CITY ELECTION SOON.

Six Councilmen to be Elected in Roseburg on October 5th.

Apparently but little public interest is being manifested in the coming city election to be held in this city one week from next Monday. At that time six of the 12 councilmen for the city are to be elected, one each from the six wards. Those elected at this time will hold office for two years, half of the council retiring at each succeeding annual election. The mayor, recorder and treasurer are also elected for two years each and the terms of the present incumbents extend until October, 1909. This perhaps accounts for the general lack of interest in the election to be held one week from next Monday.

Despite the present apparent lethargy there will probably develop some interesting contests before election is over. So far as is now known all the councilmen whose terms expire at this time will be in the field for re-election. It also being well known that the policy of the present council is not approved of by many of our citizens in relation to a number of matters, gives rise to the foregoing prediction that the coming election will not prove such a "lame affair" as the present quietude would indicate.

Who May be Candidates.

In relation to the candidates in the several wards we have heard the following names mentioned:

In Ward 1, the retiring councilman is John T. Long, and his probable opponent is Frank Clements, the well-known carpenter and builder.

In Ward 2, the retiring member is C. B. Patrick. We have not heard any name mentioned in opposition to his re-election.

In Ward 3, the late Robt. Robertson would have been the retiring councilman. It is reliably reported that R. G. Boone, another thoroughly reliable employee of the S. P. R. Co., in this city, will be put forward by his friends to fill the vacancy.

In Ward 4, the term of G. Worthington will expire, and B. W. Strong, the well-known furniture dealer, is being urged for the place and will probably enter the race in the coming election.

In Ward 5, A. A. Bellows, the merchant, has no opponent for re-election, so far as we learn from current reports.

In Ward 6, North Roseburg, the retiring member, J. W. Wright, will very likely have for his opponent John W. Mullen, the well-known drayman, who recently built and now occupies a substantial new residence in that part of town.

In its final outcome this election seems very likely to resolve itself into a contest between those endorsing the present administration and that portion of our citizens who want a new deal. In that case the present quietness is likely to develop into an active interest on both sides. It will be for the voters to determine whether they want to continue the present policies or whether the present regime has outlived its usefulness and should be permanently retired. Many of our leading citizens do not hold the case and are ready to put forth plenty of argument to back up their assertions. If you want a new deal in city affairs you would better go to work without delay, for you may be assured that the "stand pat" element will leave nothing undone in their efforts to continue in control of the city government.

WORRIED ABOUT OREGON.

G. O. P. Managers Send Ballinger Here to Look Into Matters.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—The political situation in Oregon is far from satisfactory to the managers of the republican national campaign. Indeed it is not going too far to say that considerable concern is felt over the possibility that Oregon will this year cast her electoral vote for W. J. Bryan. Though they will not publicly admit it, it is known Chairman Hitchcock and his advisers today look upon Oregon as a doubtful state and attribute this condition to the workings of Oregon's primary law. They have learned that in Oregon there is no longer any republican organization. There is no organized effort to carry the state for W. H. Taft. There is bitter dissension among republicans growing out of the senatorial fight and up to the present time there is no sign of reconciliation.

So grave is this condition that Judge E. A. Ballinger, of Seattle, a member of the republican advisory committee, after a conference in New York tomorrow with Mr. Hitchcock, will go to Oregon for further investigation in the hope of developing some plan whereby Oregon can be brought into the republican column. During a conference with President Roosevelt today Judge Ballinger explained the situation in Oregon as he described it and while he was in the city the condition in Oregon was so critical, he discussed the fact that republicans are going to have their hands full holding Oregon in line in November.

REPLYS TO BRYAN.

Roosevelt Adds to Charges Against Governor Haskell.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—President Roosevelt tonight wrote a letter to W. J. Bryan, replying to the latter's telegram in defense of Governor Haskell. He not only adheres to his former statement, but adds further charges, showing Mr. Haskell's friendship to the Standard Oil Company. He then contrasts Mr. Bryan's action with Mr. Taft's refusal to endorse Senator Foraker and concludes by declaring Mr. Bryan's policy for dealing with the trusts impracticable, as his railroad and monetary policies. The letter, in substance, follows:

Haskell's close relation with the Standard Oil interests in Ohio was a matter of common notoriety.

In defiance of the Attorney General of the state (Oklahoma) he intended to protect the interests of a great corporation (the Prairie Oil & Gas Company, controlled by the Standard) against the law.

Contrast your action in this case of Governor Haskell with Mr. Taft's action as regards Senator Foraker.

Mr. Taft refused to be a party to the re-nomination of Senator Foraker, showing by actual deeds that his words were true when he said: "I do not care for the presidency if it has to come by compromise with any one on a matter of principle."

With hundredfold clearer evidence you have secured Governor Haskell to write the platform and put him in as treasurer of your campaign committee.

I regard it as a scandal and disgrace that Governor Haskell should be connected with the management of any national campaign.

Let me call your attention to his conduct in prostituting to base purposes the state university.

You have indeed advocated measures against private monopolies that sound more radical than either I or my party associates have been willing to undertake, but they have the prime defect that in practice they would not work.

I put Mr. Taft's deeds against your words. I ask that Mr. Taft be judged by all his deeds, for he wishes none of them forgotten. I ask that you be judged both by the words you wish remembered and by the words that seemingly you and your party now desire to have forgotten.

I hold it entirely natural for any great law-breaking corporation to wish to see you placed in the presidency. Your plans to put a stop to abuses are wholly chimerical.

No law-defying corporation has anything to fear from you save what it will suffer in the general paralysis of business which any attempt to reduce to practice what you have advocated would bring.

I ask for support for Mr. Taft because his deeds have made good his words.

FARMERS' NATIONAL CONGRESS.

MADISON, Wis., Sept. 24.—All of the diversified agricultural interests of the nation find representation in the great assembly of delegates gathered here today at the 28th annual Farmers' National Congress. Truck growers of the east, wheat and corn farmers of the central west, cotton and tobacco planters of the south and irrigation farmers of the far west are here for what promises to be one of the most important and profitable experience meetings ever held by American farmers.

Among the speakers on the program are Representative Randall, president of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress; Chief Forester Pitchot, of Washington; President Harvey Jordan, of the Farmers' Union; and William J. Bryan, who has been invited to address the congress on the subject of the farmer and his relations to public affairs. Governors of several states have also been invited to speak.

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PLEASED WITH CALIFORNIA.

W. S. Britt, Former Assessor, Writes of the Conditions There.

Papers come rather irregularly to the above address, but I presume it is no fault of yours.

The climate at Oakland is I think as good as any part of the state. Scarcely a storm since I have been here—nearly one year now. A continual round of sunshine, not hot, just pleasant. Today, as I write, the thermometer registers 60 at 10:15 a. m., and this is about like every day since I have been here. Flowers simply grow wild out doors everywhere. I have not been to San Jose, the prune section of California, as yet, but in this locality I see no better fruit growing than Douglas county produces. I don't see any evidence of spraying for Scale here and can only account for it that the salt sea breeze is not healthy for San Jose scale. California roads are fine, never saw better. It is nearly level here. Macadamized roads are hard and smooth as they can be made and then oiled so there is no dust. Automobiles travel over these roads at from 25 to 60 miles an hour when the authorities will permit.

Trolley roads run out of Oakland with cheap fare (usually 5c) so that people ride far out, spend the day and return at night. Californians pride themselves on their fine schools, and the City of Oakland in particular. I am told that the City of Oakland keeps their teachers on the payroll by the year and pay them wages every month in the year "whether school keeps or no." I was agreeably surprised a short time ago when Mr. Standley, from near Yoncalla, called on me and we had a very pleasant time talking over matters and events in Douglas county. Mr. Standley is a contractor and builder and with the building and improvements going on here is kept very busy. He seems to like it here as his family has so many advantages and educational privileges, as all kinds of schools and colleges, including the University of California is waiting with open doors to welcome the student.

The Western Pacific, another transcontinental railroad, is just laying its tracks into Oakland.

I am pleased to note that Douglas county is taking up the matter of "good roads" and hope the people will see and get the benefit that is derived from them.

They are paving and widening a street near me now, with granite curbing, that ought to be in good condition when Gabriel blows his horn.
