LABOR MAN'S ADDRESS.

Says Choice is Bryan and Gompers or Taft and Van Cleave.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 15.—Declaring that existing industrial conditions made it necessary for organized labor actively to engage in politics for its own protection, Andrew Furuseth, for 18 years lobbyist for the American Federation of Labor, before Congress, in an address before 1500 people at the Armory last night vigorously attacked the injunction and severely rebuked Daniel J. Keefe, international president of the longshoremen, and one of the vice-presidents of the American Federation of Labor.

Mr. Furuseth accused Keefe of being the author of certain anonymous letters that had been written to Mr. Taft purporting to have come from a prominent official of the American Federation of Labor and assuring the republican nominee that organized labor was not united in its opposition to his candidacy. The audience consisted almost entirely of voters, not more than 50 women being present.

A hundred or more Socialists attended the meeting with the evident intention of routing the time. A vote for Debs in this election is a vote for Taft, and if you are not fools you can see it plainly. Debs has no more chance of being elected than any one of you have, and you have not even been nominated. A vote for Taft will be a vote against the real hopes of the laboring man in this campaign.

Mr. Furuseth spoke at considerable length on the injunction, which he said under present conditions was administered largely at the discretion of the presiding judge, which was making for a despotic form of government just as objectionable as any that is ruled over by a king. He reviewed the efforts of the American Federation of Labor to secure legislation to curb the application of the injunction and give to the laborer the full enjoyment of the political freedom assured him in the Constitution of the United States.

Refers to Boycott Case. Mr. Furuseth referred to the celebrated Loewe boycott case in Connecticut and charged that in this case the right of organization by laboring men for their own protection had been denied by the courts. The failure of the republican national convention to adopt the anti-injunction plank submitted by the officers of the American Federation of Labor was censured and credit given the Democrats for having incorporated such a plank in their platform at their Denver convention.

"All we have asked for is for legislation to guard the individual human liberty of the laborer," said Mr. Furuseth, "and we are now doing everything in our power to send William Jennings Bryan to the White House. We would also give Joe Cannon a vacation and elect a Congress that will protect human liberty and put itself as an iron wall against all such revolutionary doctrines as the injunction. We are not partisans only so far as stand for the protection of that kind of government Lincoln had in mind when he made his Gettysburg speech.

Tribute to Taft's Ability. "Now for a few words about Mr. Taft, and I assure you I shall not

abuse him. Mr. Taft is an exceptionally able man. He is a big man physically, a big man mentally. He has a big brain, but an entirely different conception of government from what we think is right. He is a Federalist and does not believe in a government by and for the people. He believes in government by the judges."

The speaker at this point reviewed the various decisions of Judge Taft involving the injunction question, and charged that in every case the Republican nominee had ruled adversely to the interests of the laboring people.

"Of course," continued Mr. Furuseth, "we read that Mr. Taft is receiving letters from prominent labor officials assuring him that organized labor is not united against him. And what is more, we know who is writing those letters. You know who it is. It is Daniel J. Keefe, and who is Keefe? He is Hanna's man Friday from the time that Hanna came into the limelight until the good Lord took him away. It is said he is to get an office for it. Well, he ought to have two offices."

"The American Federation of Labor does not presume to dictate or to suggest to its members how they shall vote. But here are two pictures: One of them is Taft and Van Cleave; the other, Bryan and Gompers. The situation is up to you. Take your choice."—Oregonian.
