

UTICA, N. Y., Oct. 24.—James Schoolcraft Sherman, congressman, republican candidate for the vice-presidency and Utica's most famous and honored citizen, is today celebrating his 53rd birthday.

Mr. Sherman graduated from Hamilton College in 1878 and two years later was admitted to the bar. In 1882 he was made secretary of the republican committee of his county and in 1884 he was chosen mayor of Utica by the largest majority ever given a mayoralty candidate in that city up to that time. In 1886 he was elected to congress. He was renominated in 1888, but was defeated and again was an unsuccessful candidate in 1890. Two years later, however, he was elected and continued to represent his district until the present year, when he declined renomination to accept the second place on the republican ticket with Mr. Taft. Mr. Sherman was a delegate to the republican national convention in 1892, and chairman of the New York republican state convention in 1895 and again in 1900.

TABLET TO PATRIOTIC WOMEN.

RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 24.—With an interesting program of addresses a memorial tablet commemorating the "Edenton Tea Party" of 1774 was unveiled today in the rotunda of the State Capitol. The exercises were held under the auspices of the North Carolina society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

The tablet is in commemoration of the action of the 51 women of Edenton, North Carolina, who first defied the mother country in October, 1774, by declining to use any more taxed tea. The tablet is suitably inscribed and in the center bears the figure of a tea pot and also an etching of the house in Edenton in which the patriotic ladies met.

REAR ADMIRAL DAYTON TO RETIRE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 24.—Rear Admiral James H. Dayton, lately in command of the Pacific fleet, will be placed on the retired list of the navy tomorrow on account of age. Rear Admiral Dayton comes from Indiana and has been in the navy since 1866. In recent years he has commanded the Chicago and other vessels of the navy, has served as commandant of the naval station at San Juan and as president of the naval board of inspection and survey.

In 1897, 1898 and 1899 he was in command of the cruiser Detroit and took active part during the Spanish-American war. He was in the squadron commanded by Admiral Sampson doing blockade duty and silencing shore batteries at Havana and Porto Rico.

While in command of the cruiser Detroit he captured the Spanish liner Catalina, a very valuable prize.

OAKLAND'S NEW CREAMERY.

Will Start in a Few Days—Large Orchards Being Planted.

OAKLAND, Or., Oct. 23.—The new creamery recently completed at Oakland will start up November 1, under the management of L. L. Wakefield, an expert butter maker from the Willamette valley.

The presidential election notwithstanding, Oakland fruit growers, farmers and dairymen are preparing for bigger things next year. Approximately 1000 acres will be planted in this vicinity to apples and pears this season.

During the past few days several tracts of orchard land in the Sutherlin valley have been sold to eastern people, who will, in the near future, take up residence here and improve their holdings.
