## NEW MALADY IN STYLE.

"Summer Neck"—Have You Caught This Disease Yet?  
"Summer neck ache" is the latest disease.

Have you a pain in the left side of your neck and in your left shoulder? If so, you are suffering from a fashionable epidemic.

Case after case has been treated by doctors.

"It has been suggested to me by many of my friends who are suffering from it that it is rheumatism," writes one sufferer. "Now, rheumatism is, unfortunately, common enough, but an epidemic of rheumatism always located in one particular portion of the body is most singular."

"I might almost be contagious, but I believe it has been definitely established that the malady is not caused by bacteria and therefore cannot be communicated from one victim to another."

An eminent specialist when consulted in regard to the matter said:

"I have noticed it myself and have had several people to treat for it. My personal friends have spoken to me about it, and, worst of all, I have had it myself just recently. Certainly it is rheumatism."

"On the face of it, it is very puzzling, but I think the explanation really is simple. People are learning more and more the advantage of sleeping with their windows open. Now, every one naturally lies on the right side, because that position is most favorable to the heart and rests it most. If the weather is hot when bed is sought, the first thing that happens is that the clothes are thrown back as soon as sleep comes on."

"Consequently the left shoulder is exposed to the cold air of the small hours and gets thoroughly chilled. The result is this epidemic of a noninfectious ailment—rheumatism—and that is why in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred it appears in the left side of the neck and the left shoulder."

"People should not sleep with closed windows, but they should take care that no portion of the body is exposed to chills."

## PLANNING NEW CENSUS.

Director North Preparing to Count the American People.

It will cost \$1,500,000 more to take the census of 1910 than that of eight years ago, on account of the increased number of men, women and children, estimated at 25,000,000 persons, but the work will be far better done, which is one of the notable advantages of such a permanent bureau organization as the United States has maintained since 1900, aside from the valuable vital statistical work it has been accomplishing in the meantime every day. The director of the census, S. N. D. North, has made his arrangements for enumerating the population two years hence, and, notwithstanding the increased and varied information that will be gathered, he confidently estimates the cost at only \$14,000,000. This estimate will be submitted to congress at the next session, as Mr. North desires the appropriation in a lump sum, so that all arrangements for the taking of the census may be completed without any worry about money.

Besides the count of the population, there will be a census of agriculture that will cost about \$2,000,000. That census has been urged by farmers' institutes, grangers' societies, agriculture and live stock associations all over the country.

The results of the thirteenth census will be published in not more than seven volumes—three less than were required in 1900.

## SHARED CAKES WITH BEAR.

Lost Child Cried When Taken Away From Frightened Bruin.

Not heeding a warning not to wander far, ten-year-old Maggie Fanning of Chicago, who with her mother is visiting relatives near Farnwood, Sullivan county, N. Y., was lost in the woods the other day. When found she was sitting on a log feeding a half grown bear with cakes from a paper bag.

At the approach of the searching party the bear fled, and the child cried because they had scared it away. The little girl said she had walked a long way, picking and eating huckleberries, and at last became tired and sat down on a log to eat her cakes when the bear, which she thought was a dog, came out of the brush, and she handed it a cake. This was followed by other cakes until the whole dozen had disappeared. Then she said she was about to follow her doggie to his home, where she knew there would be people who would take her home.

The child had been gone five hours.

## CLEANING A CLOCK.

It is Not Very Difficult, According to These Directions.

It is very simple to clean a clock, which may sound rather absurd. For an amateur it is not always necessary to take the clock to pieces. With a little care and patience and using some benzine, a clean white rag, a sable brush and some oil a clock can be cleaned and put in first class running order. The benzine should be clean and free from oil. You can test benzine by putting a little on the back of the hand. If it is good, it will dry off, leaving the hand quite clean, but if any grease remains on the hand it is not fit to use.

The oil should be of the very best that can be procured. Vegetable oils should never be used. Clock oil can be procured from your druggist or jeweler.

All loose dirt should be removed from the works by blowing with bellows or a fan or dusting with a dry brush. In the latter case great care should be exercised not to injure any of the parts.

Drop the brush in the benzine and clean the spindles and spindle holes and the teeth of the escapement wheel. After washing a part wipe the brush on the rag and rinse in the benzine. This should be repeated frequently until no more dirt is seen.

When the clock has dried off the spindle holes carefully. This may be done with a toothpick or a silver of wood cut to a fine point. Oil the tooth of the escapement wheel slightly, using a fine brush.—Popular Mechanics.

## LOWESTOFT CHINA.

Story of a Factory Whose Products Are Now Highly Prized.

At the end of the North parade, Lowestoft, is the Warren House, a place of great interest to connoisseurs of china. It was here, in the eighteenth century, that a discovery of fine clay was made which eventually led to Lowestoft manufacturing the china which is now so rare that it is almost priceless.

Initial experiments made by Hewlin Luson, Esq., of Ganton Park, near Lowestoft, with some fine clay discovered accidentally on his estate resulted in complete success and ultimately led to the opening of a factory at Lowestoft in 1750 for the manufacture of fine earthenware and porcelain "soft paste."

In 1775 a finely glazed and decorated "hard paste" was introduced, the efficiency and beauty of which betokened a brilliant success for the proprietors. Contemporary evidence indisputably shows that from 1770 to 1800 the Lowestoft works were at the zenith of their fame. Owing, however, to the enormous expenses and difficulty incurred in procuring china clay from Cornwall and elsewhere (after the original clay was exhausted) and the rapidly increasing competition of other makers its prosperity waned, the collapse came, and the works were closed in 1803.—London Globe.
