming lectures, etc., will very probably be held in the Armory and season tickets will be sold at reasonable figures to defray the necessary expense. The schedule of dates has not yet been fixed, but we understand that the first attraction will appear at some time in November, and one each in December, January and February.

The public will be fully advised later as to the exact date and the subjects to be heard. The public in general, as well as all local organizations and churches are invited to co-operate in this movement for bringing to our city some of the best talent in the whole United States.

TWO GREAT PARADES.

Spanish War Veterans in Boston and G. A. R. in Toledo.

BOSTON, Sept. 2.—Admirals of the navy, generals of the army, many bands and thousands of blue and khaki-clad heroes of the war with Spain participated in today's parade, the crowning feature of the national encampment of United Spanish War Veterans. The buildings along the line of march were brilliantly decorated and thousands of Bostonians and visitors witnessed the inspiring spectacle. Prior to the important business session of the encampment was held this morning. This afternoon all the state and regimental bodies will hold reunions and this evening a grand campfire will be held in Mechanic's Hall.

In today's parade, special divisions were assigned to the men who took part in especially valorous exploits, including Hobbs' men, the survivors of the Maine, the tars who took part in the battle of Manila, and the heroes of San Juan Hill. In addition to the veterans in the parade there were big detachments of regulars from the forts in Boston harbor, marines and sailors from the navy yard and a large complement of Massachusetts volunteer militia.

Boys in Blue March.

TOLEDO, O., Sept. 2.—To the music of many bands and the lusty cheers of thousands of spectators, the boys in blue of the Grand Army marched through the elaborately decorated streets of Toledo today. Many distinguished men reviewed the procession.

This evening there will be a great electric display, covering a distance of four miles, on the Maumee river. A pyrotechnic display of Sheridan's ride will also be shown tonight and tomorrow night. Two hundred troops will be required to produce the spectacle. The sessions of the national encampment will begin tomorrow.
