COVERED MILK PAILS.

They Are Best For the Dairy, as Experiments Have Shown.

A prominent dairyman says: "We have yet to meet the man who has tried a good kind of covered milk pail and who likes clean milk who has not thought them a great improvement over the ordinary open pail. Yet our observations on their use in to the effect that not more than eight cow owners out of ten use them. It would certainly be a good habit for everybody to get into to use no other kind."

It goes without saying that a closed pail will greatly reduce the impurity of ordinary milk, since the open pail catches everything descending from

above. Experiments have plainly brought out the advantage of covered milk pails, and while they require somewhat more work of the person who washes the dairy utensils, no one who is interested in pure milk could consider this an argument of more than featherweight description. A good kind of pail is one in which the top fits on as a cover and the milk opening is covered with screening or is fitted with a hoop so that cheesecloth can be used for that purpose. There is little difficulty in thoroughly cleansing such a pattern of pail.

The closed pail is a subject which it would seem local creameries could agitate with direct benefit to themselves. In a way much of the advice offered to the farmers in the interests of pure milk is wasted since it is impracticable, but the covered milk pail is thoroughly practicable. A cow is much less apt to step into it, flies are excluded and sole dependence is not placed on the separator for taking out undesirable solids.

Pat No. 1 in the illustration, from Clarence B. Lane's bulletin, is an ordinary open one, with no provision for keeping out the dust and dirt. He says it should never be used in any dairy. Pat No. 2 is a good sanitary one, with small top provided with a metal strainer. In certified dairies probably better results would be secured by leaving out the strainer. The pail would be improved if stamped from one piece of tin.

CONCERNING "UNCLE JOE."

Last week one of the ablest and best liked Republican members of congress, J. Adam Bede, of the Eighth Minnesota district, was defeated for reelection by members of his own party because he declared himself unflinchingly in favor of the re-election as speaker of Joe Cannon. This seems to be a fair indication of Republican sentiment concerning the czar of the lower house of congress. Collier's Weekly, which so far as it has any policy, is certainly friendly to the Republican party, denounces Cannon unreservedly, and last week printed a communication in which it was said that if Taft and Sherman were elected the long arm of the speaker would reach from the house of the capitol to the senate and make the puppet Sherman do the bidding of the autocrat in the speaker's chair.

President Roosevelt, in 1891, said of Cannon: "We cannot escape from the fact that it was no credit to the Republican party of the house that Mr. Cannon of Illinois should be one of its leaders." Cannon then was temporarily out of office, the only time he has been out of office in thirty-five years. Among all the prominent Republicans there is none upon whom the country looks with so much hesitancy and doubt. His face is always set against any measure for the good of the people, his power is invariably exerted for those measures that are demanded by the great interests. Whether as a result of this attitude or not, the fact remains that after thirty-five years of officeholding, with only a moderate salary most of the time, "Uncle Joe" has grown rich, his wealth increasing as his power increased. He is emphatically an issue in this campaign—not merely an issue between the Democratic and Republican parties, but between the decent and patriotic element and the corrupt element which he has so long dominated.

WOMAN

Latest Work of a Gifted Singer—Laying Claim to a Glacier—Woman Fruit Farmer—Friend of Carmen Sylva.

From the fields of music and the lecture platform it is but a step to literature, and Mrs. Katherine Wallace Davis, who has been identified for many years with musical affairs and woman's club work in Chicago, has recently taken it. Mrs. Davis made her first public appearance as a singer, being the soprano in the historic Chicago

Ladies' quartet, an organization which made an excellent reputation for itself in the American musical world. Later Mrs. Davis was soloist in Unity church, and her beautiful singing attracted many admirers. After her marriage Mrs. Davis retired from choir work and devoted herself for awhile to an enterprise which proved to be highly successful. This was the management of a series of entertainments called "Cradle Songs of Many Nations," in which school children were trained to sing juvenile songs. Mrs. Davis arranged and even composed the music for these performances. The effort was received with so much favor that the songs were collected and published and have had a wide sale in all parts of the world. Since then Mrs. Davis has added "Christmas Songs" and "Singing Rhymes and Games" to her list. Her first novel is a tale of southern Italy called "The Punchinello."

Woman Owner of a Glacier.

Mrs. Mary E. Hart, who recently made a visit to Alaska in search of a promising mining claim, has the distinction of being the first person who has ever staked out a mining property on a glacier. It adds a good deal to the novelty of the business to state that the glacier was still in motion when the claim was staked. This is the first summer in nine years that passengers on the boat to the upper Klondike have been able to make a landing on Muir glacier, near Skagway. When Mrs. Hart passed that way the glacier was considered far from safe, but her love of adventure induced her to step ashore triumphantly and stake out a claim on the still moving mass of ice and debris. Mrs. Hart has made several trips to Alaska, having gone there from Los Angeles, Cal., to superintend the work of developing several claims belonging to her.

Oklahoma Woman Fruit Farmer.

Mrs. Katie O'Brien is entitled to the honor of being recognized as Oklahoma's most successful woman farmer. The proprietor of an estate of many hundreds of acres near Busset, in that new state, she manages her extensive business as profitably as if she were a man. Besides being one of the largest stock raisers in the state, she is devoting a great deal of attention to the raising of fruit. At present her fruit farm contains 450 acres of apple orchards, 100 acres are devoted to peach raising, and more than fifty acres are allotted to small fruit. From a single acre of strawberries Mrs. O'Brien made over \$300 the present season. She is a citizen of the Chickasaw Nation, being one-eighth Indian and seven-eighths Irish.

Honored by a Queen.

An American girl, Margie Gluck, has been receiving much attention at the court of Elizabeth of Roumania, the talented Carmen Sylva. Miss Gluck is the daughter of James Fraser Gluck and granddaughter of Charles Meilen Tyler, professor emeritus at Cornell university. Six years ago the principal of the Conservatory of Music at Ithaca discovered among his pupils a young girl who showed remarkable ability as a violinist. That year she won the violin scholarship and was sent to Prague to study with the celebrated Bohemian virtuoso and teacher Sevcik. After completing her course at Prague Miss Gluck decided to go to Roumania on a concert tour before returning to America. The queen was present at her concert at Bucharest and was so delighted with the young American that she sought an introduction and at once proceeded to show her admiration and friendship in a variety of ways.
