John M. Throno has sold his one-fourth interest in the Douglas County Abstract Company, in this city, to Robert E. Smith, a brother-in-law of E. W. Kuykendall, who also owns a one-fourth interest in the business. Mr. Smith is from Minneapolis, where he was formerly manager of the timber department of the Brooks-Seaman Timber Co., which has extensive holdings in the United States and Canada. Mr. Throno will remain in the employ of the abstract company until the end of the year.

**\$44,250 PER MILE.**

Assessor Staley Gives S. P. Valuation Another Boost.  
\$44,250 per mile.  
This is the valuation placed by County Assessor George W. Staley this year upon the Southern Pacific Company's 116.15 miles of road bed, together with rolling stock, in Douglas county. It is an increase of \$14,250 per mile over the assessment of 1907.

Mr. Staley explains that the increase is made to meet a proportionate rise in the value of other classes of property.

In 1907, Mr. Staley says, the S. P. Company's railroad property, while advanced very materially in valuation, did go so far in proportion as other property, so this year, in compiling valuations, he is putting the railroad property further ahead and advancing the property of other taxpayers only slightly in order to equalize the assessment as a whole. Timber lands, which were raised the highest of any class of property in 1907, will remain at the same valuation this year, while on other holdings the average advance will not exceed five per cent.

Mr. Staley has no fear but that he can make the increased valuation of the Southern Pacific Company's railroad property stick. Under the new law which compels railroads to report annually to the state railroad commission on the value of their holdings, the Southern Pacific company in 1907 placed the value of its Oregon road bed at over \$50,000, or over \$13,000 higher than Mr. Staley's assessment. With this increased levy on its road bed and rolling stock, coupled with the levy that will be made on its land holdings, the Southern Pacific Company, it is estimated, will pay about one-third of the county tax for this year.

**W. L. BOISE GOES FREE.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—Vindicated and exonerated by the grand jury, which yesterday refused to return an indictment against him in connection with the charges of embezzlement of funds of the Hawthorne estate, preferred by members of the Hawthorne family, Whitney L. Boise declared last night that he entertained only the most cordial feelings toward those members of the family who investigated his arrest. It was decided by the grand jury yesterday morning that it is not the function of the courts to take up the affairs of the Hawthorne family, and consequently it rendered a complete vindication of the former manager of the estate against whom charges of embezzlement of more than \$5000 had been made. "Not a true bill" was returned on each of the five counts contained in the criminal charges upon which Mr. Boise was arrested in July.  
The cases investigated by the grand jury involved \$2357.87, which Boise was accused of having converted to his own use. Mrs. Catherine H. Collins, sister-in-law of Mr. Boise, was the complainant, alleging that while in the employ of the Hawthorne estate Boise misappropriated the funds. It was estimated that the shortage might reach \$200,000. Among the witnesses examined were Mrs. Collins, George Black, E. S. Miller, M. O. Collins, C. C. Cate, Carrie C. McQuinn and W. R. McKenzie. Whitney L. Boise testified at his own request.

Hearing of a suit to replevin a wagon was in progress in Justice Long's court this afternoon before the following jury: Geo. W. Kruse, Ed. Neesley, A. Buell and S. F. Cawfield. The plaintiff is Max Weiss, the local grocer, and the defendant Angel Nelson, who sold Weiss a tract of land on which there was a wagon. Weiss alleges that the wagon was included in his purchase, but that after the deal was made Nelson took the wagon off the premises.

**PARSON WITH A RECORD.**

Passes 1,000 Mark in Tying Nuptial Knots—98 Per Cent Stick.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Oct. 2.—The Rev. Gottlieb Andras, the "marrying parson" of Jersey City, who in the last quarter of a century has caused 2000 loving hearts to beat as 1000, will tomorrow celebrate his own silver wedding anniversary. Recently he performed the 1000th ceremony in his long career of tying nuptial knots and he confidently expects that he will reach the 2000 mark before his career as first assistant to Cupid is ended. Mr. Andras began his own married life on October 3, 1883. "Already presents are beginning to pour in upon him and his wife in anticipation of tomorrow's anniversary, many of them coming from appreciative couples whom he married.

The "marrying parson" has derived an income of about \$10,000 from the matrimonial episodes in which he has figured, showing that the average sum received from each happy groom was \$10. A few impetuous or stingy bridegrooms have paid only a dollar or two, some have paid nothing at all, and the highest fee he has ever received was \$25. The majority pay from \$5 to \$10, but enough have paid more than the latter sum to bring the average up to about \$10. Owing to the passage of a marriage license law in New York, many couples from the metropolis now come to Jersey City to be married and a large portion of them are taken by the "cabbies" to the Rev. Mr. Andras.

The "marrying parson" is pastor of the German Reformed church, and preaches every Sunday to a congregation of 700. During the last quarter-century, he has officiated at 1,654 baptisms and at 1257 funerals. Unlike the Oklahoma parson, who recently delivered an address in New York in which he declared that only one married couple in eight achieve happiness, the Rev. Mr. Andras is optimistic. He gives it as his belief that 98 per cent of the marriages at which he has officiated have turned out happily. Says the "marrying parson":

"I believe the men and women of today marry at too early an age. A man should wait until he is at least 25 and a woman until she is 23. The women are greater offenders in this respect, for the men have gained a worldly knowledge before their sisters have learned how to wash the dishes. A woman at 20 knows nothing. "A man should marry as often as he finds it necessary. I mean he should never be without a helpmate. Divorces should not be sought promiscuously, but while man remains fallible, perfection in that regard cannot be expected."
