## TAUNTS RESENTED

**Strike Breaker Fatally Shoots  
Picket at Winnipeg**

## STRIKERS' MOB DISPERSED

**Crooked Bank Cashier Held for Trial  
—Boy Accidentally Suicides  
With 22 Rifle**

WINNIPEG, Canada, Sept. 15.—Daniel Hepner, a Canadian Pacific strike breaker, shot and probably fatally wounded Robert Kirk, a strike picket, last night. Kirk jeered and taunted Hepner for being a "scab" and Hepner shot him. Hepner surrendered himself to the police.  
This morning a mob of several hundred strikers marched to the Canadian Pacific shops, intent on overhauling the strike breakers there, but were dispersed by a large force of police.

**Cashier Under Bonds.**  
TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 15.—R. F. Parkhurst, former cashier of the First National bank of Seattle, charged with embezzlement of \$48,000 of the bank's funds, plead not guilty when arraigned in court today. He was bound over for trial at Seattle, with bail fixed at \$12,000. Parkhurst said he had made good the shortage, but that he expected to be prosecuted anyway.

**Hurt by Oil Explosion.**  
SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 15.—While filling the tanks of a fishing schooner at the Standard Oil docks today, three men were terribly burned as the result of an explosion.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Sept. 12.—James Staples, Fred O'Neal and another man, who left here on a trial trip in a launch last Friday, have not yet returned. It is believed they are either drowned or marooned.

**Boy, Gun, Usual Result.**  
OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 15.—The body of Arthur Meyer, a 13-year-old boy, was found yesterday inside the gate at his home near this city. By his side lay a 22-calibre rifle, and there was a bullet hole ranging from his mouth into his head. Accidental suicide is the explanation generally accepted.

**Methodist Assembling.**  
TACOMA, Sept. 15.—An advance delegation of 175 pastors and laymen were in attendance when the 25th annual conference of the Puget Sound district of the Methodist church was called this morning. The conference will formally open tomorrow.

## SELLS INTEREST IN STORE.

**Z. N. Agee Shortly to Take Road for Portland Firm.**

Z. N. Agee, successor to C. B. Cannon, today sold a one-half interest in his book, stationery and soft drink store to Ross Goodman and Roy Roadman, both of this city, each taking a one-fourth interest in the establishment. The deal is effective on the 21st of this month. In the meantime, however, Messrs. Goodman and Roadman are working in the store to familiarize themselves with the business as early as possible.

Mr. Goodman is a son of J. T. Goodman, proprietor of the Roseleaf Cigar Store, and Mr. Roadman has been employed as a salesman in I. Abraham's dry goods store for some time past. They will become sole managers of the store after October 1, on which day Mr. Agee will begin work as a travelling salesman for Glass & Prudhomme, of Portland, wholesale stationers and blank book manufacturers.

Mr. Agee will probably be assigned to the state of Montana by Glass & Prudhomme, although this has not been definitely decided upon. The firm makes a specialty of supplies for county administrations, and Mr. Agee is fully qualified to handle such goods by reason of his four years' experience as county clerk. Mr. Gus Taylor, another ex-clerk of this county, travelled for Glass & Prudhomme for a number of years, resigning only a short time ago to enter the office of Secretary of State F. W. Benson, still another ex-county clerk of Douglas.

## COMMERCIAL CLUB

**Again Takes Up Fruit Cannery Movement**

## FOR DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

**Exhibit Building Almost Ready and Fine Products are Being Received —Other Clubs**

Proceeding the regular monthly meeting of the Roseburg Commercial Club Monday evening, the board of trustees held a brief session to consider matters pertaining to the new Club headquarters in the Kohlhaugen block. The new quarters should be ready for occupancy in a few weeks as the building is now under roof and about ready for the plasterers.

**Location for Fountain.**  
Among the business transacted at the Club meeting was the appointment of a committee to prepare a petition to the city council asking for a vote at the coming special bond election on amending the city charter so as to permit the ladies to place the new city fountain in the street crossing at the intersection of Main and Cass streets, between the I. O. O. F. building and the Episcopal church property. This action will doubtless meet with favorable consideration both by the city council and by the voters. This location has finally been decided upon by the ladies who purchased this fountain and generously donated it to the city.

**For a Fruit Cannery.**  
Establishment of a fruit cannery at Roseburg was discussed at considerable length and concluded by appointing C. B. Cannon as a special committee to correspond with some "known cannerymen with a view to having them locate in this city. A vast amount of fruit, etc., goes to waste each year in this county for lack of suitable canning facilities and a determined effort will be made to have a cannery erected here in time for next season's crop.

**To Invite Ad. Men.**  
In reply to a communication from the Portland Ad. Men's Club, a committee consisting of W. H. Fisher, C. B. Cannon and A. Wollenberg was named to invite the Ad. Men to hold a session in Roseburg in the near future.

**A Demonstration Train.**  
A letter from S. P. Co. officials to L. B. Moore, their local agent, was read, announcing their purpose to run a special "Demonstration Train" through western Oregon in the near future provided there is sufficient local interest shown in regard to the matter. A similar train has been run over their lines in eastern Oregon and Washington and much good resulted. This train is run without expense to the points visited and carries skilled demonstrators from the Agricultural College and elsewhere to give lectures and show the best practical methods in dairying, fruit growing, diversified farming, etc. A complete list as near as practicable, of names and addresses of persons interested in these lines, is asked for by the railway, presumably for the purpose of inviting their attention to this matter and possibly supplying them with some literature. W. H. Richardson was authorized to supply as complete a list as possible from the assessment rolls and elsewhere, to be paid by the Club for the actual labor involved in compilation. This matter should appeal to every producer and business man and the railroad company urged to bring such train here at some date within the next few weeks.

**To Form Local Clubs.**  
In order to make the boosting of Douglas county more united and general, W. H. Richardson, E. B. Penagra and L. Wimberly were named as a committee to invite other towns in the county to organize commercial clubs to co-operate in advertising their respective localities abroad and thus help boost the entire county.

**New Exhibit Building.**  
Work on the new permanent exhibit building at the S. P. depot is nearing completion and the building will probably be ready for occupancy some time next week. Assistant Secretary Zurcher is now getting together a good nucleus for an exhibit of Douglas county products therein and is ready to receive all that may be sent in. Those will be duly labeled and put in place, as soon as the building is opened, and may there be inspected by the hundreds of travelers passing through here every day on the regular trains.

**Mr. Barzee's Contribution.**  
So far the largest contribution to the Commercial Club's exhibit is that brought in this morning by Attorney Louis Barzee, from his garden in Riverside addition. This included corn in the stalk, Hubbard squashes, a sunflower nearly 15 inches in diameter, a pie pumpkin weighing between 30 and 40 pounds, fine tomatoes and Hackensack muskmelons. The corn is remarkable in

that it was grown on land that this year produced a crop of potatoes which were sold at five cents per pound. This corn was cut just 57 days after planting and had attained the remarkable height of eight feet, although not yet having tasseled or set with any shoots or ears of corn. Mr. Barzee has had remarkable success with his crop of muskmelons this season, a total of only two-thirds of an acre producing fully 9000 melons. He gathered 475 at one picking and 690 at another, during the height of the harvesting season. He is still bringing them to market by the wagon load.

## SIGNS POINT BRYANWARD.

**Strong in South, Middle West and East, Say Reports.**

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—Three reports at headquarters today gave satisfaction to the democratic leaders. One was from Chairman Mack, and it had reference to his recent visit to New York.

"I am exceedingly well pleased with the eastern situation," he said. "In all my experience I have never seen New York democrats so united for the ticket. There is not a discordant element. While in New York I received calls from every well known democratic leader, and without exception they expressed the opinion that Mr. Bryan will carry New York in November. The report received at the same time from Connecticut, New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware, and West Virginia, were equally encouraging.

Another report of the same tenor was from Frank Howell, of Georgia. "This talk of Taft carrying Georgia and other southern states is all nonsense," he said. "Mr. Bryan is just as popular in the south as he ever was. He will not only receive the electoral vote of that section, but his majorities will be fully as large as in former years."

If the election in Ohio should occur today, the state would give Bryan and Kern, a majority of 50,000 and possibly 100,000 was the statement of Chairman Finney, of the state democratic committee. "A number of reasons are contributing to the Ohio opposition to Mr. Taft," he continued. "The labor vote is practically solid for Bryan. When Governor Hughes and Senator Beveridge spoke to 10,000 workers from the steel plants the other day, a three days holiday was arranged. The men were marched to the speaking in uniform and asked to cheer for Taft. Instead, they cheered for Bryan lustily, with a few exceptions."

## TO SURVEY LAND GRANT.

**C. & O. Engineer to Have Charge of Land Opening.**

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 14.—G. W. Rice, of the chief engineer's department, Chesapeake & Ohio railroad, has been appointed chief engineer of the Oregon Valley Land company's large project in southern Oregon east of the Cascades, where during the next 12 months the company will cut 300,000 acres of grant lands into a plat containing 11,992 farms, and will install an irrigation system to furnish water to about 60,000 acres of land in the Goose Lake valley. "New buildings are going up all over Lakeview, and yet it is impossible to rent a house at any price," Mr. Rice said to a Journal reporter. "The new \$50,000 courthouse for Lake county is nearly completed and is a fine building, built entirely out of the county's surplus. The people over there in Lake county seem to know nothing about the money panic of last year, excepting through the newspapers."

Regarding the railroad surveys that are now being carried on in that part of Oregon, Mr. Rice spoke with the assurance of a railroad engineer who knows from outward signs that actual railroad construction is intended. He said:

"From the care taken in the surveys and the low grades established, I am thoroughly convinced that the line from Redding, Cal., up the Pitt river to the Goose Lake valley, and on north to a connection with the Oregon Eastern, will be built soon by the Harriman lines, and will become their through line from San Francisco to Portland and to the east. All this is having a strong influence on property values in Lake and Harney counties. Unimproved lands in the vicinity of Lakeview are held as high as \$125 per acre, and lots in a new addition to the town are selling at \$200 to \$300 per lot."

The company's irrigation project in the Goose Lake valley is estimated to cost about \$250,000. The project will secure water from Cottonwood river and draws river, on both of which streams ideal reservoir sites have been secured. The Cottonwood reservoir will require a dam 90 feet high and 1100 feet long. There will be eight miles of main canal leading into the valley, and between this canal and the reservoir a section canal will have a width of two miles long and a depth of 4 feet, bringing the water through the canyon. The Cottonwood reservoir will, it is said, furnish ample water for the company's lands, and draws river will be held in reserve for future development.

## WINSTON DRIER BURNED.

Fire early this morning totally destroyed W. C. Winston's prune drier, on his place at Winston, seven miles south of here. The drier was valued at about \$1,000, but the actual loss to Mr. Winston is far heavier owing to the fact that the prune drying season has just opened. There is no insurance. The drier was one of the largest in the county, having a capacity of 350 bushels.

## OREGON HAS THE CASH.

**Statement of State Treasurer Shows Over \$200,000 on Hand.**

SALEM, Or., Sept. 14.—A cash statement for the eight months ending August 31 has been issued by the state treasurer. It shows the condition of the treasury to be as follows: Cash on hand Jan. 1, 1908, \$116,537.08; receipts from state tax, interest on tax, fees from department of state and income from inheritance and corporation tax, \$1,075,442. Disbursements, including warrants for current expenses and transfers to library fund, \$871,574.49. Total cash on hand Aug. 31, 1908, \$203,868.40. Cash on hand in irrevocable school fund Jan. 1, \$293,281.60; receipts from payments on sales of lands, mortgages and district bonds and escheated estates total, \$916,548.56. Disbursements, including school district bond purchases, warrants and loans, \$349,824.56.

Of the income from the irrevocable school fund, cash on hand Aug. 31, was \$17,655.72. Cash on hand in the Agricultural college fund, \$1,846.96. Income from agricultural college fund, \$2,526.77. The university fund was \$795.47, and the income \$4,019.62. Cash on hand in the funds for special purposes, \$842,942.87.

## BIG LOSS BY FIRE

**Huge Section of Saco, Maine, in Ashes—600 Homeless**

## 85 TENEMENT HOUSES BURN

**Hill's Proposed Route Through Oregon Traversed by J. B. Colgate, N. Y. Banker**

SACO, Maine, Sept. 15.—The worst fire in Maine since the \$1,000,000 disaster at Portland, early today wiped out a large section of this city, entailing a loss of \$500,000. Six hundred people are rendered homeless by the destruction of 85 tenement houses. It is estimated that 9,000,000 feet of lumber were destroyed. The fire had made great headway before it was discovered.

## May be Hill's Backer.

MEDFORD, Or., Sept. 15.—The arrival here of John B. Colgate, the New York banker, has started a rumor that he is looking over the proposed route of the Great Northern Railroad through central Oregon with a view of advancing money to James J. Hill. Notwithstanding that Colgate denies that his visit has anything to do with the project, he has just completed a trip in an automobile over the route recently traversed by John Porter, Hill's chief railroad builder.

## As Harriman Saw the West.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—E. H. Harriman arrived here today from Oregon. He refused to discuss the rumor regarding the formation of a new holding company for the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads. Regarding the political situation he said he found a general apathy in the west and that there was danger in it for the republicans.
