HASKELL'S SUCCESSION

Herman Ridder Chosen Treasurer of Democratic Nat'l Committee.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Herman Ridder, one of the foremost German-American citizens of the country, was tonight appointed by Chairman Mack of the Democratic national committee to succeed Governor C. N. Haskell, of Oklahoma, who resigned early this morning because of the charges brought regarding his affiliation with the Standard Oil Company.

SALOON PROPERTY IMMUNE.

Cannot be Sold on Execution in Dry County, Says Atty. General.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 26.—Attorney General Crawford held today that saloon property, the stock of goods, cannot be sold by the authorities on an execution or other order of the court to satisfy a debt in a county that has gone dry under the local option law. This applies in all counties where the county is dry, because the county courthouse is where all such sales properly take place.

NOTES OF INTEREST.

The United States navy department has just ordered 1,275,000 pounds of canned meats from the Schwarzschild & Scharber Company. This is the largest single contract for meat ever made by the government in time of peace. It will require the slaughter of 28,000 head of cattle and 6000 hogs to fill the order; the meat, when packed and ready for delivery will amount to about 47 carloads.

At Portland, Oregon, Saturday night, members of the Travelers' Protective Association declared themselves as being in favor of nine-foot bed sheets in all hotels in Oregon and Washington. And furthermore, the question was left in the hands of the legislative committee with instructions to make every possible effort to have a law providing for such coverings passed at the next session of the state legislature in January.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS. The last half of taxes due for the year of 1907 will be delinquent after Monday, October 5, 1908. Delinquent taxpayers will take notice that delinquent taxes will not be advertised as heretofore; under a law passed by the last legislature of this state, taxes that are delinquent after the expiration of six months from the first date of such delinquency may be paid by any one demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party. Section 37, of said law, in part, reads: "Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out and issue a certificate or certificates of delinquency against such property," and section 38, in part, reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum." Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their taxes on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes as above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from such date a certificate of delinquency bearing fifteen per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property.
