During last month 42-100 of an inch of rain fell in Roseburg and vicinity, according to the monthly summary just issued by Thos. Gibson, local observer at the U. S. Weather Bureau. During the same period there were five days of frost, on the 17th, 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th, the last three being designated as "heavy" ones. On the 24th the temperature was one degree below the freezing point, and on the 25th it was still one degree lower. During the first half of the month, however, there were eight days when the temperature was 85 or over. The average rainfall for the month of September for the past 32 years is 1.07 inches, and there is a deficiency for last month, as compared with the average of the corresponding period of 64-100 of an inch.

JURY DISAGREES.

C. P. Snell, Remembered in Roseburg, Escapes Conviction.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Oct. 2.—One of the most noted criminal cases in the history of Arizona has just resulted in a mistrial here. The case was that of the Territory of Arizona vs. C. P. Snell, of San Francisco, charged with sending a letter from San Francisco to Dr. E. B. Perrin, at Williams, Ariz., alleged to imply that Perrin would be prosecuted unless he should pay Snell a large sum of money for the delivery of certain documents in the possession of Snell. At the time the letter was written the defendant was a witness in the case of the United States vs. E. B. Perrin and John A. Benson, which was tried in San Francisco in August, 1907.

The case was continued until the April term of court, but there is a well-founded impression that the district attorney will make no further prosecution. After being discharged, the members of the jury gave out a statement that the jury stood 11 for acquittal and one for conviction. The jury was out 24 hours.

(Snell, a lawyer by profession, practiced in Medford about ten years ago. He made a specialty of public land work, and in this connection appeared frequently in person before the U. S. land office in Roseburg. After leaving Medford he located in northern California and became a prominent figure in the land fraud case involving Perrin and Benson, the two men referred to in the above dispatch from Flagstaff. In the capacity of a notary public, Snell handled many of the documents by which Perrin and Benson are alleged to have fraudulently obtained public lands, and this made Snell a valuable witness for the government in their prosecution. The documents which Snell offered for sale to Perrin under threat, and for which action he has just been tried at Flagstaff relate to Perrin and Benson's public land operations.)

BIG LAND DEAL. Warren Reed Buys 600 Acres Adjoining Reedsport Townsite.

San Diego (Cal.) Sun: Over 600 acres of harbor lands on the Umpqua River, southern Oregon, comprising the townsite of Providence, has been sold by John Stinson to Capt. Warren P. Reed, of Gardiner, Or., the new owner of Reedsport, which adjoins the present purchase. The Spreckels railroad, which has been acquired by the Southern Pacific, running from Myrtle Point to Coos Bay, Or., is to be extended through the tract to Drain. A large lumbering plant will be built as soon as the railway is in operation. The former owner has recently come to San Diego to make his home, and the sale was made in the offices of the Park-Grable company.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

The last half of taxes due for the year of 1907 will be delinquent after Monday, October 5, 1908. Delinquent taxpayers will not be advertised as heretofore; under a law passed by the last legislature of this state taxes that are delinquent after the expiration of six months may be paid by any one demanding to pay same and a certificate of delinquency will be issued to such party.

Section 37, of said law, in part, reads: "Any day after the expiration of six months after taxes charged against real property are delinquent the tax collector shall have the right, and it shall be his duty, upon demand and payment of the taxes, penalty and interest, to make out and issue a certificate or certificates of delinquency against such property." and section 38, in part, reads: "Certificates of delinquency shall bear interest from the date of issuance until redeemed at the rate of 15 per cent per annum."

Delinquent taxpayers are therefore advised that if they have not paid at least one-half of their taxes on or before the first Monday in April that the same are delinquent and have been delinquent since said first Monday in April, and those who have paid one-half of their taxes above the remaining one-half will become delinquent after the first Monday in October, and six months from such dates a certificate of delinquency bearing fifteen per cent interest per annum may be issued against your property.

To save further costs, penalties and interest you are earnestly requested to settle the same at once.

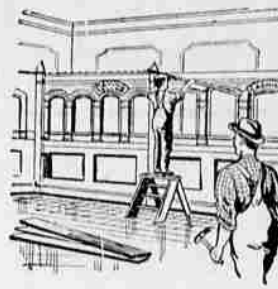
