GOMPERS STIRS SOCIALISTS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—That the attack on Socialism recently made by President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, is to be repeated by William J. Bryan in the address to be delivered by the Nebraskan in this city a week from today, is a rumor that has been circulated here, apparently with some basis of authority. As a result, the Socialists of the city are up in arms and may decide, if the report proves true, to hold an opposition meeting.

The criticisms of Gompers, in which he intimated that the money to pay for the "red special" tour of Eugene V. Debs was furnished by capitalists, have aroused much indignation in labor circles. It is declared that Gompers willfully resorted to falsehood in order to help Bryan and injure the Socialist cause among workmen.

Socialists declare that the "red special" is by no means the "luxurious palace train" of Mr. Gompers' imagination and that the \$20,000 necessary to cover the expenses of the 10,000 mile tour is being raised by small contributions of the workmen. All such contributions are made public by the national secretary at stated intervals, and the largest sum appearing in the report was \$200.

FEWER JAPS COMING.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—According to official figures made public by Secretary of Commerce and Labor Strauss today, the tide of immigration from Japan has been checked until it is now but one-third of what it was a year ago. Japanese immigration for the fiscal year 1907 was 30,000, including the Japanese who went to Honolulu. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908, immigration from Japan was 18,000, of which 9,500 came to the mainland of the United States.

The bureau of immigration has estimated that 5718 Japanese left the United States for Japan and other countries, leaving the net increase for the year but 3800. Of that increase but 15 per cent are laborers.

Chamberlain and will be, at his suggestion, exhibited at the Oregon State fair at Salem as a Coos Bay product.

The office set, which consists of a desk, desk chair, a table and six office chairs were manufactured by the North Bend Manufacturing Company and are of fir, dark finished.
