NO MAIL ON BAD ROADS.  
Rural Delivery to Be Discontinued or Highways Not in Good Condition.  
In order to secure good roads on the routes over which rural carriers deliver mail, Fourth Assistant Postmaster General De Graw has issued a new regulation that mail will not be delivered on roads which are not kept in good condition. Some time ago the fourth assistant issued an order requiring postmasters at rural delivery offices to report to the department the number of miles of road covered by rural delivery from their offices and the names of road officials having jurisdiction over each separate section of road.  
Letters have been sent to these road officials notifying them that rural delivery will not be continued on roads which are not kept in condition to be traveled with facility and safety at all seasons of the year. They are requested to give attention to the roads as soon as practicable. New York has 1,804 rural routes, made up of 1,625 miles of macadam road and 39,352 miles of earth, gravel and sand roads.  
Success of Prison Labor on Roads.  
After a trial of eleven weeks the employment of convicts and local prisoners at highway building in the Panama canal zone is said by the division of municipal engineering to have passed the experimental stage, according to the Canal Record, which recently reached Washington. Three distinct ends were in view in the programme submitted by the special committee on the employment of prisoners, which was approved last February. The first of these was the improvement of the prisoners' condition; second, the opening up to development of the fertile valleys of the canal zone, and, third, reimbursing the government for the expense of maintaining its penal system, the latter view having been justified.

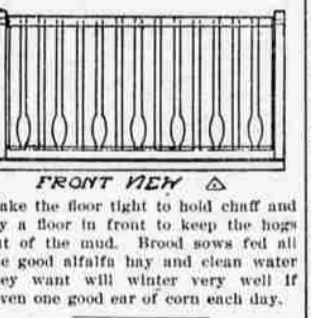
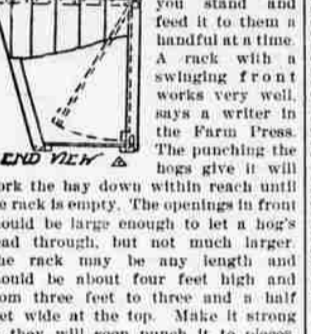

**DAIRYING IN OREGON.**

Conditions are Pronounced Uncexcelled by an Expert.  
PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 19.—Hon. F. H. Scribner, president of the Wisconsin Buttermakers' Association, but more especially honored in the Pacific Northwest as the breeder of "Loretta D" (belonging to the W. S. Ladd Estate, Portland, Or.) the cow that won first prize in the hundred and twenty day milking test at the St. Louis exposition in 1904, has said:  
"There is no spot in our great United States that can excel Oregon and Washington in dairying. This is my conclusion after spending six weeks in the former state and thoroughly investigating several of her beautiful valleys, and after an extended trip through Washington. I wish to say to the dairymen and farmers of this section, relative to its dairy possibilities, that I fear they don't fully appreciate the wonderful opportunity here for the raising of feeds best adapted to the dairy industry, and the excellent climatic conditions for the growth and development of stock. You should here reach the climax of productiveness."  
Mr. Scribner's Wisconsin farm of eighty acres supports, under his skilled management, ninety-head of stock.  
Even more successful than former displays was the Eighth Biennial Fruit Fair at Hood River. A very large delegation went from Portland by special train on Saturday.  
Harper's Weekly is planning a series of articles on the Pacific Northwest to appear in early issue, and J. K. Mumford, one of America's most prominent magazine writers, is personally gathering the data now.  
"If the community wants to get desirable immigration it's certainly within the province of the ministers to help" is an idea that promises to bear fruit in many Northwestern towns most active in presenting their claims to the country at large. Among his other announcements the minister asks his congregation for addresses of friends at distant points, and the commercial body co-operates by sending attractive literature and letters.

**POINTS ON THE PIG.**

Some Notes For Breeders That Are Worth Remembering.  
Pigs that mature early are the ones for profit when well cared for.  
Wood charcoal, wood ashes and salt should be accessible at all times.  
The greatest profit of the dairy consists in converting the byproducts into pork.  
Don't let the hogs have access to dirty or filthy water holes.  
Give them salt often, also plenty of fresh water daily.  
Never use a scrub male and then expect a fine litter from a good sow.  
Oats fed to sows during pregnancy, by sowing them broadcast on the ground, increase size of the unborn pig, also helping to keep the sow and litter in good condition.  
A mixture of wheat and barley is more valuable food for growing pigs than corn alone.  
Ground wheat and corn give better feeding results than ground wheat and rye.  
The profit in feeding young pigs is with those that are not stunted in their food.  
More pigs are underfed than are over fed.  
Soaking meal does not produce as great a gain in feeding value as soaking whole grain.  
Economical feeding is not how much they eat, but what they assimilate.  
Keep the herd free from lice by frequent applications of kerosene emulsion, or Minox's fluid mixed with water and sprayed on them, or by dipping if you have a tank. For small pigs use a half barrel to dip them in.  
ALFALFA HOG FEEDER.  
Strong Rack With Moving Front to Prevent Waste of Hay.  
Hogs are very fond of alfalfa, and they will eat a good deal of it if given a chance. They will also waste a whole lot unless you stand and feed it to them a handful at a time. A rack with a swinging front works very well, says a writer in the Farm Press. The punching the hogs give it will work the hay down within reach until the rack is empty. The openings in front should be large enough to let a hog's head through, but not much larger. The rack may be any length and should be about four feet high and from three feet to three and a half feet wide at the top. Make it strong or they will soon punch it to pieces.
