**DRUNKS ARE TOO FREQUENT.**

Evident Lack of Enforcement of the Prohibition Law.

From daily comments of casual observers it is evident that for a dry town the acquisition of "booze" is becoming too frequent and easy in Roseburg. Rumor says that Saturday night carousals are of almost as unflagging regularity as during the days when saloons were in regular and lawful operation. Nor is it on Saturday nights alone that there is evidence of something stronger than "star beer" being drunk. Along this line the last issue of the Oily News says:

Two of Roseburg's promising young men paraded our streets yesterday— Sunday— filled to the brim with the beverage that, by a majority of nearly 500 at the last election, is "supposed" to be a thing of the past in our beautiful little city, unless prescribed by a regular physician for his patients. But since the town "went dry" there seems to be an unlimited number of these "patients." In fact the "dryness" has had a very bad effect on many and whether they are traveling under the "sick bill" or getting the liquor from the "blind pig" funnel is a question for some one else to answer. The News does not know that a "blind pig" exists in Roseburg but we do know that there is a whole lot of the genuine old "dope" of a very advanced vintage being dispensed in this city. That its effect on the imbiber is fully up to the standard is witnessed by the "staggering samples" exhibited on our streets at very frequent intervals of late. To use a slang phrase, "There's something rotten in Denmark"— (perhaps in Roseburg)— regarding the sale of liquor, and it is about time a thorough investigation was being made as to where all this "pig" is coming from. There is certainly a big "leak" somewhere.

The foregoing is not reproduced for the purpose of making any criticism thereon. It seems to show the present status of affairs from the News' point of view. It does give rise to a query, which seems especially pertinent at this time, it being generally reported that the prohibition law is being frequently disregarded in Roseburg, late, it would seem that the News would give its special friends, Mayor Hoover and Marshal Norman, a good "jacking up" for dereliction of duty. If they are not enforcing the law the people would like to know why not. Possibly the News could also inform an expectant public who the "regular physician" who is dealing out so many "wet" prescriptions. Plainly speaking, the conditions are becoming intolerable in a law-abiding community and the responsibility therefor should be definitely fixed without further delay.

**HEGEWISCH IN HIS HAND.**

Battling Nelson Only Can Save Town, Says Methodist Minister.

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Rev. S. A. Dennis, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church of Hegewisch, today startled the temperance committee of the Rock River conference when he declared that the salvation of Hegewisch must be achieved through the conversion of "Battling" Nelson, champion lightweight pugilist of the world, who owns the place body and soul.

The astounded committee, seeking enlightenment, learned from Mr. Dennis that the advent of the "Battler" in his home village was sufficient to cause the abandonment of business by everybody except the thrifty saloon-keepers.

"If 'Battling' Nelson were to become a Methodist," said Mr. Dennis, "every man, woman and child in the place would forthwith join the church. I have prayed unremittently for the conversion of the Battler. I believe he is the most decent fellow that ever was in the prizefighting business.

Aside from his profession and his environment, Nelson is a very good man. His instincts are good and I hope that with the prayers of the conference he may be turned into the paths of righteousness."

**CITY'S SCHOOL GROWTH.**

City Superintendent L. L. Baker reports an enrollment of pupils of 731 in the Roseburg schools on Sept. 29, of this year, as against 660 on Sept. 29 of last year—an increase of 71. The highest enrollment at any time during last year was 843, or 27 per cent greater than that on Sept. 29. Calculating that the increase this year will be proportionately as large, the enrollment should reach 928.

With the constant influx of new residents, however, the biggest total may reach 1,000.
