DEBS HERE MONDAY

"Red Special" Arrives at 7 A.M.
Stays 30 Minutes

CANDIDATE WILL SPEAK

Supreme Effort of Socialist Party to
Equal Largest Populist Vote
1,000,000

The famous "Red Special," carrying Eugene V. Debs, socialist candidate for president of the United States, and his crew of party spellbinders and literature distributors on a campaign tour of the country, will arrive at Roseburg from the south next Monday morning at 7 o'clock. The train will remain here only 30 minutes, and during that time Mr. Debs will make a speech and distribute handshakes among a large number of his local followers, who will be at the depot to greet him. The program at each stop also calls for the handing out of campaign pamphlets and the rendition of a concert by a band which the "special" is carrying. It is apparent, however, that the brief time to be spent here will permit of little more than a few remarks by Mr. Debs and the exchange of personal greetings.

Regarding the "Special," a circular mailed to us from the National Socialist Headquarters in Chicago contains the following information regarding the "Red Special":

The train is to travel 20,000 miles, crossing the continent twice in the greatest effort the Socialist party has ever made to win votes from the opposition.

It is an extraordinary attempt to attract the attention of the wage earners to the Socialist movement, to capture the government and operate it in the interest of those who produce the wealth.

Eugene V. Debs, a locomotive fireman, and Socialist candidate for president, will make the entire trip and will deliver an address in every scheduled city. The Volunteer Band, composed of the most prominent band men in 15 cities, will give a concert.

Others in the party are A. M. Simmons, editor of the Chicago Daily Socialist and delegate to the International Labor Congress at Stuttgart, Germany; A. H. Floaten, Socialist speaker and store keeper, who was deported from Telluride, Colo., because he gave credit to striking miners; and Harry C. Parker, president of the Philadelphia Trades Association, a labor organization.

The train has four cars, one of which is loaded with Socialist literature. There were 2,000,000 pieces when the train left Chicago. The western trip will be 10,000 miles approximately. After it is completed, Mr. Debs and his party will go east, stopping at Boston, New York, Philadelphia and 185 other towns and cities.

The trip will end in St. Louis the week before election with a big labor and Socialist celebration. The Socialists hope to equal the largest Populist vote, which was a million.

"WHITE PLAGUE" CONGRESS.

Meets in Washington This Month—
War on Visitation, Too.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 12.—Startling figures as to the spread of the "white plague" will be presented at the International Congress on Tuberculosis which is to meet in Washington this month.

"Every 36 minutes there is a death from consumption in the state of New York," is the remarkable statement which will appear on one of the charts to be shown in the New York section of the exhibition, which will be a feature of the congress.

For more than 20 years scientists have claimed that tuberculosis is not only not hereditary, but that it is curable in the early stages, and most important of all, that it is preventable, perhaps more so than any other germ disease.

It is for the purpose of disseminating germ free information of the means and methods of combatting this dreaded scourge that the congress has been called.

Each exhibit will be made up of maps, charts, diagrams, models of well-lighted and ventilated factories, together with models of sweat shop work rooms, and dark, poorly ventilated bed rooms where the consumption germ finds an excellent breeding place. Pictures of dispensaries, hospitals, and sanatoria where consumptives are treated, radiographs and photographs of healthy and diseased lungs will be shown.

The anti-visitationists, headed by Thomas Nelson Page, the novelist, are preparing to urge upon the coming session of congress the passage of a bill prohibiting or regulating the cutting up of live animals in the District of Columbia "in the interests of science." The bill is to serve as a model for similar action to be pushed in the various states by branches of the Anti-Visitation Society.

That dogs rounded up for the pound have been turned over to medical students for experimental purposes, and that they have been subjected to cruel tortures, oftentimes without the administration of an anesthetic, is freely charged by the leaders of the society here.

"It is the absolute uselessness of the infliction of the suffering upon the helpless animals," today said Mrs. Mary H. Totten, one of the officers of the Society, "that is the strongest argument against vivisection and try as they may, its advocates cannot adduce a single instance wherein it has proved of assistance in discoveries which have augmented medical science."

"In the heart massage experiments being conducted at one of the Washington hospitals, in the course of which rabbits are tied down to the operating tables and cut to pieces while agony racks their bodies until at last merciful death comes relieving them, the results, by the words of the surgeons themselves, can prove nothing."

"A rabbit dies under the knife, but the surgeon is delighted and says: 'It had been a human being the experiment would have succeeded.' The utter folly of it! If they can learn nothing or prove nothing by the experiments, as this statement would seem to admit, why do they do it?"

COLT SHOW AT DRAIN.

Best Exhibition of Blooded Stock
Ever Seen in North Douglas.

DRAIN, Or., Sept. 12.—A fine exhibition was made here today of blooded colts sired by "Volage," the imported stallion owned by the Drain Percheron Horse Co. About 25 fine colts were on exhibition. The first prize was awarded to the colt of a mare owned by John Hendrick; the second to one owned by Ben Watkins; and the third to one owned by Joel Tracy. The prizes were \$20, \$10 and \$5, respectively, and all paid in cash. The judges were H. F. Deardorff and H. R. Manning, of Oakland, and James Hawley, of Divide. They pronounced this the best exhibition of colts ever shown in this part of the state and there was a widespread public interest in the event. This was the second annual show held under direction of the Drain Percheron Horse Co., which organization has aroused a decided interest in good horses throughout the northern part of Douglas county. 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STEAMERS COLLIDE

Good Conduct of Crews Prevent
Loss of Life at Seattle

FATAL VAULT EXPLOSION

Chauffeur Drags Rich Widow Who
Goes Out For Ride—Girl's Ambli-
tion Costs Two Lives

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 12.—The steamer Chippewa, bound for Victoria, crashed into the steamer Sentinel, bound in from Bainbridge Island, this morning. The Sentinel was badly crippled and began to take water immediately. Fire broke out on her, but it was extinguished just as the vessel was beached at West Seattle. Her passengers were rescued in life boats lowered from the Chippewa.

The Chippewa carried 500 passengers and the impact of the collision threw many of them from their feet. Pandemonium reigned on both steamers, and the crews had hard work preventing a number of women from leaping overboard. Captain McAlpine of the Chippewa and Captain Hendrickson of the Sentinel both declare they did not see each other in time to avoid the collision. The Chippewa was sounding its whistle every 15 seconds.

Fatal Gas Explosion.
CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 12.—Miss Etta Oaks, aged 20 years, and George Frost, aged 16 years, were fatally burned and five other persons were seriously injured by the explosion of gas today in the offices of the Wall Advertising Machine Company. Gas had collected in the vault during last night and when a match was struck inside of it this morning an explosion instantly followed.

A Frisco Sensation.
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—Mrs. J. M. Lawrence, aged 25 years, widow of a Los Angeles millionaire and a guest at the Fairmont Hotel, was found unconscious on a sand dune outside Golden Gate park early this morning. At the emergency hospital Mrs. Lawrence told a sensational story of having been dragged by the chauffeur of an automobile which she engaged last night for a ride to the beach. She said the chauffeur brought a drink at a casino where they stopped and that after drinking she lost consciousness and was rolled in the vault during last night and when a match was struck inside of it this morning an explosion instantly followed.

Parents Quarrel and Die.
MUSKOGEE, Mich., Sept. 12.—The instance of Minnie Cooper, an 18-year-old girl, upon having an education has resulted in the death of her parents. Mr. and Mrs. Fitch Cooper. The father objected to the girl entering high school, demanding that she go to work. Mrs. Cooper took the opposite stand, and in the quarrel Cooper killed his wife with a pistol and then committed suicide.

Stand-Patters Fight Cummins.
DES MOINES, Iowa, Sept. 11.—Governor Cummins will not secure the nomination for the United States senatorship at the November primary without a fight. A call was sent out tonight for 500 leading standpatters to meet in Des Moines next Tuesday to plan the beginning of the war on Mr. Cummins, and a factional fight, the greatest in the history of the party in Iowa, is almost certain to be inaugurated.

The most prominent standpatter mentioned as a candidate against Mr. Cummins is ex-Governor Jackson. Mr. Jackson, when the "army of unemployed" entered Iowa a number of years ago, called out the state militia to protect the property of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad in and about Council Bluffs. At that time the democrats made much of it. Mr. Jackson refused a renomination and he is now at the head of an insurance company which has had headquarters at Des Moines.

May Get Jackson to Run.
Mr. Jackson stated to a committee of standpatters which asked him to be a candidate that he did not care to enter into politics again. He was assured, however, that it was decided to call a conference of the republicans of the state who were opposed to Mr. Cummins to meet in Des Moines Thursday of next week to decide what candidate standpatters should support.

This decision also has been reached by another faction of standpatters headed by "Laf" Young, editor of the Des Moines Capital.
