OREGON NEWS

Oregon's greetings are due the great state of Washington. With three of Oregon's sons already on her supreme bench, that commonwealth has called another into that exalted position. In Tuesday primary election, Judge Stephen J. Chadwick, of Coitas, was given the non-partisan nomination, which is equivalent to an election. Though a democrat, he led the judicial ticket, receiving 339 plurality, or 23 per cent more votes than his leading competitor. The result is in line with two former instances in Judge Chadwick's career, in each of which he was elected superior judge in a district overwhelmingly republican, without opposition. The other sons of Oregon on the supreme bench of Washington are Wallace Mount, R. O. Dunbar and Mark Fullerton. The boyhood of all, including Judge Chadwick, was spent in Marion county. Judge Chadwick is a son of the late Governor Chadwick of Oregon, who succeeded to the executive office on the election of Governor Grover as United States senator in the latter 70's.

Marshfield Times: L. J. Simpson, of North Bend, has secured a franchise from the county court for the use of the public highway between Pony Slough and Sunset Bay for an electric line. It was unofficially stated today that the matter had been closed up and that Mr. Simpson would begin the construction of the line next spring. It is understood to be Mr. Simpson's idea to convert Sunset Bay into a great pleasure resort. It is one of the most beautiful spots along the coast and he has extensive holdings there. He has built an elegant summer home called "Shore Acres" there. Construction work on the line between North Bend and Pony Slough was started some time ago so that the two will connect up, making a direct line from Coos Bay at North Bend to the new pleasure ground.

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Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Parozzo, of this city, had the misfortune to lose their infant son, Doyle, by death, Monday evening, Sept. 14, at Ruckles, where they have been employed in Geo. H. Pitts' prune orchard. Death was due to pneumonia. The child was aged 2 months and 10 days. The funeral will be held at the Catholic church in this city sometime tomorrow, with services conducted by Rev. Father W. F. McGee. Besides its parents, the infant is survived by a brother and sister.

ALBANY, Or., Sept. 14.—J. P. O'Brien and his party of railroad men now inspecting Southern Pacific lines in Oregon are planning a trip across the Cascade mountains on the old survey of the Corvallis & Eastern, according to advices received in this city. They will arrive here tomorrow or Wednesday and will proceed by train to Detroit, eastern terminus of the Corvallis & Eastern, where pack animals will be in waiting to convey the party over the survey.

The trip is believed to be an investigation of the feasibility of extension of the Corvallis & Eastern into Central Oregon.

AID TO NEW U. OF O. STUDENTS.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 13.—The Y. M. C. A. of the University of Oregon has devised a novel and effective method for assisting new university students to find boarding and rooming places. They will erect a large tent near the depot where headquarters will be established and full information kept in regard to all boarding houses. A large Oregon banner is to be placed above the entrance, and all of the assistants, of whom there will be 12 or 15, will also wear the Oregon colors. They expect all students to make the tent headquarters and to leave suitcases and parcels there until rooms are found. During the four or five days in which students are arriving in greatest numbers a sufficiently large number of helpers will be on hand to show them the best boarding houses. The number of rooms available this year, both for men and women, is much larger than usual.
