CONGRESS AT WORK

Resolutions for Coos Bay and Bigger Navy

PINCHOT ENDORSED AGAIN

Jail Break at Oregon City—Fine and Jail for Eugene Bootlegger, and More Coming

Special to the Evening Review.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—At this morning's session of the Trans-Mississippi Congress resolutions were adopted calling for a larger navy in the Pacific ocean, for government aid for merchant marine, giving the Interstate Commerce Commission power to investigate and suspend advances in freight rates before they become operative, and providing for the improvement and fortifying of Coos Bay and Siuslaw harbor.

Opposition to the government forestry policy was defeated today through the efforts of former Governor Pardee, of California, who has been lobbying against various resolutions criticizing Forester Pinchot. When the resolutions came up at this morning's session, Pardee caused them to be voted down.

There's Way to Freedom. OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 9.—John Hovvers, accused of attempted murder, last night burned him way to freedom from the county jail. Using a red hot poker, Hovvers burned a hole through the thin ceiling of his cell. Creeping through this, he burned a hole in the ceiling leading to the court room and then slipped from the building and disappeared.

Fined for Boats Traffic. EUGENE, Or., Oct. 9.—Joseph

Jacobs, who was found guilty yesterday of selling liquor in this city in violation of the local option law, was today sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs and to serve 30 days in jail. This is the second time Jacobs has been fined and jailed for selling liquor, and when he completes the sentence imposed today he will be arraigned on still a third charge.

TROPHIES FOR HORSE SHOW.

In Portland Next Week—72 Silver Cups Donated.

Portland Oregonian: The trophy committee of the Portland Hunt Club reported yesterday that it had collected 72 handsome cups that are to go to the blue ribbon winners at the horse show, which opens at the Oriental building on the Lewis and Clark exposition grounds on Thursday next. The silver cups have been donated to the horse show by the business firms of the city and by private individuals, and as soon as 16 more cups can be added to this collection so that each of the 88 classes will have such a trophy they will be allotted to the various classes. The majority of the cups that will be distributed among the winners this year are very handsome and worth winning.

TAX RECEIPT OPINION.

SALEM, Oct. 8.—In an opinion given today, Attorney-General Crawford held that October 7 was the first day upon which tax certificates could be issued to persons who paid taxes which have become delinquent. The opinion will make it necessary for many persons to get new tax certificates for in a number of counties certificates were issued on October 6. Under the statute, taxes became delinquent after April 6, and the law provides that six months after they become delinquent any person may pay the taxes and get a certificate to show that he has done so. Since the tax was not delinquent until April 7, the payments could not lawfully be received until October 7.

LA GRANDE SELLS BONDS.

LA GRANDE, Or., Oct. 8.—The council of La Grande last night floated a block of bonds totalling \$160,000, bearing 5 per cent interest, to John Naveen & Co., Chicago, at par. The proceeds will be used to construct a gravity water system that will bring water for domestic and municipal uses from Beaver Creek, 18 miles away.

It is an act that has been tried before, but failed. Now, after two years' of constant effort, the council accepted a bid which means that the city will in less than a year have a water supply equal from the standpoint of purity and sanitation, to any in the state.

KAISER'S SON TO WED.

BERLIN, Oct. 7.—Preparations are going forward for elaborate festivities which will mark the wedding of the kaiser's fourth son, Prince August Wilhelm, to his beautiful cousin, Princess Adelaide, of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Glücksburg. The ceremony will take place October 22, which will be the 50th birthday of the empress, mother of the bridegroom. The Prince was 21 last January, while his prospective bride will be 19 on October 19. On her birthday, three days before the date set for the wedding, she will be escorted to Berlin with all the pomp and circumstances customarily exhibited when new brides are admitted into the imperial family of the Hohenzollerns.

Prince August Wilhelm is an athletic young man, and fonder of sports and military pursuits than of intellectual culture. His imperial father offered him the alternative of marriage or a post-graduate course at Harvard University, and rather than go to America for another long period of study, the prince chose matrimony. As usual, the German newspapers declare that the match is "purely a love affair," and as the princess is a beautiful and charming young woman, it is quite possible that the prince may have fallen in love with the bride forced upon him by the exigencies of royal etiquette.

Boost for Roseburg! Dates have finally been permanently fixed for the big meeting of the Oregon and Idaho Development Congress.

Sessions will be held in Roseburg on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 23 and 24.

A number of prominent speakers will be present from various parts of the state.

A general Good Roads meeting will be held in connection with these sessions, and every road supervisor and every good roads advocate in the county is expected to be present.

In pursuance of this matter, active steps are now being taken to make this the biggest booster meeting ever held in southern Oregon. The Commercial Club invites the city and county officials, and every citizen individually to unite their efforts toward making these sessions an unqualified success. Roseburg has never had the honor of having so many prominent citizens of the state in attendance here at any one time. Besides these speakers a large delegation of Coos Bay boosters is expected to be present.

Southern Oregon has magnificent natural resources and advantages, but these largely await development. This development congress has for its purpose the devising of systematic methods for developing these resources and attracting the attention of capitalists, investors and home-seekers to this portion of the Pacific Northwest.

Among the features to be considered will be good roads in general, besides an automobile road from Roseburg to Coos Bay, and perhaps, also the matter of a railroad from Boise, Idaho, to Coos Bay. Development of the fruit industry, dairying, livestock, poultry, diversified farming, lumbering and numerous other industries will very probably be included among the matters under discussion. Musical and other features will also be included in the two days' program.

SHIP IS A TARGET

New Bulgarian Flag Draws Fire From Turkish Foris

ENGLAND SENDS WARSHIPS

Will Prevent Turkey From Attacking Greece, but Serbia Will Make War on Austria

VIENNA, Oct. 9.—The Turkish forts at Constantinople today fired on a vessel in the straits of the Bosphorus which was flying the new Bulgarian flag of independence. This act is expected to be followed by general hostilities on part of Turkey against Bulgaria unless the powers interfere.

Russia's fleet is mobilizing in the Black Sea, threatening further complications in the Balkan States mudle. A declaration of war between Serbia and Austria, growing out of the latter's occupancy of the provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina, is hourly looked for.

England Sends Warships

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Astonishing hope of avoiding war in the Balkans, England today ordered the battleships Glory and Prince of Wales and the cruisers Liana and Lancaster to proceed from Malta to the Island of Lemnos, a Turkish possession in the Grecian archipelago. At the Turkish embassy here it is stated that only the English ships can prevent the destruction of Turkey by the Grecian empire for its annexation of the Island of Crete.

Girl Found Dead.

WADSWORTH, O., Oct. 9.—With bullet wounds in her temple and body, Miss Ora Lee, aged 20 years, was found on the roadside near this city today. A suit case was near the body. There was no evidence of a struggle. Guy Rasor, who was engaged to marry the girl, has been placed under arrest.

Rush for Idaho Land.

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 9.—Hundreds of land seekers are flocking to Glenns Ferry, where on next Monday 18,000 acres of fruit land will be thrown open for entry under the Carey act. The land is irrigated from the Malad river.

Bryan's Closing Dates.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Final speaking dates for Wm. J. Bryan were announced at the democratic headquarters today as follows: Madison Square Garden, Oct. 26; Brooklyn, Oct. 28; Syracuse, Oct. 29; Buffalo, Oct. 30; Chicago, Oct. 31. On the night before election Bryan will close his campaign with an address at Omaha.

Steuenberg Divorce.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—The wife of Captain George E. Steuenberg, U. S. A., stationed at Caldwell, Idaho, and a nephew of former Gov. Steuenberg, of that state, secured a divorce yesterday on the grounds of desertion. In her complaint, Mrs. Steuenberg said that seventeen months ago her husband gave her a railroad ticket at Boise and told her to go to her father's home in San Francisco and never return. Mrs. Steuenberg was granted alimony of \$15 per month.
