LOOKS GOOD FOR BRYAN.

Indiana, Illinois and Kansas Loom up Strongly for Him.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Sept. 10.—A vast assemblage of Hoosier democrats gathered in Evansville today to greet their national standard-bearer, William J. Bryan, who will deliver one of the most important addresses of his present tour in this city.

That he will get the electoral votes of Illinois and Indiana, Mr. Bryan apparently has no misgivings whatever. He has ascertained to his satisfaction that the national quarrels of the past in his own party in those states have been settled and that the democracy is thoroughly united for the first time in 12 years.

Persons who travelled with Mr. Bryan were surprised to learn of the strength of Adlai Stevenson, the democratic nominee for governor of Illinois, and of Thomas R. Marshall, the democratic gubernatorial candidate in Indiana.

The democratic standard-bearer is very hopeful of carrying Indiana, Illinois and Kansas. Indeed, it may be said he is convinced of his lead today in those states over Judge Taft.

SMITH TRANSFERS TIMBER.

Linn and Lane County Secure 50,000 Acres, Valued at \$1,000,000.

ALBANY, Or., Sept. 9.—The vast Linn county timber holdings of C. A. Smith, of Minneapolis, were all transferred today to the Linn and Lane Timber Company, organized in Hennepin county, Minn.

The land embraces all of the old holdings of Frederick A. Krebs, of Portland, and some additional land later acquired by the Smith interests with scrip.

The Smith holdings were all choice timber land, and some sections are unexcelled in the world. A large portion of this land runs from 10,000,000 to 12,000,000 feet of timber to the quarter section.

Should the Vice President Step Down to the Cabinet?

IF Mr. Bryan should be elected and should invite the vice president to sit as a member of the cabinet, the fact would be accomplished if the latter accepted the invitation. NO LEGISLATION WOULD BE REQUIRED. In fact, no legislation could require the president to receive the vice president as a member of his cabinet, and no legislation could compel the vice president to serve as a member of the cabinet.

The president can invite the vice president to sit at his council board if he wishes to do so, and the vice president could accept or decline at will. It is scarcely possible, however, that such an invitation will ever be extended to a vice president or that any vice president would accept the invitation if tendered.

IT WOULD BE NOT ONLY A STEP DOWN, BUT MANY STEPS DOWN, for a vice president to become a member of the president's cabinet. From the vice president, a constitutional officer, the president of the senate and standing next in succession to the president of the United States, it is a far cry to a seat in a cabinet, the members of which, as such, have literally no power save that approved by the president, who can, furthermore, at any moment remove any one of them upon any whim or caprice.

I THINK IT UNFORTUNATE THAT UNDER OUR SYSTEM THE CABINET HAS NOT GREATER POWER AND THE PRESIDENT LESS, BUT THE FACT IS AS I HAVE STATED IT.

Aside from the consideration mentioned, the constitutional duties of the vice president in presiding over the senate are engrossing during the sessions of congress, and he would have no time to attend cabinet meetings or to attend to other duties devolving upon cabinet officers.

The republican convention will be held Monday. Secretary of State Elihu Root will preside as temporary chairman, and Joseph H. Choate, former ambassador to Great Britain, will be the permanent chairman.

Among the gubernatorial possibilities mentioned, in case the convention should sidetrack Hughes, are James M. Wadsworth, Jr., speaker of the assembly; Jacob Gould Schuman, president of Cornell University; Congressman Payne, chairman of the House committee on ways and means and State Senator Horace White, of Syracuse.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 10.—Newspaper publicity as a cure for drunkenness has been successfully tried in Oklahoma City, and the new method of reforming habitual sinners may become a worthy rival of the Salvation Army tactics and the gold cure.

Recently a reporter for a local paper discovered a sad case of drunkenness, a worthy mother and her children being ill, starving and on the point of being evicted from the hotel they called home. Investigation of the case showed that the recent husband and father, a big, strong, expolice-man, had for months failed to contribute to the support of his family, spending all his time and money carousing in low saloons.

Appealing for aid for the mother and little ones, the newspaper published on its first page, under a scare-head, a scathing denunciation of the drunken head of the impoverished family. There was no mincing of words, and the man was held up to public ridicule as a worthless fellow unfit to associate with decent human beings.

Instead of calling on the editor with a gun, the newspaper publicity had the effect of sobering the drunkard. He began to see a great light. The spectacle of his family dependent on public charity aroused his latent pride. He called on the editor and with tears in his eyes promised to turn over a new leaf. Then he donned his working clothes and went out to hunt a job.
