SIDEWALK LAWS.

(Continued from Tuesday.) Section VIII. All curbs and sidewalks included in the following district, to-wit: That part of the City of Roseburg bounded on the north by the South bank of Deer Creek, on the South by the North line of Mosher street, on the East by the West line of Kane street, and on the West by the center line of the Southern Pacific main track, also north side of Lane street from the center line of the Southern Pacific Main track to the Umpqua River Bridge shall be constructed of concrete and along the following lines: The width of the roadway between curbs on all streets sixty feet or less in width shall be three-fifths of the total width of the street; on streets sixty feet and over in width the roadway shall be 36 feet wide.

Section IX. All sidewalk pavements shall have a fall toward the gutter of one-quarter of an inch to one foot. The curb grade shall be parallel to, and the proper depth below, the property line grade allowing for the fall in width of the sidewalk. The grade of the gutter shall be parallel to and six inches below, the curb grade. The grade of the center of the street shall be as shown on the profiles, and the crown of the street shall be .85 of a foot for 36 foot roadway, .71 of a foot for a 30 foot roadway, .57 of a foot for 24 foot roadway and in the same proportion for streets of other widths.

Section X. On all business streets the sidewalk shall be paved the full width from property line to curb line. On residence streets the paved portion of the sidewalk shall be as follows:

On 40 foot streets the sidewalk pavement shall be six feet wide and the outer edge four feet from curb line; on fifty foot streets the pavement shall be five feet wide and the outer edge four feet from curb line; on forty foot streets the pavement shall be five feet wide and the outer edge two feet from the curb line. On streets over sixty feet wide, the sidewalk pavement shall be six feet wide and the outer edge eight feet from the curb line.

Section XI. Shade and ornamental trees shall be located half way between the curb line and the outer edge of the sidewalk pavement.

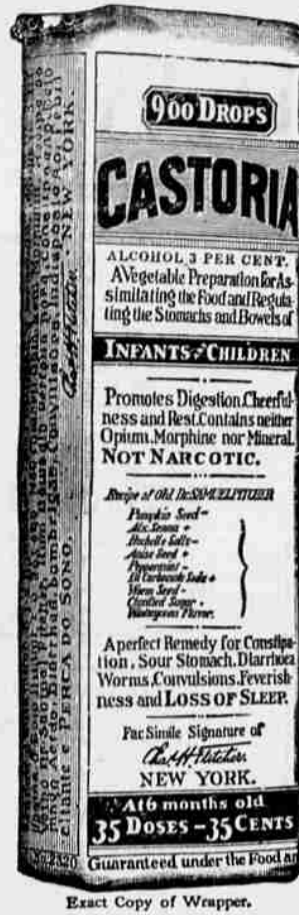
Section XII. On all streets in the City of Roseburg, outside of the heretofore described district, the curbs and sidewalks may be constructed of either wood or concrete according to plans and specifications approved by the City Council of the said City of Roseburg, and along the following lines: The width of roadway between curbs on all streets of 50 feet or over in width shall be 28 feet and on all streets less than 50 feet in width the roadway shall be three-fifths of the total width of the street. On 60 foot streets the sidewalk pavement shall be six feet wide and the outer edge eight feet from the curb line; on 50 foot streets the pavement shall be five feet wide, and the outer edge 5 feet from the curb line. On 40 foot streets, the pavement shall be five feet wide and the outer edge two feet from the curb line. On streets over 60 feet in width, the sidewalk pavement shall be six feet wide and the outer edge eight feet from the curb line. Specifications for Curbing and Sidewalks.

Section XIII. All curbing and sidewalk pavements in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, shall be constructed to the established lines and grades, and in accordance with the following specifications.

Plank Walks. Section XIV. Plank walks shall be constructed of a good grade of sound Oregon fir lumber, free from shakes and loose knots. The stringers shall be four by six-inch timber not less than sixteen feet long. The joints in the stringers shall be spliced with a two by four, four feet long, securely spiked to the side of the stringers.

Section XV. On the six foot walk there shall be three stringers, one in the center and one six inches from the edge. On wider walks the stringers shall be not to exceed thirty inches apart, center to center. The planks shall be two by six or two by eight, surfaced on the upper side and securely nailed to each stringer with two ten-penny nails. Where timber curbs are put in they shall be made of four by twelve-inch plank, sixteen feet long, with a two by twelve inch plank, four feet long, spiked to the side of the curb at the joint. The curbing shall be held in place by extending one of sidewalk planks out to the curb every eight feet and spiking it securely to the curb.

Cement Walks. Section XVII. Cement walks shall be constructed of Portland cement, sand and broken stone and gravel. The cement used shall be of the best high-grade Portland cement. It shall be mixed and of such firmness that 95 per cent will pass through a Number 100 sieve. Bricks of neat cement, when seven days old, shall have a tensile strength of 450 pounds per square inch. Brickets made of one part cement

and three parts sand, when seven days old, shall have a tensile strength of 120 pounds per square inch. The sand used for all concrete and cement mortar shall be clean, coarse and sharp. The broken stone used for the concrete shall be clean hard stone, free from earth and dust, and the fragments shall vary in size from 1-8 to 2 1/2 inches in the greatest dimensions. If gravel is used for the concrete, it shall be clean, hard gravel of the same size as specified or broken stone, and it shall be free from broken earth and dust. All concrete shall be made of Portland cement, sand and broken stone or gravel, mixed and placed as follows: One barrel of cement shall be thoroughly mixed dry on a platform with 1/2 cubic feet of sand. The cement and sand shall be wet and mixed with a stiff mortar. The mortar shall be spread out and 17 1/2 cubic feet of wet broken stone or gravel thoroughly mixed with it until the mortar is evenly distributed. The mixture shall be of such consistency that it can be tamped solidly in place. It shall be put in place and thoroughly tamped within thirty minutes after the cement is wet. All points in concrete masonry where the concrete has to be placed over new material in added shall be grouted with neat cement mortar.

Before the walk is laid the surface of the ground shall be brought to a uniform subgrade four inches below the finished surface of the walk. When filling is necessary it shall be put in in four-inch layers and thoroughly tamped until the foundation is solid. Four-inch by four-inch form shall be put in at each edge of the walk. These shall be set true to the line and grade and securely fastened so that they will not be moved in tamping the concrete. The walk shall be composed of a three-inch concrete base and a wearing surface of one inch thick, and the finished pavement shall be the full thickness (four inches). Just before the concrete is put in the ground shall be leveled off and sprinkled.

The wearing surface of the walk shall be one inch thick, made of one part Portland cement and two parts coarse sharp sand. The sand and cement shall be mixed dry and then wet and mixed into a stiff mortar. The mortar shall be used within thirty minutes after the cement is set. The wearing surface shall be put on before the concrete base has set, and it shall be thoroughly troweled. After the surface is troweled it shall be laid off in squares, with a marking tool, the joints extending to a depth of not less than one-half inch, and the edges of the walk rounded off with an edger. The surface of the walk shall be retroweled or finished rough so that it will not be slippery. The walk shall be protected with a covering of sand about one inch thick, and it shall be kept wet for not less than six days after it is put in.

Concrete Curbing. Section XVII. Concrete curbing shall be constructed true to line and grade and it shall be of the form and dimensions shown on the plan on file in the office of the City Recorder. Forms made of two-inch lumber shall be used for the curbing, securely fastened, so that they will not be forced out of line in tamping the concrete. The concrete shall be mixed and placed as specified for cement walks. The exposed face and the top of the curbing shall be finished with mortar one inch thick, made of one part cement and two parts sand. The mortar on the outer face of the curbing shall be tamped solidly against the forms with iron tamping tools as the concrete is put in, and it shall have a smooth, even face. The mortar on top of the curbing shall be put in before the concrete has set, and it shall be

troweled smooth and true and the outer edges rounded off. The curbing shall be marked off with a marking tool in lengths of five feet. The joints extending to a depth of one-half inch. At street intersections and driveways crossing the sidewalk the curbing shall be rounded off at the corners to a radius of five feet. The curbing shall be kept wet for six days after it is put in. Section XVIII. That it is hereby made the duty of any person or persons owning corner lots and constructing sidewalks under the provisions of this Ordinance to have the names of the intersecting streets designated in the pavement within a distance of three feet from the intersecting lines. Section XIX. The City Improvement Committee shall have power and it is hereby made their duty to regulate the time and manner of the construction of said walks and gutters and the necessity thereof, and when ordered by said Improvement Committee the walk, curb, and gutter, or all, shall be constructed by the owner of the abutting property, and if the said owner refuses or neglects to conform to the requirements made in writing by said Committee or by a person authorized by said Committee to give such notice, then he shall be deemed to have ordered made as prescribed by the Charter of the City of Roseburg for the improvements of streets and sidewalks and improvements shall be a lien upon the abutting property as provided for therein. Section XX. The owner of the abutting property shall be given a notice in writing that his or her sidewalk has been reconstructed and said notice shall be given a period of thirty days in which to comply with the requirements of said notice and this Ordinance, and in case of refusal or neglect to comply therewith within the said time the city shall proceed as provided for herein. Section XXI. That all Ordinances

LOCKS JAILER IN CELL.

Dudley, the jailer, locked, in his cell. For half an hour Dudley attempted to make known his plight, and in the meantime the convicted murderer was fast making his way into the hills.

Hazel was standing behind the cell door in the darkness when Dudley led a squad of trusties into the cell. As the jailer stepped in Hazel stepped out and turned the key in the lock. A posse of 20 men is in pursuit of the fugitive.

WHAT FIRES COST US.

F. W. Fitzpatrick, contributes an article in the November McClure's on "Fire—An American Extravaganza." He says:

"Fires have cost us as many as 7,000 human lives in one year's time, and our loss in money value, through the destruction of property, is almost as appalling. The production of gold in the entire world, something like \$400,000,000 per year, would not recoup for our losses by fire, and the incidental expenses accompanying them, in the same period of time; the value of all the coal mined in this country in a year's time would just cover the cost to us of our fires; the value of our lumber production is only a trifle more. We are fond of luxuries, and import a great many, yet the value of all that importation is but a fifth of our fire cost. We are great and persistent advertisers, and spend large sums in that necessary to business, but, vast as our advertising bill is, it equals but two-fifths of our fire bill; and all the industrial dividends paid in 1907 aggregate but three-fifths of the amount of our fire extravagance. "In 1907 there were no great conflagrations; it was what might be termed a "normal year;" but we actually destroyed buildings, and property contained in them, to the value of \$215,000,000."
