Five thousand British soldiers, 2,000 sailors and 2,000 marines under General Ross and Admiral Cockburn, took part in the attack on Baltimore. Many of the troops had been with the Duke of Wellington in his victories over Napoleon's armies in Spain and were styled "Wellington's Invincibles."

It was this victory and the sight of "Old Glory" floating over Fort Mifflin, after the terrific bombardment to which it was subjected the following night, that inspired Francis Scott Key to compose the American national anthem, the "Star Spangled Banner."

TO PETITION LEGISLATURE.

County School Superintendents Ask Change in Funding System.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 11.—The conference of School Superintendents of the several counties of Oregon closed this afternoon. The most important matters brought before the convention were the raising and apportioning of school funds.

TO ASK LEGISLATURE FOR RELIEF.

The State Teachers' Association committee took the position that some plan should be devised whereby the irreducible state school fund could be enlarged sufficiently so that it, together with the county fund, would insure not less than six months of school for each district in the state.

They proposed that the legislature be asked to provide two forms of relief: First, a temporary relief to be placed in the state school fund for each year and a portion of the funds now raised through indirect taxation, the amount to be gradually diminished as the permanent fund increased.

Change in Dividing Funds.

The committee also recommended a change in the basis of apportionment of school funds in proportion to the number of teachers employed and to the daily attendance of the pupils in the school.

AIRSHIP LINE PLANNED.

Machines Will Make Round Trip From Africa to London in Twelve Days. An airship fleet with accommodations rivaling those of the finest modern steamships will shortly be operating between Pretoria and London.

The announcement of the enterprise contained in a recent issue of the Transvaal Weekly, which says that some of the most influential men in South Africa are financially interested and which gives details regarding the plans, quoting Mr. Heinze, a German engineer and the inventor of the airship that the company is to use.

Mr. Heinze states that as the result of years of study and experiment he has evolved an airship that can be controlled in all sorts of weather and steered as easily as a motor car.

"The movements and soaring of the machine will be in every way similar to those of birds, and it will respond readily to the rudder and elevation control," he says.
