EVIDENCE ALL IN.

torney Cardwell, of the defense, an excellent opportunity on cross-examination and he made the most of it.

"It's Whiskey,"—Fenton.
Sheriff Fenton was called to the stand to identify the character of the liquor contained in the flask which DuRobin claimed to have purchased from Falbe. The process of examination by the officer was as follows: First, he looked at the liquor. Second, he smelled it. Third, he tasted it. (Longing sighs among the spectators.) "What is it?" asked the district attorney.

"It's whiskey," replied the sheriff with emphasis. "Good or bad?" "Fair quality." "Is it intoxicating?" "Yes."

Henry Ritzman, a local plumber, followed Mr. Fenton on the stand. The prosecution wanted to prove by another alleged offense on part of Mr. Falbe, of which the witness was supposed to be cognizant, that he was in the habit of selling intoxicating liquor. The defense interposed an objection, which was sustained by the court.

Testimony of Defense.
Eleven witnesses in all were called by the defense. The first of these was Falbe himself. He swore that DuRobin had approached him on two different occasions for liquor and that he informed him each time that he did not carry such stuff in his house, neither did he know where it could be obtained. Mr. Falbe stoutly denied that he had ever carried liquor in his place of business or sold any since the prohibition law became operative. In this statement he was corroborated by Mrs. Falbe, who testified that she spent most of her time in her husband's place of business. Dr. F. H. Vinell, Night Policeman Carl Palm, Attorney Dexter Rice, Jack Allison and Gus Edmunds, S. P. Engineers; Chas. W. Ballard, Geo. Staples (Popcorn George), Chas. L. Gilvin, County Clerk E. H. Lenox and Mayor E. V. Hoover were called by the defense to testify as to Falbe's reputation for honesty and integrity and every one of those witnesses stated that those qualifications of Mr. Falbe's character were good. The defense also attempted to prove by several of them who had boarded at Mr. Falbe's restaurant that no liquor was sold in his place of business, but Judge Hamilton sustained the objection of the prosecution, holding that such evidence would be only of a collateral nature and not bearing directly upon the specific case at bar. Staples was asked if DuRobin had tried to induce him to buy liquor of Falbe, but the prosecution again objected and was sustained by the court. Gilvin, who formerly conducted a "near beer" establishment in this city, was asked if DuRobin had attempted to buy intoxicating liquor of him and before Judge Hamilton could rule on the tardy objection of the prosecution the witness answered "yes." The defense then rested.

DuRobin was called by the prosecution in rebuttal of Falbe's statement to the effect that he (DuRobin) often paid him for more than one meal at a time during the period that he boarded at the restaurant. The object of the defense in calling forth this statement from Falbe was to show that the extra 50 cents which DuRobin paid Falbe on the occasion when the liquor was alleged to have been purchased was for meals and nothing else. DuRobin contradicted this statement, declaring that he invariably paid for his meals as he ate them.

After arguments by the attorneys for the state and the defense, and instructions by the judge as to the law applicable to the case, the jury retired for deliberation at 3:50 p. m. At five o'clock the jury was still out. The other jurymen were then excused until 9 o'clock on Monday morning when the case of Scott Jefferson, of Yoncalla, will be called for trial on an indictment for violation of the local option liquor law.

No reports have been filed by the grand jury for the past three days, no doubt largely due to the fact that Dist. Atty. Brown has been almost constantly in attendance on cases being heard in the court room. Grand Juror Hedrick, of Drain, was excused this morning from further duty on account of illness, and G. W. Kezartee was drawn to succeed him.

Fight for a Child.

The addition of a new case to the docket this morning formally ushered in a legal fight for the possession of DuRobert V. May, an 8-year-old boy and son of H. D. May, the local meat market proprietor, who is the defendant. The case—in legal phraseology a petition for a writ of habeas corpus—has been instituted by May's first wife, Ada V. May, who obtained a divorce from him in Columbia county, Wash., in February, 1907. In her petition, Mrs. May sets forth that the decree of divorce also gave her the custody of the boy, but that her husband has him in his possession and refuses to deliver him over to her. At an introductory hearing of the case this morning, Judge Hamilton allowed the defendant 30 days in which to answer the mother's complaint, and in the meantime the boy is to continue in the custody of his father. Mrs. May is represented by Attorneys Albert B. Hermann and Albert Abraham. Mr. May's lawyers are Coshow & Rice. The case will be bitterly fought.

Redeemers Divorced.

The divorce suit filed by F. H. Rednecker against Nettie J. Rednecker has been dismissed. It is understood the woman has obtained a divorce in Vancouver, Wash.
