The SPORTING WORLD

Keeler Has Made Over 2,500 Hits.
Willie Keeler, right fielder of the New York Americans, is the only man playing baseball today who has made over 2,500 hits since becoming a big leaguer. Hans Wagner of the Pittsburghs and Nap Lajoie of the Clevelanders have but recently passed the

2,000 mark, but Keeler did that several years ago, he having made close to 2,000 now. In fact, it is safe to say that he has bunted safely close to 1,000 times.

For eight consecutive years he has made over 200 hits each season, registering 243 one campaign. While he is not the same old Keeler of a few years ago, he still has hopes of remaining in the league until he has made 3,000 hits.

New Baseball League Likely.

In all probability the Tri-state league will be a thing of the past after this year and a new league formed of the pick of the clubs that draw the best crowds in the Tri-state and New York State leagues. Several of the Tri-state clubs draw well and others not enough after May to pay the guarantee, so the former are getting tired of carrying the latter along and want to form an organization that will make money. It is possible that the ineligibility of many Tri-state players might interfere with such a proposition, but it is believed the national commission will lift the ban for the good of the cause if nothing more than extending it to the new league. Altoona, Johnstown, Harrisburg, Lancaster, Wilkesbarre, Scranton, Syracuse and Binghamton is one circuit talked about, and another is Harrisburg, Lancaster, Reading, Wilkesbarre, Trenton, Wilmington, Scranton and Binghamton.

New Wrestling Giant Coming.

Ernst Siegfried, a new kind of wrestler, who is described as the champion of Germany, is about to come to these shores. He is hunting for glory, not money, and he hopes to scalp Frank Gotch. He will arrive in the latter part of August and will be under the management of Ernest Roeder, the former Greco-Roman champion. Now, if Mr. Siegfried's press agent is to be believed "many regard him as even superior to George Hackenschmidt," and George has been afraid of him for years, for "he repeatedly challenged Hackenschmidt, whom he agreed to throw twice in an hour, and Hack refused to pay any attention to the German champion's def." Hack, however, is only a "Pussian Lion," while Siegfried is six feet three inches tall and when in condition weighs 252 pounds.

Munroe's Good Fortune.

Jack Munroe, the former fighter, who got a big reputation by knocking down Jim Jeffries in an exhibition bout and who was knocked out in a few punches when he faced the boiler-maker in a real fight, is rapidly becoming a millionaire. Munroe was lost sight of after he quit the ring, but he has spent the time since then to good purpose. Munroe got the gold fever when the metal was discovered in the Ontario fields of Canada. Munroe went to the gold country, staked a claim and now has possession of one of the best paying mines in the district. He has already made a fortune, and the chances are that he will be a millionaire. So the punch that put him down and out proved to be a godsend.

Philadelphia Americans' New Pitcher.

The Philadelphia American league team recently made a deal with the Columbia (S. C.) team of the Southern league, by which Augustus Swine, the star south paw of the league, is to go to the Athletics. Swine has pitched to be \$750. Swine is still a very young pitcher, but is regarded as one of the best in the South Atlantic. He has done splendid work for the Columbia club. He recently pitched a no hit game, striking out seven men.

P. D. Gilbert, for many years a travelling grocery salesman in southern Oregon, has gone into the cigar manufacturing business.

A supply of the new edition of the Oregon mining laws has just been received at this office. It includes everything to date in legal mining procedure. Copies only 40 cents each.

One of the largest deer ever killed in this county was taken a few days ago by T. A. Findlay a few miles east of this city. It was a six-point buck and was killed near Roundtop, a well-known eminence on the watershed between Oak Creek and Deer Creek. Mr. Findlay tells us the animal weighed 158 pounds dressed, and with the head and hide removed. He says this deer had been known to have been ranging in that vicinity for some time, but he was so wary that even experienced hunters like W. L. Singleton and Dr. Miller were unable to bag him, although they always kept a close lookout when chasing coyotes in that vicinity. Mr. Findlay is very naturally quite proud of having killed this big deer, although he admits having fired ten shots before the game was finally brought down.
