## GETS ANOTHER RAP

Puget Sound Methodists Pay Respects to Cannon

## ENEMY TO PET MEASURE

Maniac Runs Amuck, Ending Two Lives With Crowbar—Happenings on the Coast

Special to the Evening Review. TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 22.—Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the national house of representatives, was given another rap by the Methodists today, when the Puget Sound conference, comprised of 200 ministers, pledged itself to a man to vote against any candidate for congress who refused to pledge his vote against the return of Cannon to the speaker's chair. In a resolution in which Cannon was severely denounced, the conference demanded a speaker who would encourage the passage of a bill prohibiting interstate shipment of liquors into prohibition territory.

Maniac Slays Two Persons. WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Sudden seizure with homicidal mania today, Andrew Lightfoot, a patient at the government hospital for the insane, today killed two persons with a crowbar and then escaped into a swamp, where he was shot in the leg and captured.

## Tells Double Story.

VALLEJO, Calif., Sept. 22.—Mrs. Harry Mangus, member of a well known Los Angeles family, was shot and killed at her home here today by Charles S. Riburg, a machinist at the Mare Island navy yards, who followed up the murder by blowing off the top of his head. There were no witnesses to the tragedy, which occurred shortly after the woman's husband left the house on his way to the island to work. Neighbors saw Riburg enter the house, and a few minutes later heard revolver shots. When the police investigated they found the woman dead with a bullet through her heart and Riburg by her side revolver in hand.

## Events at Sea.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 22.—The American ship St. Paul, which arrived here today from Cannery Port, reports the loss of two of her crew during a stormy passage. The two men were washed overboard.

The Merchants' Exchange has received word that the Star of Bengal, owned by the Alaska Packers' Association, loaded with salmon for San Francisco, is a total wreck on Coronation Island, near Wrangell.

## Immense Timber Deal.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Sept. 22.—To supply an immense combination mill to be erected on the South Bellingham waterfront, 120,000,000 feet of timber has been purchased on the hills of Lake Samish, by Kansas City capitalists from E. N. Salling, of Michigan. The price paid is \$250,000.

## Seattleites to Portland.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 22.—An excursion train bearing 103 members of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce left at noon today for Portland, where they will be given a reception tonight. The party intends to make a tour of the upper inland empire, including stops at Walla Walla, Lewiston, Spokane and Ellensburg.

## TWO TOWNS BURN.

Gagen and Woodboro, Wis., Destroyed—Field on Fire.

RHINELANDER, Wis., Sept. 21.—Gagen and Woodboro were destroyed by forest fires yesterday. Gagen and Woodboro each had about 2000 residents and nearly all are homeless. It was feared that Rhinelander, with its homes for 7,000 persons, was doomed also, but a change in the direction of the wind probably saved the city.

The town of Fifield, near Ashland, is afire, and the Minneapolis fire department is sending a special train. This is presumed to be a continuation of the forest fires.

## 1,500,000 UNEMPLOYED.

Great Britain Detailing Troops to Meet Starving Subjects.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Maddened by suffering, over 1,500,000 of Great Britain's unemployed have become little better than savages during the past few days and the authorities of the kingdom are at a loss for means with which to cope with a situation that daily becomes more menacing. Riots occur daily in all the larger cities. Public buildings have been stormed in several places by crowds of men and women demanding that the authorities furnish them with work or with shelter and food.

Services were broken up yesterday in cyclones of disorder at the cathedral at Canterbury, Manchester, Norwich and Glasgow by denunciations from the starving workmen of the wealthy congregations' indifference to the destitution about them.

From Manchester, Liverpool, Sunderland, Glasgow, Newcastle, Bradford, Sheffield, Hull and Grimsby, 25,000 "hungry marchers" are on their way now to Southampton, where they expect to unite and throw themselves upon the authorities' hands and demand relief.

Admitting that they are unable to cope with the situation, the police at dozens of manufacturing centers have called for military assistance to put down the riots which have already occurred and have given warning that the winter will so aggravate the situation that the presence of troops may be continually needed to prevent general uprisings of the poor.

All over the country bodies of soldiers are being stationed at strategic points to be ready for outbreaks.

President John Burns of the local government board will ask for \$1,500,000 and heavy loans for public improvements when parliament assembles later in the autumn, to relieve the widespread distress and provide employment for the idle.

The board of trade today estimates England's pauper class at 928,671. This is one pauper for every 28 of the population of the entire country. The percentage of paupers in London is even larger, being one in 11.3, or more than three per cent.

The board of trade statistics do not include the hundreds of thousands who are usually employed but who have had little or no work in the last year and are now almost on the verge of starvation.

## PRAY BEFORE LAWMAKERS.

Prohibitionists Make Demonstration in Indiana Legislature.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 21.—The abstinence forces of Indiana made a notable demonstration today when more than 1000 of the crusaders assembled in the lobby of the State House and knelt in prayer for the passage of the county local option bill.

The demonstration was arranged by the Anti-Saloon League and those present included ministers, Sunday school teachers and others, many women being in the crowd. Three cars brought to the city the ministers of the Methodist conference at Shelbyville, who went direct to the State House and took part in the exercises. Every delegation that came to the city marched to the governor's office and cheered the executive.

The meeting in the rotunda of the capital was spectacular and at the same time deeply impressive. All the workers present wore white ribbons pinned on the lapels of their coats and on these ribbons was printed in large letters, "We Want County Local Option."

Several ministers made speeches, explaining their presence and saying that they came because Crawford Fairbanks, president of the Terre Haute Brewing company, Albert Lieber, president of the Indianapolis Brewing company, and others of their kind were at the head of a lobby to prevent the passage of a local option bill and it became the Christian duty of men in the church to counteract such influence if possible.

After the prayer meeting the workers distributed themselves among the senators and representatives who are known, or supposed to be, opposed to the bill. Twenty or 30 workers would surround a senator or representative and ply him with questions so fast that it would almost bewilder him to keep up with the interrogatories. Some of the men thus cornered wore pitiful expressions and seemed anxious to get away, but they were met by other crowds of workers as fast as they escaped, and two or three of them fled from the state house in despair.

What the workers accomplished, if anything, did not become apparent today, as the session of the house passed without any reference to local option, but in the senate the dual feature was cut out of the Anti-Saloon League's bill, and it was passed to a second reading.

Only one republican spoke on the bill and it was advanced by a strict party vote, 35 democrats to 14 republicans.

## HEARS NICKEL'S APPEAL.

Land Fraud Defendant Will Know His Fate in October.

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 21.—After hearing arguments in three appeal cases, the United States circuit court of appeals for the ninth district yesterday afternoon adjourned the September term of court for this district to meet in San Francisco, October 5. During the afternoon the court heard arguments on a motion for a rehearing in the case of the United States against Charles Nickell, of Jacksonville, who had been convicted of subornation of perjury and sentenced to 13 months imprisonment on McNell's island. At the time of Nickell's alleged offense he was publishing two newspapers in southern Oregon and at the same time was serving as United States Commissioner.

On January 31, 1905, Nickell was indicted together with Henry W. Miller and Frank E. Kineart, timber cruisers, and Martin G. Hoge, who was then city attorney of Medford. Miller and Kineart pleaded guilty and made complete confessions implicating Nickell and Hoge and resulting in their conviction July 27, 1906. Hoge was sentenced to four months in the Multnomah county jail and to pay a fine of \$500. After completing his sentence, Hoge took the "pauper oath" and was liberated. Nickell appealed his case and was granted a rehearing by the Court of Appeals last May.

In the argument for a rehearing the only question presented was whether or not the court erred in ruling upon the admission or exclusion of evidence or the instructions to the jury as they were affected by the decision of the United States Supreme Court in the J. N. Williamson case. At the close of the arguments the court took the case under advisement.

Nickell and his associates were charged with procuring persons to make entry on timber lands, representing that they were in a position to sell the timber at 50 cents a thousand. The alleged conspirators are accused of having charged the entrymen a fee of \$125 as a commission on advance fee of \$500 being required. The matter was indicted following the discovery by the government that they did not intend to do any more towards securing the land for the entrymen than to obtain the first payment of the commission money.

Upon information filed by District Attorney George M. Brown, Justice of the Peace John T. Long late last night issued a warrant for the arrest of "Cad" Harmon, junior member of the firm of Chas. H. Harmon & Son, soft drink dealers of this city. The prosecuting witness is John F. May, a former stage driver for G. W. Rapp, who has sworn to an affidavit declaring that on Monday, Sept. 21, Harmon sold him a flask of intoxicating liquor for 50 cents. Concurrently with the order of arrest, Justice Long issued a search warrant. Armed with this, Sheriff Fenton, accompanied by Marshal Norman, made a thorough investigation of Harmon & Son's place of business and found nothing but soft liquor. In a store room, about 50 feet in the rear of the establishment, however, the officers discovered a large quantity of intoxicating liquor, which, it was explained, had been left over from the firm's stock of goods when prohibition went into effect last July. Up to noon today Sheriff Fenton had not served the warrant of arrest, and District Attorney Brown could not state when such action would be taken. When asked when things would be ready for Harmon's arraignment, the district attorney replied that he could not say until after he heard more evidence in the matter.

## FUNERAL OF ROBT. ROBERTSON.

Very Large Attendance—Splendid Floral Tributes—The Services.

Funeral services in honor of the late Robert Robertson were held in this city this afternoon and were very largely attended. The services were held in the I. O. O. F. hall and were under the direction of the Grand Encampment of Oregon, I. O. O. F., led by Grand Patriarch E. J. Seeley, of Albany, and Grand Senior Warden J. M. Williams, of Eugene. An appropriate address was delivered by Dr. J. A. Townsend, on behalf of the Presbyterian church, of which Mrs. Robertson is a member, followed by Rev. E. H. Hicks, of Philanthropic Lodge, I. O. O. F., on behalf of that order. Appropriate music was furnished by a choir led by Mrs. S. M. Kelley.

Besides the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs, the City Council also attended in body. There were present large delegations of railroad men and officials, including nearly every employee of the local shops and yards, the entire active force of the Roseburg Roadhouse Co., as well as many members of the Maccabees and Woodmen of the World. All of these organizations tendered floral pieces of surpassing beauty, many being in emblematic forms of especial appropriateness.
