Hon. John Barrett, director of the International Bureau of the American Republics with headquarters at Washington, D. C., was a passenger on this afternoon's northbound train. He came to the coast on this trip to attend the sessions of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress in session in San Francisco during the past week. He delivered an address at Medford Tuesday night and speaks at Eugene this evening. Mr. Barrett first came into prominence as U. S. minister to Siam, being appointed from Portland, Oregon, by President Cleveland. He has since been at various times, minister to three of the South American republics. To a Review representative this afternoon Mr. Barrett expressed his belief that a great development will be witnessed in the next ten years in the South American countries bordering on the Pacific Ocean, and that their relations with the United States would likewise multiply in importance. Being free from the intrigues of the Orient, which also holds for these South American countries give promise of being of far greater value to the United States in commerce and otherwise than the lands beyond the western seas.

WILL FACILITATE SHIPPING.

Uniform Bill of Lading to be Used by Harriman Lines.

Harriman lines in this territory will not be able to put the new uniform bill of lading into effect November 1, as was expected, but will inaugurate the new system very soon thereafter. The blanks have not arrived from the eastern headquarters, and until the supplies get here for distribution in this state, the local railroads cannot put them into use. Not only the Harriman lines, but it is expected all railroads west of Chicago will adopt the new bill of lading at once.

The uniform bill of lading, it is expected by the railroad traffic men, will be adopted by all railroads in the United States within a short time. It is explained that at present there are innumerable forms of these bills in use all over the country. Almost every railroad system varies that form to some extent at least, and it will prove a great benefit to shippers to have the different bills made uniform.

The new form was recommended by the Interstate Commerce Commission recently for adoption by all lines of railway in this country. Western roads were the first to take it up, but it is said by railroad men that the eastern roads will practically be forced to adopt the uniform bill as well, for it is said it has been arranged upon by shippers' associations and representatives of the eastern railroad lines.

The uniform bill of lading was recommended by the Interstate Commerce Commission after a public hearing upon the matter, at which all interests affected were represented. The bill was prepared by a representative committee of shippers and carriers, after many conferences with banking and other interests.

Under the new bill of lading, the shipper may elect to ship goods under the carrier's liability, or he may ship under the carrier's liability, the rates in the latter case being 10 per cent higher. The bill of lading provides various forms for needs of shippers.

The movement for a uniform bill of lading dates back some time. As early as 1904 the carriers tried to adopt a uniform bill, but certain commercial organizations filed a protest with the Commission that resulted in a hearing on the subject. The Commission stated the subject was one calling for agreement between the shippers and carriers. Committees were appointed some years ago to adopt a form of bill of lading, since which time there have been conferences between the committees, while the Commission acted in an advisory capacity with a view to reducing differences to a minimum and securing a successful outcome of the negotiations.

YEAR'S APPLE CROP.

the yield will be about 85 per cent, with larger acreage than ever before in the history of the state.

Growers in the Pacific state probably will receive better prices for their product than in former years, for the reason that the buyers' pool has been broken and it is predicted that before the close of November or early in December there will be a general scramble of representatives of commission houses to load up on the apples not already sold. In this connection it may also be mentioned that several orchardists in the central part of Washington have turned to the Australian and London trade, where their apples bring the top market price.

For reasons that have never been satisfactorily explained the apple industry has been decreasing rapidly in the districts east of the Rocky Mountains since 1895, and if it were not for the great activity of the growers and the opening of thousands of acres of orchard lands in the western country the people of the United States would be obliged to import the king of fruit. As it is the entire crop for domestic purposes this year means only a little more than a peck per capita of a population estimated at 85,000,000.

To show the decreases in the production of apples in the Union in the last 13 years, these statistics compiled by the federal department of agriculture, are quoted:

The growers produced 69,540,000 barrels of commercial apples in 1895 and 69,070,000 barrels in 1896, the banner year in the history of the country. This was a matter of 177,725,000 bushels, or more than nine pecks per capita. There was a decrease of nearly 28,000,000 barrels or more than the entire crop in 1897, when the yield amounted to 41,536,000. Another decrease followed in 1898, the yield being placed at 28,570,000 barrels, but in the next two years, 1899 and 1900, there were substantial increases, placed at 37,560,000 and 47,960,000 barrels, respectively. There was a drop of 20,000,000 barrels in 1901, while in 1902 there was an increase of 20,455,000 barrels, the crop being estimated at 47,625,000.

Forty-five million barrels of fruit was produced in 1903, and in 1904 the yield was 300,000 barrels greater. Then, in 1905, it dropped to 23,500,000 barrels, and in 1906 it increased to 36,130,000 barrels. The crop in 1907 fell off to 25,000,000 barrels, which is the estimated yield for 1908.

The total yield for the 13 years amounts to 559,761,000 barrels, or 1,679,283,000 bushels.

where in connection with frauds of various kinds upon public domain and has been repeatedly fined in his own state for these offenses. His attorneys upon such occasions were men of the standing and reputation of the late United States Senator Cushman Davis, Judge Ulan, and ex-Governor John Lind, of Minnesota, at present a congressman from that state. It is therefore important, if the government hopes to achieve results in the pending cases, that legal ability of the highest order should be retained to prosecute these suits. These facts are presented without the intention of casting any reflection upon the integrity or ability of the government attorneys at present handling the cases, but to show the desperate ends Smith and his associates are able to go in order to save their lands.
