### VERDICT KILLS HIM.

Coquille Jury's Small Award Shocks Father of Wm. Cox.

COQUILLE, Ore., Sept. 21.—Mr. Cox, the aged father of Wm. Cox, of Marshfield, and Mrs. Chas. Wickham, of Coquille, dropped dead at the Wickham home here Saturday afternoon. Mr. Cox had been in poor health for some time and had become agitated over his son's suit for damages from the local railroad for injuries sustained in an accident a few months ago. Mr. Cox showed a keen interest in the case while the jury was out and a moment after he heard the verdict, dropped dead of heart failure. Mr. Cox was recently brought to Coquille from his home near Roseburg.

Mr. Cox was awarded \$1000 by the jury. He sued for \$20,000, claiming that he had been permanently disabled by the accident, which, he alleged, was due to the company's negligence. The jury was out about twelve hours.

(The deceased is believed to be Isom Cox, a former resident of Ten Mile and later of Oalla. Mr. Cox went to Coquille about 25 years ago and remained permanently, whereas the Coquille dispatch says he recently came there from this city, which is probably a mistake.)

### HANGED; STILL ALIVE.

Negro Who Shot Officer Saved From Mob by Slipping Rope.

EL PASO, Tex., Sept. 22.—George Clark, a negro, shot Constable W. H. Taylor, who attempted to arrest him at Shero, Texas, last night, and a mob hanged the negro to a tree, leaving him for dead. This morning he was found to be still alive and was taken to a jail, where a second mob is now threatening to take him and slash the work of the first.

The rope with which the negro had in some manner slipped and the man's toes touched the ground. His hands were tied behind him and he could not move.

He became unconscious, but when out down this morning he revived in a short time.

### THROWN OUT OF BUGGY.

Local Druggist and Companion Meet With Bad Accident.

While out riding in a buggy drawn by two horses late Tuesday evening, Nathan Fullerton, of the local drug firm of Fullerton, and Richardson, and Mrs. Evelyn Ramp, of Cottage Grove, who has been visiting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Churchill, in this city, for several days past, met with an accident and both were injured, the lady quite seriously. The accident happened about 8 o'clock at or near a bridge spanning a small culvert, opposite the Booth Bros. place, about 100 yards south of the entrance to the District Fair grounds.

A patent clasp, connecting the tongue of the buggy with the front axle gave away, frightening the horses into a runaway. The buggy was overturned at the culvert and its occupants were thrown out with great force. Mrs. Ramp sustained a fracture of her right collar bone, two parallel cuts on her forehead and an ugly gash, six inches long, immediately below her left knee. Mr. Fullerton's injuries consist of a wrenched back and a slightly bruised elbow.

While Mrs. Ramp was removed to the Booth home, Mr. Fullerton went to a nearby residence and telephoned for Dr. Seely, who arrived a few minutes later with Grant Taylor in the latter's automobile. Both Mr. Fullerton and Mrs. Ramp were brought to town in the machine and today are receiving proper care and attention.

The injury to Mrs. Ramp's collar bone is an unusually severe one. Dr. Seely states that it is splintered and for that reason will be longer in healing than if it were a clean break. While Mrs. Ramp's recovery is merely a matter of time, it will be longer than under ordinary circumstances, owing to the fact that she recently underwent an operation for appendicitis, from which she had not regained her full former strength.

The buggy suffered little or no damage in the accident. The horse broke loose from it and ran about a mile before stopping. Neither animal is injured.

### GUN EXPLODES; KILLS 13.

TOULON, France, Sept. 22.—During gunnery drill today one of the big turret guns on the French armored cruiser La Touche Treville exploded with terrific violence, completely wrecking the after turret and killing outright the entire gun crew of 13 men. A number of men were seriously injured, some of them probably fatally.

### NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

The last half of taxes due for the year of 1907 will be delinquent after Monday, October 5, 1908.

Delinquent taxpayers will take notice that delinquent taxes will not be advertised as heretofore, under a law passed by the last legislature of this state, that are delinquent after the expiration of six months from the first date of such delinquency may be paid by any one demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party.

Section 37, of said law, in part, reads:

"Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out and issue a certificate or certificates of delinquency against such property."

Section 38, in part, reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum."

Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their taxes on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes as above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from such dates a certificate of delinquency bearing fifteen per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property.

To save further costs, penalties and interest you are earnestly requested to settle the same at once.
