"UNFIT AND A NUISANCE"

Roosevelt Explains Exile of Colonel Stewart in Arizona.

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 21.—In a letter dated May 6, sent to Senator Rayner, of Maryland, in reply to an inquiry, President Roosevelt gives at length the reasons of the War Department and himself for the exile of Colonel Stewart, to an abandoned fort in Arizona. This letter has been given the senator with permission to publish. In part it says:

"It appears that Colonel Stewart had been 41 years in army, having entered it when very young, so he is now entitled to retire, having served 40 years. He refuses to retire unless he is made a brigadier-general.

"Nuisance in Service." "I shall certainly not make him a brigadier-general because he is grossly unfit; unfit, not merely to be a brigadier-general, but to hold his present rank in the army. His career has not been distinguished for a number of years; his usefulness has been diminishing. Indeed, it has not only irrevocably passed, but he is a nuisance in the service, being both incompetent and temperamentally unfit to exercise command over enlisted men, or to behave with propriety when brought in contact with civilians.

Known as "Impossible." "As General Duval reports, it is well known throughout the artillery service that Colonel Stewart is an 'impossible' commanding officer, and he is a man who in civil life could under no circumstances have risen to any position of influence or authority over his fellows."

ASSAULTS POWDER PUFF.

And Now Minister Will Have Chance To Resign Posture.

TAYLORSTOWN, Pa., Sept. 21.—When Rev. J. H. Moore, pastor of the Christian Church of this village, attacked cardplaying among male members of his church, the girls thought it great fun, but when in last night's sermon he attacked powder puffs in the same sentence with cards, there was a row which almost blossomed into a riot in church. Today the minister was forced to resign.

The phrase from the pulpit last night which caused the explosion was:

"I would as lief have a blacksnake in my house as a deek of cards, and I have my own private opinion of any woman who uses a powder puff."

The pastor got no further. At least half a dozen young women were on their feet expostulating against such talk from the pulpit. "You're a nebbly thing and ought to be ashamed of yourself. You ought to be horsewhipped," said one of the choir-singers to the minister as she left the choir corner with the rest. "At least you should resign."

WAR ON POWDER TRUST.

Hearing of Government's Suit Begun in Delaware Today.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 21.—With the beginning of the hearing here today before William G. Mahaffey, special referee, the government's first gun in its anti-trust powder campaign. The suit promises to develop highly sensational evidence and will probably be one of the most important that the government has yet brought against a corporation. The defendants are the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Company of this state and about 18 other powder concerns alleged to be more or less controlled by the Delaware corporation. Able attorneys have been retained by the defendant companies and the suit will be hard fought.

The capitalization of the powder concerns named in the government's suit is in excess of \$500,000,000. The same principals are involved in the government's suit against the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey now in progress. The suit seeks to restrain the thirty or more powder companies controlled by the E. I. du Pont de Nemours Company of Delaware from doing business under an alleged agreement. The suit is brought under the Sherman anti-trust law and the government makes the allegations that the powder companies are operating in restraint of trade.

The government's complaint is that an association composed of practically all the manufacturers of gunpowder and other high explosives in the United States was formed in 1872, the object being the elimination of all competition between the members of the association. The only companies which did not enter the agreement were the California Powder Works, the Syracuse Manufacturing Company, and the Lake Superior Powder Company; but, according to the government's complaint, these three companies afterward became parties to what is termed "the combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade and commerce."

The association became known as the Gunpowder Trade Association of the United States. The government alleges that the association entered into a "fundamental agreement" that all competition should be suppressed. There was a later agreement, it is charged known as the "President's Agreement," in furtherance of the combination and conspiracy for the express purpose of eliminating competition between the various parties to the agreement.

The warfare waged between the independent powder companies and the members of the association is going on at great length by the government, and in its petition it states that in order to carry out the war against independents, the members of a pool agreement of 1876 furnished funds to carry on the competitive warfare through the Great Northern Manufacturing and Supply Company.

MORMON ANNIVERSARY.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Sept. 22.—Today is a notable anniversary in the history of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, or Mormons. On September 22, eighty-five years ago, Joseph, the youthful prophet who founded the sect, for the first time beheld the plains upon which the book of Mormon was engraved.

According to Mormon history, all night between the 21st and 22nd of September, 1822, the prophet communicated with a heavenly messenger who appeared to him three times. It is one of the most remarkable feats of a being from the other world, on record. After a period of weeping and supplication, previous to writing, the prophet became aware of the cover of light by which the angel was surrounded. And then he saw the heavenly visitor himself. His appearance is described, even to his clothing, and his name is given.

Three times the angel appeared that night, each time with a special message in addition to that already delivered. The first time the messenger made known to the prophet
