Medford Tribune: H. O. Wilkinson, who owns the saloon known as "Weary Willie's," was discharged on Saturday, when arraigned for selling liquor to a minor. The indictment returned by the grand jury alleged that Wilkinson sold beer to a minor. No mention was made of the bartender, who, it is said, sold the beer, hence no agency was shown. All that remained was for Wilkinson to prove that he did not sell the beer personally, and he was discharged. The outcome in the Wilkinson case was a severe disappointment to District Attorney Mulkey, who took a great interest in the case, although the indictment drawn by him was faulty. Minors were employed to secure evidence and furnished money to buy beer with.

Eugene Guard: Charles Kuthe,
the well known cigar dealer, appear-
ed in the police court this afternoon
and was fined \$25 and costs by Act-

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

The last half of taxes due for the
year of 1907 will be delinquent after
Monday, October 5, 1908.

Delinquent taxpayers will take no-
tice that delinquent taxes will not be
advertised as heretofore; under a
law passed by the last legislature of
this state taxes that are delinquent
after the expiration of six months
from the first date of such delinquen-
cy may be paid by any one demand-
ing to pay same and a certificate of
delinquency will be issued to such
party.

Section 37, of said law, in part,
reads:

"Any day after the expiration of
six months after taxes charged
against real property are delinquent,
the tax collector shall have the right,
and it shall be his duty, upon de-
mand and payment of the taxes, pen-
alty and interest, to make out and
issue a certificate or certificates of de-
linquency against such property,"
and section 28, in part, reads:

"Certificates of delinquency shall
bear interest from the date of issue
until redeemed at the rate of
15 per cent per annum."

Delinquent taxpayers are there-
fore advised that if they have not
paid at least one-half of their taxes
on or before the first Monday in
April that the same are delinquent
and have been delinquent since mid-
first Monday in April, and those who
have paid one-half of their taxes as
above the remaining one-half will be
considered delinquent after the first Mon-
day in October, and six months from
such date a certificate of delin-
quency bearing fifteen per cent inter-
est per annum may be issued against
such property.

To save farther costs, penalties
and interest you are earnestly re-
quested to settle the same at once.
