"DRYS" ON DEFENSE

Resubmission of Prohibition Issue in Maine

ELECTION BEING HELD TODAY

Determined Effort to Put State Into "Wet" Column, After Staying "Dry" For 50 Years

Republican Plank.
Resolved, that the prohibition of the liquor traffic by law has become one of the established principles of the republican party in Maine and should be maintained and made effective. We demand the enforcement of the Prohibition law and will not tolerate its nullification.

Democratic Plank.
We believe that the state suffers both morally and materially by the continuation of the sumptuary law of prohibition.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Sept. 14.—Whether the prohibition law which has been on the statute books of Maine for half a century, shall be resubmitted to a vote of the people, is the principal issue before the voters of the state today. Incidentally, they will elect a governor, state auditor, members of the state legislature and county officers, but interest in the success of parties or individuals has been overshadowed by the prohibition issue. The democrats have declared against prohibition, and on a platform demanding resubmission, the party apparently has a better chance of success in today's battle of ballots than at any time since the war.

The nominee for governor of the republicans, Bert M. Fernald, of Poland, was nominated after a bitter contest. Mr. Fernald was a "stand patter" on the prohibition issue, and he won out in the convention. The contest has left sore places.

The democratic candidate for governor is Obadiah Gardner, a farmer, who for ten years has been the master of the Patrons of Husbandry of Maine and prominent in the national councils of that order. He is called a good business man, is an excellent public speaker and has a personal acquaintance with thousands of the farmers in every section of the state. He is extremely popular with the patrons, which has a membership in the state of 55,000. It is declared that many of the republican farmers will vote for him. The democratic state platform declares in favor of resubmission and demands the repeal of the Sturgis enforcement act.

Since 1832 the republicans have carried the state, except in 1906, by pluralities ranging over 20,000, the high water mark being reached in 1896, when the late Representative Llewellyn Powers was elected governor by a plurality of 48,246 in a total vote of 123,516.

Election in Arkansas.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 14.—An election for state officers is being held today in Arkansas. The democratic ticket, headed by George W. Donaghey, is certain of victory.

The next state administration is pledged to the support of an initiative and referendum act, and Mr. Donaghey has announced that soon as he is inducted into office he will call upon the legislature to allow the people to vote on this question as soon as possible.

State Game Warden Holds It Unlawful to Hunt Deer.

In reply to an inquiry as to whether it is lawful to hunt and pursue deer with dogs during the open season, State Game Warden R. O. Stevenson, of Forest Grove, has sent the following ruling to all deputy game wardens:

"As the impression that it is lawful to kill deer pursued by dogs during the open season, has gone forth, I wish to state that in accordance with an opinion rendered by the Attorney General, it is unlawful to kill deer pursued by dogs, at any time of the year, and that the law in regard to the same will be rigidly enforced."
