F. E. HAND KILLED

Former Roseburg Cigar Dealer
Victim of Burglar

THREE BULLETS IN BODY

Tragedy Happened in Seattle, Where
Hand Had Been Employed as
a Detective

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 11.—Shot down in the performance of his duty, F. E. Hand, 50 years old, a patrolman employed by the West & Surry Detective Agency, was instantly killed by a burglar whom he interrupted while attempting to break into the Federal Bar, at Third avenue and Pine street, about 3:30 this morning. The murderer is at large.

Residents in the hotel above the saloon heard four shots, and, ignorant of the occasion for the firing, called the police headquarters. When the officers arrived, they found at the rear of the barroom, lying partly inside and partly without the doorway, the body of Hand, stiff in death.

Three shots had taken effect, one in the pit of the stomach, a second in the left side, probably penetrating the heart, and a third in the right arm. Hand had been shot down without a chance to draw his revolver.

Lying near him was a pinch-bar which the robber or robbers had been using in an effort to force open the door to the barroom. One man saw someone hurrying off, but did not get a good look at him in the darkness.

Hand was single, and he has no known relatives.

During last night four different at-

tempts were made, the police believe, by the same men, to enter buildings in the vicinity.

Hand conducted a cigar store in Roseburg about ten years ago. His place of business was at the present location of W. H. Carroll's plumbing shop. Upon leaving Roseburg, accompanied by his wife, Hand went to North Bend, where he came into public notice through a family scandal, he having shot at his wife's visitor, missing him and inflicting a flesh wound in the woman. This incident was followed by a legal separation between Hand and his wife, after which he gradually drifted to Seattle.

Austrian Consulate at Port on
Adriatic Sacked

WAR SHIPS SENT TO SCENE

Austrian Minister at Belgrade Said to
Have Been Slain—Czar of
Bulgaria Crowned

VIENNA, Oct. 12.—It is reported today that Count Berghach, the Austrian minister to Serbia, has been assassinated at Belgrade. It is impossible to verify the report, as all communication with Serbia has been severed. Vienna is in a state of feverish excitement and warlike demonstrations are being made.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Oct. 12.—The Austrian consulate at Antivari, Port, in Montenegro, on the Adriatic sea, was attacked by an infuriated mob today. The royal coat of arms was torn from the door and burned in the street, surrounded by a crowd dancing like maniacs. The building was then sacked, and the attaches were rescued barely in time to save their lives. Two Austrian warships have been ordered to the scene.

DRAW GRAND JURY

Instructions Lengthy, but Only
of Ordinary Character

ROAD CASE ON TRIAL TODAY

Judge Hamilton Establishes Record by
Granting Seven Divorces Within
One Hour

Drawing of the grand jury, as noted above, was the principal item of business transacted at the opening this morning of circuit court in regular session. In delivering his instructions to the jury, Judge J. W. Hamilton occupied about one-half hour of time, but he said nothing of a sensational nature. After receiving his charge, the jury retired for work, with A. O. Rose acting as bailiff.

It was expected that Judge Hamilton's instructions to the Grand Jury would bear strongly on alleged violations of the local option law, but the small sized crowd that gathered in anticipation of this was disappointed.

As a matter of duty, Judge Hamilton called the attention of the jury to the local option law, but in about so many words and no more. In accordance with law, Judge Hamilton also referred to the statutes bearing on libel, prizefighting and the ruthless setting out of forest and brush fires.

The usual stereotyped instructions were given to the jury, and along these lines Judge Hamilton asked for action first on those cases where commitments had been made. He explained that the test of judgment in considering an indictment was whether a conviction would result in the trial court, where the case would be no stronger than in the Grand Jury room. The jury was then given some advice on how to weigh evidence and this was followed by the request to conduct their hearings as economically as possible and present their final report as early as consistent with their duties.

Changes in the Venue.
For various reasons, Judge Hamilton this morning excused for the term the following talesmen of the original venire: Ira Wimberly and E. R. Applegate, of Drain; C. C. Roberts, of Yoncalla; G. W. Grubbs, of Wilbur; H. F. Starnes, of Roseburg; and G. H. Pitts, of Ruckles. To fill their places there was issued a special venire, containing the following names: Robt. Kidd and G. W. Kezartee, of Roseburg; F. L. Kent, of Drain; S. S. Morrison, of Peel; Geo. Hall, of Myrtle Creek; J. W. Cartwright, of Yoncalla, and J. A. Kanipe, of Oakland.

H. Wollenberg vs. County.
Today a jury is hearing the case of H. Wollenberg, as administrator of the estate of S. Marks & Co., vs. Douglas County, an appeal from an order of the court awarding the plaintiff \$469 damages for the opening of a county road through the Chadwick place, between Myrtle Creek and Riddle. Wollenberg asks damages in the sum of \$5,000.

7 Divorces in an Hour.
A record was made in the circuit court last Saturday afternoon when Judge J. W. Hamilton issued seven decrees of divorce within one hour's time. In addition, an order of default was entered in an eighth divorce suit, and the decree will probably be issued today. In each of the eight cases the wife is the plaintiff. Eight other divorce suits are still on the docket, awaiting disposal, and in four of these the plaintiffs are the wives. The principals in the divorce suits in which decrees were granted last Saturday and the grounds alleged follow:

Lela M. vs. Wm. J. Cockrell, married in this county in November, 1902; desertion in May, 1907.
Ailie vs. Franklin H. Hunsacker, married at Yaquina, Or., in March, 1905; cursed his wife, called her opprobrious names, struck her with a club and spent all of his earnings for liquor, leaving her to support herself and their two-year-old son. Decree carries the custody of the child and \$15 per month for its support.

Mary E. vs. Wm. King, married in Gurneeville, Calif., in March, 1887; cursed his wife, constantly accused her of infidelity and failed, after a time, to support her and their two children, a boy aged 12, and a girl

WINS AT CHICAGO

Detroit Captures Third Game
of Series, 8 to 3

PFEISTER BATTED HARD

Gompers Appeals to Labor to Support
Bryan—Thaw Sent Back to Mad
House at Mallewan

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—In the third game of the world's baseball championship this afternoon, Detroit defeated Chicago, 8 to 3. Mullin pitched for Detroit and had only one bad inning, the third, when Chicago made all of its runs. Pfeister, who pitched for Chicago, allowed one run in the first inning and in the next four the Tigers failed to score. In the sixth, however, the Detroit sluggers found their batting eyes and drove five runs across the plate. They scored twice more in the eighth, while Chicago failed to rally.

Sunday's game was won by Chicago, the score being 6 to 1. Detroit's pitcher was Donovan, the premier pitcher of the American League. For seven innings Donovan blanked Chicago, but in the eighth he weakened and Chicago scored six times. Detroit's only run came in the ninth inning.

Gompers' Strong Appeal.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—A strong appeal to the laboring men of the country to vote for Bryan was issued today by Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor. The appeal says:

"The despotic power of the republican party is undermining the government. It is as dangerous as the power under a crown. To stay the progress of despotism we appealed to the republican party and its answer was the nomination of Taft, the original champion of injunction. The democratic party stands for and by the law, and it is the required duty of the laboring element to support the democratic ticket."

Bitter Pill For Thaw.
WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Oct. 12.—Harry K. Thaw was today remanded to the asylum for the criminal insane at Matteawan. The proceedings of the inquest as to the condition of his mind was dismissed by the court.

The return to the Matteawan "Mad House" is a severe blow to Thaw, as he has often said that the institution is the "worst place on earth" and that he would rather be in the Tombs in New York.

Amuck in a Gun Store.
SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 12.—Suddenly going insane, John Eolf, of Plain City, Utah, entered a gun store here today and, seizing a Winchester rifle and loading it, began firing at pedestrians. Richard Brone, of Zanesville, Ohio, received a bullet through the leg and a girl's ears were cut off by a bullet. Eolf was finally overpowered by clerks.

Drown in Wine Vat.
SANTA ROSA, Calif., Oct. 12.—Mrs. George Collier, wife of a prominent vineyardist, was found dead today, floating in a big wine vat at her husband's ranch. The woman had evidently climbed to the top of the vat, and, being overcome by the fumes, fell in.

"Mother Agnes," of Portland, the Sister Superior of the Sisters of Mercy for the entire Pacific Northwest, was in Roseburg today in the interest of the new hospital and the parish school in this city. "Mother Camilla" took charge of the school today. The Sisters of Mercy now have in charge the Old People's Home in East Portland; Mercy Home on 16th street, Portland; St. Agnes' Baby Home, Park Place, Portland; the parish school in Eugene, and Mercy Hospitals at Albany, Baker City, North Bend and at other places, besides the institutions at Roseburg as above mentioned. The new hospital building here, three stories and basement, measuring 80 feet long, is now under roof and the finishing will proceed right along.

COMMERCIAL CONGRESS CLOSED

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—Reaffirming its support to a score of broad policies affecting the resources of the west and entrusting the details of their organization to new officers, delegates to the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress late today adjourned sine die and departed for their homes.

The last day of the congress was characterized by the only important contest of the five days' session, precipitated by a difference of opinion over the proposed national legislation known as the parcels post measure. A resolution supporting the attitude of the postmaster-general was defeated by a vote of 140 to 60. In anticipation that the congress would take action on the question, representatives of the Retail Grocers' association, Commercial Travellers of America, the postoffice department and of various commercial bodies accredited to the congress not only watched the progress of the resolution in committee, where it was defeated, but participated in the spirited debate on the floor today. The question threshed out involved opposition to mail order houses, welfare of the small merchant, the item of government expense and the probable effect on the commercial travelers of the country. In more than one instance the assertion was made that the real opposition was to prevent the government from affording a lower rate for transportation than that afforded by railroad or express.

The installation of President Walsh and other newly elected officers was a feature of the day. Resolutions today favor a government steamship line from the Pacific coast to Panama and other Central American points; an increased merchant marine; two coast navy yards for the Pacific fleet; improvement of nearly all rivers and harbors of the west; the appropriation of \$50,000,000 annually for a Lakes-to-the-Gulf waterway; the protection of water and forest rights; revision of the tariff and protection of domestic sugar.

The surprise of the closing moments of the congress was the unanimous adoption of a resolution endorsing woman suffrage.

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FALLS FROM TRAIN

Dead Body of Boy Picked Up
North of Oakland

CORONER HOLDING INQUEST

Identify a Mystery, But Shoes Bear
Stamp of Department Store
in Portland

The body of an unknown boy, his neck broken and the base of the skull fractured, was picked up early Sunday morning beneath the railroad trestle three-fourths of a mile north of Oakland. Circumstances show that the boy, while stealing a ride on the southbound overland train, No. 15, was either thrown or fell off at the trestle, and the latter is the more probable. The body was discovered by Chas. Neal, a Southern Pacific section foreman. Coroner N. T. Jewett is holding an inquest at Oakland today before a jury comprised of the following: J. E. Medley, A. E. Smith, A. G. Young, E. H. Pinkston, A. A. Smith and E. M. Brooks.

Nothing was found in the boy's clothing to identify him, but that he probably lived in Portland is indicated by the stamp of "Olds, Workman & King" on the inside of his shoes. Apparently he was about 14 years of age. He wore a cap of dark color, a dark gray coat, blue sweater and corduroy trousers. His two upper front teeth are a trifle prominent and the tooth immediately to the left is missing.

Two boys, giving their names as Tom Jackson and George Murray, and about the same age as the one who was killed, are the principal witnesses at the inquest. While beating their way they fell in with the third boy at Salem, so they say, and the three rode together on the "blind" as far as Eugene, where they separated, the third boy proceeding southward on No. 15, while the other two waited and rode south on the "flyer," No. 13. Arriving at Oakland and learning that a boy had been picked up dead, Jackson and Murray immediately viewed the body and identified it as that of their companion of a few hours before. They say they did not learn his name or where his home was.

The authorities are inclined to doubt the story of Jackson and Murray. They lean toward the belief that the three boys ran away from home together, but whether this will be revealed at the inquest is a question. At the conclusion of the inquest, Jackson and Murray will be brought to Roseburg and then either sent back to their homes, if their locations can be learned, or committed to the state reform school.

In looks the dead boy bears the stamp of education and gentle breeding. His hands are soft and regular in shape, showing that he had not been obliged to do any manual labor.
