"The same situation exists when the motive power of the vehicle is furnished by an engine," he continued, "so that autoists and farmers are at one on the good roads question. It went to stockholders and employees and through them to the stores and farmers. The industry made possible by the users of automobiles meant a great deal to the farmers of Michigan, and it means as much to the farmers of many other states."

If any one of the three is poor, the machine is poor and ineffective. Only a small load can be drawn, and that slowly. We have been spending thousands of dollars building up the breed of horses and improving wagons and have allowed the roads to run down and offset our costly upbreeding. SCANDAL IN INDIAN SOCIETY.

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Sept. 17.—A scandal which has created a sensation in the best Indian society of Oklahoma, and which is still being discussed in whispers by the braves and squaws of the redskin "four hundred," was brought to light by a breach of promise suit recently filed here. Jacob S. Brown, a wealthy Creek Indian of the highest social standing in his tribe, and said to be worth \$150,000, is the defendant in the suit, which was brought by Mary D. Taylor, of Fort Smith.

The plaintiff is a comely woman of 34, of mixed Spanish, Arabian and Indian blood, and claims to be a descendant of Pocahontas. She became a mother last month and asserts that the platonic Creek is the father of her child. She asks \$50,000 damages from Brown for his failure
