THE "PEOPLE SHALL RULE." Enemy of Reform Beaten in New York for Re-Nomination.

ITHACA, N. Y., Sept. 8.—State Senator Owen Cassidy was defeated or renomination today on account of his vote against the anti-race track setting bills at the last session of the legislature. Ex-Assimbleman B. Conger, of Tompkins county, who is a prominent churchman and supporter of Governor Hughes, received the nomination in the senatorial district convention here by 15 votes to 10 for Cassidy, who had the support only of his own county, three other counties being against him. Cassidy says he will now run as an independent candidate. A few weeks ago Cassidy felt certain of re-nomination. One of the county delegations which were against him today was instructed for him at the time it was chosen. The renominations, however, became convinced Cassidy could not be elected, if nominated because of his vote on the racing bills, and several days ago this instruction was recalled.

KIOWA OUT-GROWING.

DAWSON, Y. T., Sept. 8.—The Kiowak's output this year will be increased \$2,000,000 over that of last year, making a total of \$5,000,000 this year. The increase is due to the installation of new dredges, electrical conveyors and hydraulic plants. The output will be greatly increased next year, and the Kiowak soon will be yielding by a big process as much annually as in its palmy days. The only difference is that the corporations are getting the bulk of the gold instead of the individual miners, yet many individuals are still employed.

Until last year it has never been possible to ascertain the net addition to the population by immigration, and the result is surprising to the department of commerce and labor. During the fiscal year the total immigration was 924,000, while the outward movement, the alien immigration was 715,000. The latter figure is based on the assumption that the emigration for June figures for which are not entirely at hand, was about equal to the previous month. Deducting the alien immigration from the alien immigration for the year leaves a net increase of 209,000. Secretary Strauss said recently that all official figures of the department of the previous years, when considered in respect to the addition to the population by immigration, must be reduced from 30 to 75 per cent.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—Three suspects, whose identity is being guarded carefully, were arrested today in connection with the most brutal assault ever known in the police history of this city.
