**AN UNUSUAL VERDICT.**

**Portland Jury Gives Plaintiff Much More Than He Asked For.**

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 20.—A verdict \$6,166.67 greater than the plaintiff asked for is the surprising result in the case of J. C. Bryant, representative-elect, and F. C. Whitten, against M. C. Griswold. The verdict was received by Judge Morrow about midnight last night after a trial lasting three days, and now the lawyers are wondering what the effect will be. Bryant and Whitten sued for \$10,550 commission on the sale of timber lands in Lane county. This is all they will be able to recover, and there appears to be some doubt as to whether or not the verdict is wholly valid. Robert Treat Platt, who won, said he did not know what the effect of the unusual verdict will be, and R. W. Montague, who, with John M. Gearin, represented the defendant, was also uncertain, but thought the whole verdict would fall.

The jury apparently took a different theory of the case of the plaintiff. The court had pointed out this other theory during the course of the trial, and the jury evidently "took a chance" in that direction. The defense has secured 10 days in which to move for a new trial and also to move for setting aside the verdict as inconsistent with the findings on special issues.

**EUGENE RECEIVES PLANS.**

**Bids for Government Building to be Opened November 7.**

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 20.—The plans for the new government postoffice building for Eugene have arrived and several local contractors are figuring on them. The bids are to be opened at Washington on November 7, and the contract will be let shortly after that date.

The plans call for a two-story pressed brick building 49x84 feet in dimension, with a full basement. The government architect estimates the cost of the structure at \$45,000, the remaining \$15,000 of the appropriation to go toward fixtures and other minor details.

The second floor of the building will be occupied by the Forestry department, headquarters for the Umpqua and Tillamook National forest reserves being located in Eugene.

**TWENTY-SEVEN TRUE BILLS.**

**Scappoose Liquor Cases Reach Large Proportions.**

ST. HELENS, Or., Oct. 20.—The Scappoose liquor cases have been occupying a great deal of the attention of the grand jury and the district attorney's office during the past week. Twelve true bills have been found against John West for alleged violations of the local option law, ten against Tom Callahan and five against M. J. Engfort.

Considerable trouble has been experienced in securing witnesses. Two were brought here last Friday and as the deputy sheriff did not like to put them in jail they were allowed to go to the hotel for their supper and took advantage of the officer's kindness to leave town. John Darby is in jail under charge of contempt of court for neglecting to obey a summons.

**SHERMAN ACCEPTS BLAME**

Republican Vice Presidential Candidate Drawn Out by Congressman De Armond.

On the word of James Schoolcraft Sherman, Republican vice presidential candidate, full responsibility for congress failure to enact many needed laws must be assumed by the Republican party.

April 8, 1908, in the house, as printed in the Congressional Record, Representative David A. De Armond, of Missouri, said:

"When the question is asked anywhere in the country—and it will be asked—why was not this measure considered, why was not that measure passed, why was not the other measure brought up? there is one answer, and only one: Because the Republican majority in this house will not be brought up, should not be passed. We can stand upon that record. It is well known that there is pressure in the country, and very great pressure, for the consideration and passage of a number of important measures. It is well known that a large majority of the voting strength of the country is insistent upon the consideration and the passage of important measures. Do not go to them again, as you have done so often and so successfully, and endeavor to divide them into the belief that somehow you could not get consideration for the measure and somehow you could not pass it. You can have consideration, because you have the power to enforce it, and so far as meritorious measures are concerned, as has been demonstrated here more than once and will be demonstrated again and abundantly demonstrated, you have only to express the will, you have only to give the opportunity, and if you lack the votes upon that side, as you do not, there will be an abundant addition here."

**Sherman Admits It.**

The same day, replying, Mr. Sherman said:

"The gentleman from Missouri intimates that the Republican side of the house desires to do away with the roll calls because of some fear of making a record upon some question before the house. Mr. Speaker, the Republican party in this nation, is prepared today to accept full responsibility, not only for everything that is done, but for that which is not done in the way of legislation and administration. [Applause on the Republican side.] We recognize the fact, sir, that this government today is Republican in all its branches. We recognize the fact that we have a Republican president, brave, wise, and courageous. We recognize that we have a Republican majority in the senate, that we have a Republican majority in this house that is ready to resort to every legal, every proper constitutional right to enact such legislation as it deems for the best interest for the greatest number of our people, and which is willing and ready to accept full responsibility for all those measures which are introduced here and which are enacted into law."

**R. D. HUME AND PARTY LOST.**

One of Their Two Gasoline Schooners a Total Loss.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Oct. 20.—R. D. Hume and party and two gasoline schooners are reported wrecked off Gold Beach on the Curry county coast. Whether any lives have been lost cannot be ascertained at this hour, all telephone communication to the south being shut off. The last wire went down after a brief message of the disaster reached here tonight.

The schooners Enterprise and Oxtrey left here for Rogue River Sunday morning, the Enterprise being in tow of the Oxtrey, because there was only one captain for the two vessels.

A heavy storm was encountered Monday morning and the vessels were driven ashore in the gale. The Enterprise, valued at \$19,000 is said to be a total loss. The Oxtrey may be saved, it is reported. It is valued at \$8,000.

Among those aboard the Oxtrey are R. D. Hume, a man named Rich, and a travelling man in the employ of the Fairbanks-Morse company.

ASK \$35,000,000 For Canal. MURDERED AT HIS DOOR.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Congress will be asked to make an appropriation of \$35,000,000 for carrying on the work of the Isthmian canal during the fiscal year of 1910 if the estimates prepared by the commission are approved by the War Department. The current year's appropriation aggregates \$27,000,000.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 21.—H. F. Butterworth, a prominent jeweler of St. John, was shot and instantly killed by an unknown assassin at the entrance of his home at 5 o'clock last night. His wife and children heard him fall in front of the door, and, rushing out, found him dead. The weapon must have been placed close to Butterworth's body by the assassin, as the report was muffled. The motive of the crime is surrounded by mystery, although robbery is assigned by the St. John police. According to them a \$500 diamond ring was missing from his finger when the dead man was found. The murderers left no clue by which they might be traced.
