How to Act in Case of Fire.

If smoke is seen pouring out from under a door do not rush and open that door. Remember that by so doing you cause a draft which will fan smoldering timbers into flames. Shut and keep shut all doors and windows or other air channels. If you have not a hand pump or fire grenades handy collect as many pails or jugs of water as possible outside the closed door of the room which is afire. Meantime remember that smoke is almost as dangerous to life as fire. A soaking wet towel knotted round the face and nostrils is an excellent rough and ready protection against breathing smoke. So is a wet sponge. Remember also that smoke rises. Therefore it is best to lie near the floor. If the smoke is very thick, crawl with your face close against the floor. The commonest cause of fire is the upsetting of an oil lamp. Water will only spread the flames of burning oil, but a hearth rug will extinguish them promptly, says Home Chat. Milk will also extinguish burning oil. Sand or earth or common salt are useful aids to fire fighting. The contents of an ordinary flowerpot will stop the spread of the flames of oil.

How to Clean Black Lace.

Black lace should not be washed unless it is decidedly dirty, but should be well shaken to remove as much dust as is possible and then dipped in a solution of deep blue gum water. When the lace has become dirty and brownish in color, the best plan is to wash it in soapsuds and then rinse and stiffen it in deep blue water to which the gum water has been added. The deep blue water will help to restore the lace to its original black. The lace should be all rolled in an old cloth for a short time and then pinned out with the cloth between it and the sheet, as it imparts a blue stain which it would be necessary to remove from the sheet. When the lace is quite dry remove the pins and place a piece of tissue paper over it. Iron it with the paper between it and the iron. If the iron is placed directly on the lace it will leave a gloss on it which is not pretty and which stamps it as washed lace.

How to Clean Velvet.

The method employed to clean light and dark velvet is a simple one. A letter of white soap is made into which the velvet is dipped, then placed on a board or table and scrubbed the way of the pile with a clean nailbrush until all dirt has been removed, when it is rinsed in clean cold water, but not speared or wrung, as this would spoil the pile. It is dried in the air, and sometimes the back is drawn over a hot iron, but this is not absolutely necessary. Light velvets are cleaned by gently rubbing with a flannel previously dipped in kerosene or, if the material be soiled in spots only, by rubbing with a piece of fat bacon or butter, when the wrong side requires drawing over a hot iron in order to raise the pile.

How to Keep Youthful.

Some one asked a woman how it was she kept her youth so wonderfully. Her hair was snow white, she was eighty years old, and her energy was waning, but she never impressed one with the idea of age, for her heart was still young in sympathy and interests. And this was her answer: "I know how to forget disagreeable things. I tried to master the art of saying pleasant things. I did not expect too much of my friends.
