### JUDGE BENSON DENIES.

Would Not Have Office—Says Frank is Back at Salem at Work.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Sept. 7.—When seen about the report that he was to succeed his brother as secretary of state, Judge H. L. Benson vigorously denied the statement, saying that he would not have the office of secretary of state or that of governor if it paid double the salary. He continued: "My brother Frank, the secretary, has not been in better health for 20 years than he is at this time. He is not suffering from a cancer, never has suffered from one, and is now at Salem in his office attending to his official duties.

"Frank has no intention of resigning, and the matter has never been discussed by us. We are not connected with any lineup on the United States senatorship, and so far as I am concerned I am absolutely done with politics. My only object in resigning was to get into the practice of law and to get away from holding public office. I am tired of office. I want to get into legal work in order to make money. There is nothing in holding office." Judge Benson and his associate, C. F. Stone, now have their law office open, and the judge says he can already see clients and fat fees coming his way. He has let a contract for a new residence in this city and is making all arrangements to continue to reside in Klamath Falls.

### MILT MILLER SLATED.

CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—National Committeeman M. A. Miller of Oregon, has reached here from the west. It is generally regarded that Mr. Miller will be made vice-chairman of the national committee, and placed in charge of the western headquarters, which likely will be established in Portland, Or.

### MEYER'S STRONG BOX STOLEN.

Domestic Troubles of Salem Family Again Brought to Notice.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 7.—A darling express robbery in which a package containing notes and other valuable papers representing over \$50,000 belonging to Joseph Meyers, of this city, again brings to public notice the internal troubles of the Meyers family. It recalls the fight made by his sons to prevent his recent marriage in Portland to Mrs. Zenalde Du Rette, and to control the old man's fortune.

Upon the request of Mr. Meyers, J. H. Albert, president of the Capital National Bank, of Salem, forwarded the former's strong box to him at Portland in care of the Portland Hotel. The package was entrusted to the Wells Fargo Express company here for transmission to Portland on the afternoon of August 21. It arrived in Portland that night at 11:30 o'clock.

Stolen From Express Company. The package never reached Mr. Meyers at his Portland address, and it has just been learned that it was stolen from the express company on the night of August 21, or the early morning of August 22. The circumstances of the daring theft are such that it is believed that unknown persons entered the express office at the Portland Union Depot, where the package was left over night, and carried it away.

The strong box contained, among other valuable packages and jewelry, three notes executed by Henry W. and Milton L. Meyers to Joseph Meyers of a total value of \$52,600.

### BRYAN'S MAN LOSES.

Dahlmann Falls of Democratic Nomination for Governor.

OMAHA, Sept. 7.—Practically complete returns from the state-wide primaries are now in, and show that A. C. Shallenberger, of Alma, leads Mayor James C. Dahlmann, of Omaha, by about 2000 votes, with Berge, the Populist candidate, third in the race for the democratic nomination. Complete tabulated returns from 75 counties, with almost complete returns from the other counties, show the following vote on governor: Shallenberger, 12,304; Dahlmann, 10,256; Berge, 9759.

Mayor Dahlmann has given up the contest which he proposed making against Populist votes cast for Shallenberger, and says he will support the nominee.

Dahlmann was the so-called Bryan candidate and made his campaign on a strictly anti-prohibition plank.

### HARNEY COUNTY TRAGEDY.

Spaniard Killed by Shepherder Who He Had Thrashed.

BURNS, Or., Sept. 7.—The first murder on the Harney county border for two years took place on Stein Mountain, in a sheep camp, when John C. Midland shot and killed a Spaniard named Lorenzo P. Ramos, after a quarrel in which the Spaniard whipped Midland. The original dispute transpired a few days before the killing over the mixing of the two bands of sheep and culminated in a fist fight.

Midland went 15 miles to a store in Diamond Valley, where he bought a Colt's revolver. While there he remarked that he was getting ready to kill Ramos if he got into any more trouble with him. On returning to camp he met Ramos and shot him three times. There were no eye-witnesses to the shooting, but the coroner's jury took the testimony of men who had heard Midland's threats, and he was lodged in the county jail without bail to await the action of the grand jury at the fall term of court.

Ramos had no gun at the time of the shooting, but Midland claims he shot in self-defense, Ramos coming at him with a club.
