Forestry Policies Upheld at Irrigation Congress

TIMBER CENSUS ASKED FOR

Favors Revision of Timber and Stone Act to Prevent Monopoly by Corporations

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Oct. 2.—The struggle in the National Irrigation Congress between the supporters and opponents of the present government forestry policy resulted in a sweeping victory for the friends of Chief Forester Pinchot today. With a few recommendations for change in the forest regulations the congress adopted resolutions endorsing the forest service as well as other government bureaus concerned in the work of development and reclamation. It also took advanced ground in favor of conservation of natural resources in general.

Compromise on Forestry.
The report of the committee on resolutions was adopted without discussion at the close of the morning session. After a long contest before the committee, the critics of the forest service were satisfied with the following:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this congress that such legislation should be had, in justice to the Forest Service and claimants to property rights within the National forests, as will provide for a review at the instance of any party affected, by a competent tribunal of controversies relating to homestead entries of forest control or regulation, arising from any action, regulation or ruling

of the Forester's office. That whenever large tracts of land suitable for agriculture and which are not natural forest and which are not intended to be made forest and which are not necessary or proper for the preservation of the forests or the watersheds or water supplies for the purpose to which they have been devoted, lie within forest reserve boundaries, such tracts should be restored to entry as public lands.

Another resolution is upon the utilization of streams for the purpose of electric power and favors the removal of restrictions upon such use.

Conservation of Resources.

After recommending the construction of levees and revetments where needed, drainage works for the reclamation of swamp and overflowed lands and the general conservation of waste waters, through reforestation and other means, the resolution continues:

That a census of the standing timber in the United States should be authorized by congress, and that the states should be urged to co-operate with the Nation for the preservation and enlargement of our forest resources by adoption of uniform laws, and that forestry, irrigation, drainage, flood protection, water storage and river regulation and control for navigation and water power should be regarded as one great inter-related subject in all legislative and executive policies.

That power made available by National irrigation works, when once applied by pumping or other duty connected with irrigation, should be regarded as appurtenant to the land, and we urge the enactment of laws to this end.

Forest Service Indorsed.

The resolutions give sweeping indorsement to the work of the Reclamation Service, the Forest Service and the Geological Survey and urge on Congress continued support and increased appropriations for all of these bureaus; urge the repeal of the timber and stone act, "to the end that the accumulation of public lands in the hands of a few great corporations may be arrested;" urging that the Carey act be made applicable to the territories; indorsing the movement to hold a session of the congress in Washington in 1910, to be known as the Interna-

tional Congress on Irrigation, and asking appropriations from the state and the federal governments for this congress; ask Congress for an adequate appropriation for the use of the hydrographical division of the Geological Survey to determine by experiment and measurement and observation the practical effects of grazing and lumbering on the supply of water for irrigation and on the erosion of the soil and that such investigation extend over the various watersheds, both in and out of the National forests and that such investigation be prosecuted simultaneously throughout all the states and territories of the arid and semi-arid West."

JUDGES DISAGREE

Supreme Court Must Decide Lumber Rate Case

APPEAL QUESTION RAISED

Washington County Farmers Battle With Axe and Knife—Forest Fire in Lion

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—The question of whether the Interstate Commerce Commission has the power to fix railroad rates and then, in case the railroad should protest, to pass upon the reasonableness of such rates is to be passed up to the United States Supreme Court by Judges Morrow, Gilbert and Ross, of the Federal court of appeals in this city. The question arises out of the appeal of the Southern Pacific company direct to the Federal court from the action of the Interstate Commerce Commission in reducing the lumber rate on shipments from the Willamette Valley to San Francisco from \$5.10 per thousand to \$3.40. The court previously held that the railroad should have appealed directly back to the commission, but the legality of such procedure is questioned by the railroad.

Judges Morrow, Ross and Gilbert have been unable to agree on several points bearing on this question, and the law requires that the decision either be unanimous or the question submitted to the supreme court.

Farmers' Bloody Fight.

HILLSBORO, Or., Oct. 2.—With a gash extending from his right temple to the cheek on the opposite side and with his nose nearly severed, E. V. Galloway, a prosperous farmer of Beaverton, is in the hospital here, and William H. Adams, accused of wielding a double bladed axe that caused the ugly wound, is in jail, with knife wounds on his face. Galloway called on Adams yesterday to buy his ranch, and a quarrel resulted, followed by the axe and knife being brought into play.

Linn Forest Afire.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 2.—Fire which has been raging fiercely for the last three days in the Cascade forest reserve, ten miles east of Detroit, is now reported to be completely beyond control, notwithstanding the efforts of a large force of men to arrest its progress. It is estimated that over 1,000 acres have so far been burned over. Only a downpour of rain can extinguish the fire.

FIRE EATING INTO TIMBER.

Blaze East of Detroit Gets Beyond Control of Forest Rangers.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 2.—A big forest fire is now burning in the Cascade forest reserve, ten miles east of Detroit, according to reports received here tonight from that town. It broke out three days ago and is now beyond the small force of rangers which is fighting it.

Thus far the fire has burned principally in second-growth timber, and brush covering an old burn, but good timber is endangered and only rain will stop the fire. How this fire started has not been learned. It is only a few miles from the scene of the big fire in that part of the mountains in August, but that fire was thoroughly extinguished by rains.

J. W. Hammell, of Albany, who returned today from Detroit, says the fire is burning near Coffee Mountain, on the line of the old Oregon Pacific survey, about ten miles east of Detroit, terminus of the Corvallis & Eastern.

J. A. Heldeck, of Detroit, who visited the scene of the fire, estimates that the flames have already covered 500 acres.

CLEANING A CLOCK.

How to Put It in First Class Running Order.

It is very simple to clean a clock, which may seem very absurd. For an amateur it is not always necessary to take the clock to pieces. With a little care and patience and using some benzine, a clean white rag, a salad brush and some oil a clock can be cleaned and put in first class running order. The benzine should be clean and free from oil. You can test benzine by putting a little on the back of the hand. If it is good it will dry off, leaving the hand quite clean, but if any grease remains on the hand it is not fit to use.

The oil should be of the very best that can be procured, says Popular Mechanics. Vegetable oils should never be used. Clock oil can be procured from your druggist or jeweler. All loose dirt should be removed from the works by blowing with a bellows or a fan or dusting with a dry brush. In the latter case great care should be exercised not to injure any of the parts. Dip the brush in the benzine and clean the spindles and spindle holes, and the teeth of the escapement wheel. After washing a part wipe the brush on the rag and rinse in the benzine. This should be repeated frequently until no more dirt is seen.

When the clock has dried all the spindle holes and the teeth of the escapement with a toothpick or a silver of wood cut to a fine point. Oil the teeth of the escapement wheel slightly, using

H. W. Miller, former justice of the peace in Roseburg, later in the hotel business in Myrtle Creek, afterwards an inmate at McNeil's Island for fraudulent land transactions in Jackson county, comes to public notice again through the following item in the Portland Telegram of Oct. 2:

Suit was filed in the Justice court this morning by the Mount Hood Brewing Company against H. W. Miller, of Astoria, to collect \$104.20 alleged to be due for beer, and which the defendant will not pay. The funny part of the incident is that Miller was the owner of a drugstore in the suburb in which he resides, and which burned several weeks ago. Astoria is a dry precinct, and the large bill for beer shows that he had many patients who took beer for their various ailments.

RECEPTION TO REV. HAWKINS.

A reception was held in the parlors of the Methodist church last evening in honor of the return of Rev. J. K. Hawkins and his wife to the pastorate for another year. The church was tastefully decorated with a profusion of flowers and a large number of members and interested friends of the church were present. Mr. A. R. 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COAL MINE HORROR

Three Killed and Six Others Await Rescue

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 3.—Three miners are known to have been killed and six others are missing as the result of an explosion in the Tennessee Coal Company's mine at Blossburg today. The missing men were entombed by the explosion and a force of men are working desperately to rescue them.

Three Deaths Here Also.

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—One man was killed, two others were burned so badly that they will die and a score of other were seriously injured when a ladle containing tons of molten metal overturned at the shops of the Grand Trunk railroad today. The metal engulfed the workmen and burned them horribly.

Southern Justice.

FRANKLIN, La., Oct. 3.—A Sidney Bouterie, editor of the New Era, published at Patterson, was shot five times and fatally wounded as he sat at his desk today by his beautiful bride of 19 years, who claimed that her husband refused to live with her. The couple was married last Wednesday night at the point of a gun leveled at Bouterie by the girl's father. The bride is in jail.

Blames Money Sharks.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—Declaring he had been hounded to death by money sharks, who had taken all of his salary ever since the death of his wife two years ago, George McClellan, a driver in the employ of the city fire department, bid farewell to his two small children today and then laying down on a bed swallowed a dose of carbolic acid. The fireman's wife was ill a long time before her death, and McClellan had mortgaged his salary in advance to meet expenses.

Alaskan Coast Swept.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 3.—A terrific storm is raging off the Alaskan coast between Sitka and Dutch Harbor. At Cordovia the steamer Bertha was forced to run for shelter with the seas breaking over her deck. The Portland arrived this morning with several life boats missing, they having been swept away.

Taft May Be Thankful.

DODGE CITY, Kan., Oct. 3.—William H. Taft's great bulk saved him from injury during a stampede last night at Denver. When the big crowd was leaving the auditorium some one started a stampede and Taft was swept along in the struggle. Several persons were bruised and scratched, but Mr. Taft escaped without injury.
