BOND ISSUE VALID.

Eugene Wins in Friendly Suit Taken to Supreme Court.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 27.—In affirming the decree of Judge L. T. Harris, of the circuit court for Lane county, in the case of the city of Eugene, respondent, vs. the Willamette Valley Company, the supreme court today upheld the validity of the amendment to the charter of the city of Eugene authorizing the issuance of \$200,000 bonds for the purchase of the city waterworks system. This was a friendly suit to determine the legality of the bond issue.

Rendshaw vs. City of Eugene, that these charters were merely re-enactments of existing charters and did not take the cities out from under the limitations of the local option law.

All charters enacted prior to 1905 were superseded by the local option law, so far as control of the liquor traffic is concerned in a town in "dry" territory. All charters enacted since 1905 are controlled by the provision that all charters must be "subject to the criminal laws of the state." Only those charters enacted in 1905 which expressly exempted the cities from the provisions of the state liquor laws had the effect of evading the local option law, as shown above. There were three of these, Medford, Condon and Estacada. The people of these three cities can make them dry by amending their charters, so as to make them subject to the criminal laws of the state.

SCRIBER ARRESTED AGAIN.

Bank's Shortage is Known to be Over Hundred Thousand.

LA GRANDE, Oct. 28.—A U. S. Marshal will arrive here tonight to arrest J. W. Scriber, the bank wrecker, on additional charges. It is now positively known that the shortage will be over \$100,000. Bank Examiner Wilson will finish his work tonight and the bank will be turned over to Receiver Neldner tomorrow.

Mrs. T. N. Murphy, who is rumored to have been engaged to Scriber and is on his bond for \$12,000, is said to have been told by Scriber, a week before the crash, to take her money out of the bank, which street rumor says she did.

Scriber is to appear in court this afternoon in proceedings growing out of his second arrest, caused yesterday by O. F. Coildge, who signed \$2,000 of Scriber's \$15,000 bond. Under this arrest Scriber is specifically charged with receiving \$300, after knowing the bank to be insolvent.

Oregon Convict Taken.

TACOMA, Oct. 28.—Frank Brown, who escaped from the Salem penitentiary two months ago and swam the Willamette river amid a rain of bullets, was captured here today by Deputy Sheriff Desmond.

Kloeber's Body Found.

TACOMA, Oct. 28.—Bloodhounds late yesterday afternoon found the body of Fred W. Kloeber, who had been missing in the mountains since Oct. 19. He was found lying face down about half a mile from where the body of his companion, Julius Kuntle, was found Sunday. In his exhausted state he had evidently stumbled off a log, struck his head again a tree and broke his neck.

Forest Rangers Burned.

VENTURA, Calif., Oct. 28.—J. F. Kloeber, of Santa Paula, is dead, and James Hatcher and Fred Rivers, forest rangers, are suffering from severe burns as a result of being caught in a pocket canyon by a brush fire which they had started, but which burned so fast they could not escape.

B. F. WAGNER DEAD.

Ashland Tidings, Oct. 26: Benjamin F. Wagner, a respected resident of Ashland for a good many years past, died yesterday at the home of H. E. Stone, on Granite street, of cancer of the stomach, aged 63 years.

His wife died a number of years ago. Four sons survive: John H. Wagner, a Southern Pacific locomotive engineer, now headquartered at Sacramento, Calif.; Chas. E. Wagner, an electrical engineer of Portland; Ben F. Wagner, of Hartman & Thompson, bankers of Portland; and Lot Wagner, of this city; all of whom will be present to attend the funeral.

The deceased was prominent in the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, both in the subordinate lodge and in the Encampment, and he was also an active worker in the Masonic fraternity, being a member of Ashland lodge, No. 23, A. F. & A. M., and at the time of his death was High Priest of Siskiyou Chapter, No. 21, Royal Arch Masons, of this city.

Mr. Wagner was also a veteran of the Civil War, and a member of Burns Post, G. A. R., of this city. He enlisted in his native state of Pennsylvania in 1861 and served for three years in the 49th regiment of infantry volunteers where he saw most active service, participating in some of the greatest battles of the war, including the second battle of Bull Run, Chancellorsville, Cold Harbor, The Wilderness, Antietam and Gettysburg, and serving under Gen. Hancock and also under Gen. Sheridan.

(Two of Mr. Wagner's surviving sons are well remembered in Roseburg, where they were formerly located. B. F. Wagner, Jr., was a member of the High school faculty two years ago, and Chas. E. Wagner was at one time business manager for the old electric light and water company.)

MUSIC LOVERS ENTERTAINED.

Artistic Recital Pleases Large Audience at the Armory.

Three hundred or more of Roseburg's music lovers were richly entertained at the Armory Tuesday evening by a select program rendered for the benefit of Mercy hospital by three talented Portland artists, Catharine Covach, soprano; Cornelia Barker, violinist, and Frederick W. Goodrich, pianist. That the audience was large is befitting the purpose of the recital; that the audience was immensely pleased at the manner in which the program numbers was given is a tribute not only to the artists but to the discriminating taste of the management of the successful affair.

At no time did the program drag; its arrangement was too liberal for that. Perhaps the numbers best received were those of the violin. The playing was not what might be termed brilliant, but the tones were penetrating in their wonderful sweetness. This feature was brought out strikingly in "The Swan" (Saint-Saens), the appreciative audience rewarding the soloist with an encore. Mr. Goodrich's interpretation of Chopin's "Polonaise in A" was, above all of his other numbers, a splendid effort and did not fail to enthrall his listeners. Two of his compositions showed distinct style and grace. More than ordinary interest in the vocal numbers throughout. The high notes were reached with ease and naturalness, and softly, too, whenever required, displaying the perfect control that comes with thorough culture. All in all, the program was one that will go on record as one of the most enjoyable of its kind ever given here.
